THEY ASSEMBLE IN THE CITY OF DALLAS.

Hon John H. Reagan Writes & Lette Withdrawing His Name from Befor the Convention-Hon. C. A. Culberson Nominated by 578 to 287.

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 15. - The great Democratic convention is in full blast, and the Sam Jones tabernacle is now the meeting place for one of the most remarkable bodies of men that ever assembled in Texas. At noon yesterday Bishop Garrett was introduced to the convention by J. J. Eckford of Dallas and offered prayer. Chairman W. S. Baker then stepped forward and rapped the body to or-der, and, as is the custom, delivered a short address touching upon the theories and practices of Democracy. Concluding, he announced that nomi-

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 16. - Gen. W. R. Hamby of Travis was elected per-manent chairman and W. L. Sargent permanent secretary. The report of the committee on credentials was made and adopted. 10. We hold to the theory that government was instituted for the protection of life, liferty, and property, and that it fails in its purpose when it denies that protection to any cit zen or class of citizens. We view with gray apprehension the growing tendency to set a

We view with grave apprehension the growing tendency to set at defiance the laws devised for the protection of life and property, and demand of our legislators such amendment of these laws as may be found necessary, and of our executive officers the use of all the powers of the state, when necessary, for the suppression of lawiessness and the protection of the lives of our citizens and all classes of property within this state.

11. A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the liberties and rights of the popie, we pledge that the constitutional provisions requiring the public free schools to be maintained and supported for a period of not less than six months each year shall be faithfully carried out, and the university, its branches and other educational institutions shall be properly endowed and maintained.

12. We believe the system of hiring convicts to corporations and individuals is against public policy and should by discontinued at the earliest practice ble moment consistent with the best interests of the state.

13. We favor the passage of a law by the next legislature regulating primany elections of rultical parties of this state.

14. We commend the action of the public officials in seeking to recover lands unlawfully obtained by railroad companies from the state for sidings and switches, and pledge the people that so long as the Democratic party remains in power this course shall be continued until every acre is recovered or returned to the state. At the same time we pledge that all setual settlers on such lands and also all purchasers in good faith for value who may have purchased any claim.

16. We favor the adoption of the pending constitutions amendment authorizing annual appropriations for the support of the confederate home, and piedge the Democratic party to the continued maintenance and support of said institution.
