MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 17 .--- A special from River Falls, Wis., says a destructive flood is sweeping down Black river valley. A large number of dams, mills, iron bridges and other property have been destroyed. A special from Chippewa Falls also re ports great destruction to property in the Chippewa river valley. All railways report washouts, and no trains from the north or west will reach Milwaukee for several hours. The wall of water sweeping down Black river valley struck River Falls The fire alarm bells were rung and the people hurried from their homes to the aid of those living in the lower parts of the city in the path of the flood. The dam of the Prairie mill checked the rush of water for a few minutes, but walls of mud and stone could not withstand buildings followed. Mealy's starch factory was torn from its foundations and went down the stream. Another large bridge went next. Foster's sawmill was in the path of the tide and that suffered \$2000 damage.
