PRECINCT-COUNTY CONVEN-TIONS TO BE HELD MAY 3 AND 6


The State Democratic Excutive Committee, under date April 13, issues the following notice to county chairmen for their guidance and information in regard to the selection of delegates to attend the State Convention which is to meet in Waco on May 27, for the purpose of selecting delegates to the National Democratic Convention:

Precinct Conventions May 3.

1. A precinct primary convention should be held in each voting precinct of the county on Saturday, May 3, between the hour of ten o'clock a. m. and eight o'clock p. m. The precinct chairman should designate the hour and place for holding said precinct convention. When the precinct convention meets it should be presided over by said chairman, and after electing its secretary and such other officers as may be necessary to its proper organization, it shall proceed to elect its delegates to the County Convention and transact such other business as may properly come before it. The officers of said precinct convention should keep a written record of its proceedings, including a list of the delegates elected to the county convention, which record constitutes the returns from said convention. This record should be signed officially, sealed up and safely transmitted to the County Chairman and same will then be used by county chairman in making up a roll of the delegates to the county convention. No one shall vote or participate in said precinct convention unless he or she be a qualified voter in such precinct.

A LARGE DELEGATION EXPECTED TO ATTEND CONVENTION FROM MASON

According to a report of the committee recently appointed by the Commercial Club to urge that a delegation gofrom Mason to Brownwood to attend the Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, it is quite evident that a large delegation will go to that city on May 13, 14 and 15th. The committee reports that every business house in Mason was called on and that at least one number from each firm signified their intention to attend the Convention.

On Saturday a duchess to represent Mason will be elected by each member of the Mason Commercial Club going to the County Clerk's office and casting a vote for the young lady they desire to attend the Convention. So far no names have been entered, but it is believed that by Saturday some of the young ladies of Mason will be stirring around campaigning for this appointment.

According to press dispatches and literature received by the News the convention promises to be the biggest ever held, and that the program will include big features to be of entertainment. It is believed that fifty bands will be in attendance at the Convertion. The pageant promises to be tho most elaborate ever held in the Southwest. An entire squadron of airplanes will go to Brownwood from Ellington Field. Houston, Texas and troops of cavalry, artillery and infantry will be sent from San Antonio to take part in what is thought will be the biggest military events ever staged in this section.





St. James' Pud ding .-- Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter; add onehalf cupful of molasses, one-half cupful of milk,

and one twothirds cupfuls of flour, one-half teaspoonful of soda, a little salt, one-half teaspoonful each of cloves, allspice, nutmeg, and one-half pound of dates, cut into pieces. Steam

in pound baking-powder cans for two and one-half hours. Australian Fillet .- Pound a fillet of beef flat, rub it well with salt on both sides. Chop one-fourth of a pound of bacon, add three or four boned sardines, mix with pepper, a pinch of ginger and several teaspoonfuls of bread crumbs. Spread this dressing on the meat, roll up and tle. Heat some butter or drippings in a frying pan, put in the meat and brown it on all sides. Add five or six tablespoonfuls of sour cream and heat it a few moments longer over the fire. Cook in a fireless cooker, using two radiators for

two hours. Ham With Cream Gravy .-- Remove the skin from a slice of ham. Let stand twenty-four hours in good vinegar. Drain and brown in a hot frying pan, adding enough fat to cook, and a little of the vinegar, a sliced Sunday. onion, ten peppercorns, a chopped carrot, a teaspoonful of capers, a teaspoonful of sugar and three table-

spoonfuls of sour cream. Cook slowly two hours. Thicken with flour, adding another tablespoonful of sour cream.

Stuffing for Goose or Pig .- Mix together one cupful of boiled chestnuts. one cupful of celery, chopped, one tart apple, also chopped, a small onion, one cupful seeded raisins, a tablespoonful of butter, melted, salt to taste, and enough milk to moisten. Mix lightly

Those Raised Especially for Market Are Apt to Be More Tender Than Wild Ones.

Rabbits may be served in any way chicken is liked-fried, fricasseed, smothered, baked, in a casserole, in pie. croquettes, or hash. While wild rahbits are often relished, those especially raised for the market are apt to be more tender and will cook in less time. The bureau of home economics, United States Department of Agriculture, recommends the following way of preparing an excellent casserole of rabbit:

Clean and disjoint the rabbit into as many pieces as desired. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Fry to a delicate brown, preferably in sausage or bacon fat, though any clean cooking fat may be used. When the rabbit is done, put the pieces in a casserole and pour over them a gravy made from four tablespoonfuls of the fat in which it was fried, blended with four tablespoonfuls of flour and four cupfuls of stock or boiling water, seasoned well with salt, pepper and worcestershire sauce. If the casserole is prepared early in the day it may be reheated in the oven for dinner. It should be boiled in the casserole from half an hour to an hour, or until the meat is very tender.







Flour Is Manufactured From the Sugar Beet

An important additional use for the sugar beet is found in the manufacture of flour therefrom. Indeed, it is reported that this kind of flour is turned out in considerable quantities at Suresnes, in France, where an enterprising person has built a large drier for the purpose. The first part of the process consists in chopping up the beets and drying the water from them. They contain, to start with, about 72 per cent of water, nearly all of which is removed by evaporation. By this means 100 pounds of dry material are obtained from 357 pounds of beets.
