Greenville, Tex., Sept. 28 .- At months of waiting the long-for rain come in abundance. About 3 o'clock Friday evening a heavy downpour came from the northeast, continuing until about 6 o'clock. The ice factory, which had suspended work for want of water, started up, and the waterworks will probably begin general service again. The drouth has been the severest in the history of Hunt county. No rain has fallen since May, except a shower or two in July that did not even settle the dust. To End a Trust.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 25 .- Suit has been brought by C. F. Crocker which nothing could stand. Aid is reand W. H. Crocker to terminate a trust under the will of the late Charles Crocker, by which they were custodians of four hundred and ninety \$1000 bonds in behalf of George Crocker. The terms of the trust are that if within the fifteen years immediately succeeding the testator's death George Crocker should for five years abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors, the bonds shall be turned over to him. Otherwise at the end of fifteen years they are to go to the other heirs, the children of C. F. Crocker, W. H. Crocker and Mrs. Alexander. The plaintiff avers that from Sept. 22, 1891, to Sept. 22, 1896, George Crocker has abstained from the use of intoxicating liquors. They desire therefore to turn over the money to him and terminate the trust, and sue the other heirs to give them an opportunity to establish in court any objection they may have to such a course.

Destructive Storm.

Denver, Col., Sept. 25.-A special from Grand Junction, Col., says: The worst storm for ten years has been ragday night. East of here, on the Denver | fell to the track. and Rio Grande railroad, there are eleven washouts within six miles. The Rio Grande Western, running west of here, is in worse condition. Military Academy Burned.

Mexico, Mo., Sept. 25 .- The Missouri Military academy burned to the ground early yesterday morning, causing a loss of \$75,000 to the buildings and a heavy loss to the students, whose personal effects were destroyed. Insurance \$37,-600. The fire broke out at 1 a. m., and the flames soon enveloped the entire building. Baldwin, the millionaire horseman in court and narrowly missed killing him, has been acquitted, on the ground of temporary insanity. The shooting occurred while the suit of Lillian Ashley against Baldwin for seduction was in progress. Emma Ashley is the plaintiff's sister, and sat behind Baldwin in court and fired a pistol at him at close range. The bullet grazed Baldwin's head, but did no further damage.

A Bubonic Plague.

Bomabay, Sept. 25 .- A serious outbreak of boubonic plague has occurred here, 300 deaths having already occurred. The baccillus of the disease is identical with that which Prof. Kitasco, the distinguished Japanese physician, discovered during the Hong Kong visitation last year.

Mining Engineers Meet.

Cripple Creek, Col., Sept. 25 .- The seventy-first meeting of the American Institution of Mining Engineers' which was begun in Denver a couple of days ago, was concluded last night. About 100 members arrived last evening. Yesterday the time was spent in visiting the principal mines of the district. In the evening the visitors were tendered a banquet by the Cripple Creek club.

The loss will reach \$200,000, mostly insured. There have been four fires in the same locality within a year, and Kory's insurance, as well as that of other places in the vicinity, was cut

ALL THINGS WERE FREE TO HE

An Indian Princess Who Saved Seat

and Earned Its Gratitude. The princess of Wales is not crampe for pocket money, and various other royal ladies have all they want spend, but the Princess Angeline w probably the only princess in the worl who never had to pay for anything o even utter the magic words "Charge it," says the New York World.

The Princess Angeline never had to pay for anything; she could buy all he soul desired-a bill was never sent her nor to her brother nor to any other member of her family, and she was only an American Indian princess.

Recently Angeline died, aged at least 100, and it is supposed considerably more. She never told her age, for the reason that she didn't know it. She was the daughter of old Chief Seattle, the gentleman after which the town of that name is called. Once Seattle was owner of all the territory along the shore of Puget sound, now in the United States. In those days the Duwamish tribe was a populous and warlike nation, and it was while the white settlers were still weak and scattered that the Princess Angeline did the work that made her able to trade on her face in the town of Seattle.

When the whites began to encroach on the Indians' hunting grounds the usual friction arose and it was not long before a conspiracy was formed to overwhelm the whites dwelling along the shores of Puget sound at one blow. The Princess Angeline had been kindly treated by the settlers and at the risk of her life set out to the hamlet of Seattle to warn them of their danger.

The white men, thus prepared, armed themselves for an attack and had no difficulty in repelling their savage foes. They realized the danger they had so narrowly escaped, however, and were properly grateful to the Indian woman, which was a bit odd. The citizens of Seattle in a body offered to build her a house and support her in what an Indian would consider luxury for the rest of her life. But she preferred the free life of the wilderness and went back to her people. Nevertheless she accepted the freedom of the city of Seattle, and orders were left at all the shops that she should have whatever she took a fancy to, no matter what the cost might be. richest men of the town stood ready to defray the bills.

Thus the Princess Angeline gradually became a public character and a living monument to what is said to be extremely rare—the gratitude of a city.

Her face was familiar to every one in the northwest. It was stamped on spoons, used for advertising purposes and on every article in the nature of During the last few weeks of her life she suffered greatly, but would submit to no medical treatment. She fought so desperately when an attempt was
