## DHS teacher ends 40-year career

Have you ever known a teacher who taught 40 years in the same
school district? school district?
Have you ev Have you ever even heard of a
teacher with that kind of longevity? Snider. The longtime Dimmitt High School homemaking teacher, who is retiring,
received a big ovation from her fellow DISD employees and a special retirement gift at the school district's annual Employees Appreciation Dinner Tuesday evening in the Expo Building. "There's no other teacher in this lives as she has," Supt. Les Miller said. "In looking through the school records, we can find no other teacher who has put in 40 years in this school district. There are few if any in the entire state who have attained this Snider and fellow retirees Pat Evan plants from School Board President plants from School Board President
Steve Buckley, then Snider was called back up and given a special 40-year service gift-a large print of

Snider, who was raised on a farm and ranch near Hamilton, was just a year out of Texas Tech and had
served a year as an Extension agent in Plainview when she started teaching here in 1958, at age 21. (She had completed public school in 11 years and college in three). She was barely older than some of
her first students, who included her first students, who included Behrends Curl and Beth Cleave Odom. Linda Hance was her first FHA president and Mona Dell Hunter was her second. These former students are al

## * Agriculture Ouflook 2

County Extension Agent-IPM Warmy, dry and windy conditions
have pretty much been dominating have pretty much been dominating the past month's
until this past week
Scattered thunderstorms brought a
little, much needed of Castro and Lamb counties, but ther areas just got enough to slow cotton planting If you have water available for your wheat, you probably need to be
using it. Dryland wheat is really using it. Dry
burning up.
Disease and insect pressure have been relatively low thus far, with the
exception of thrips in wheat and exception of thrips in wheat and
alfalfa. alfala.
Heavy damage was observed on
alfalfa leaves last week. Thrips were moving off of the drying volunteer wheat and into alfalfa fields. Overwintering boll weevils are starting to emerge in both Lamb and
Castro Counties. The Texas AgriculCastro Counties. The Texas Agricul-
ture Experiment Station boll weevi traps have been catching boll weevils for the past several weeks. It's okay to see these weevils out
now because they will be suicidal. They will die in 10 to 14 days after They will die in 10 to 14 days afte
emergence without cotton squares to feed on. The real problem is going to be if there is a long extended emergence period.
This is likely to be the case due to the mild winter that just passed. Few
weevils were probably killed, thus leaving many more to emerge this spring and early summer, making timing of overwintering emergence sprays difficult. We must stay on to
