

ORDERLY MARKETING BRINGING to the biting habit. PROFITS TO WOOL GROWERS

The sheep and goat men of Texas tims. will be in the midst of the shearing season before many months, and market prices and marketing methods are occupying the thought of every wool and mohair producer in the state.

Never before in the history of Texas have the sheep and goat producers, both in the farming and ranching sections, shown their present interest and determination to establish co-operative marketing of wool and mohair. The remarkable success which has been achieved in co-operative marketing of agricultural commodities in the last few years, and the support of the plan by such national figures as the late President Harding, President Coolidge and many others, has convinced the sheep and goat raisers of Texas that the firm establishment of such a system of marketing is of the most vital importance.

Orderly marketing in place of dumping the entire crop on the market in a few weeks time is essential to prevent great fluctuation in market prices.

Grading of much of the wool and mohair is also essential, first, that the producer may receive a ust price for good or poor quality of product, and second, so that more sales may be made direct to the manufacturers, thus resulting in the elimination of unnecessary middlemen, and in the producer receiving full market value of

the product. Texas is the leading state in both wool and mohair production, with an annual production of about 20,000,000 pounds of wool (nearly 1-10 of the total production of the United States). and 7,500,000 pounds of mohair (about 3-4 of total production of the United States). This large production will enable the sheep and goat men of Texas to have the most powerful wool and mohair marketing organization in this country, and would aid in stabilizing the wool and mohair market, and in securing adequate returns.

In this connection, the twenty members of the Southwestern Wool and Mohair Association in Brown County have just recently sold through the Association at the Houston market 38,000 pounds of wool which brought 82 cents per pound for kid hair, and 48 1-2 cents for combings, it is said by officers of the local association.-Brownwood Bulletin.




