### SCHOONER WRECKED.

OUT OF A CREW OF SEVEN BUT ONE IS SAVED.

It Had Anchored, but the Gale was so Great that it Dragged the Auchor and was Beat to Pieces-The Vessel and Cargo a Total Loss.

Muskegon, Mich., Nov. 9. - The schooner Wankesha went to pieces off this port yesterday morning. Five men were drowned and one rescued. The vessel and cargo are a total loss.

The Waukesha broke up while trying to ride out the gale at anchor near here Saturday night, and only one survivor of her crew of seven has been reacued. He is still too weak to talk. The vessel had a load of salt and apples, which were taken on at Manistee Saturday morning. At 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon she was sighted running with the gale under a torn mainsail. An attempt was made to enter Muskegon harbor, but the schooner drifted a mile south of the piers and then anchor was dropped. She was riding three-quarters of a mile from shore at dark. The engineer and fireman of the city pumping station watched the lights until 9 o'clock Saturday night, when they disappeared. Shortly afterwards wreckage began coming in and yesterday nothing could be seen of the lost boat above the water where she anchored

The names of the dead cannot be learned, as nothing about the clothing will identify them. The surviving sailor was washed ashore unconscious and nothing can be learned from him. The Waukesha is one of the old fleet of "Canalers," and true to all tradition, she has taken almost her entire crew down with her in her last disaster. She was owned by F. H. Head of Chicago, and was formerly known as the Nabob. She was built in Manitowoc in 1864 and rated 295 tons. She had a valuation of \$2500, and was given an insurance rating of BL She had been engaged in the salt trade between Ludington and Manistee and Chicago for Joy, Morton & Co., all senson.

This evening Frank Delach, the only survivor of the wreck, made affidavit to the effect that there were seven men aboard the Waukesha-Captain Duncan Corbett, the mate, four seamen and a colored cook. When they arrived off Muskegon, Delach said the captain, nate and some of the sailors were very They signaled for a tug but owed no distress signals, and no tug. under these circumstances, started out in the heavy sea. The captain anchored a mile south of Muskegon harbor. The craft began leaking badly, but the aptain refused to light the torch to make known their condition to the lifesaving crew. The crew donned lifepreservers, their yawl boat having infirmary and military stores were also of the collar; my falling on the foot n washed away. They let go the large anchor cable and the schooner trifted towards shore somewhat, with he smaller anchor dragging gradually. ill hands taking to the forward riging. 
