## Modern Doll Must **Boast Versatility**

The toymaker who comes up with something totally new may find himself with a real "bonanza" at Christmas time. He may also hit the holiday jackpot with some unique improvement in a long-time standard. The doll is a classical example. You don't have to have the prettiest doll, nor the largest - just have one that can "do more" than any other on the market.

For example, a doll just isn't in the popularity race unless it must be the best-dressed, with brush, along with the picture countless ensembles for every- board. thing from beach wear to formal attire, with an appropriate wig for every occasion.

Mechanical ability is important. Some dolls do the twist. One speaks more than two hundred words in seven different lan-guages, by virtue of small phono-graph discs inside. Another has hair that can be washed, set, and combed in suitable style. A control mechanism permits hair



Here are some safety point-

1. Cord sets should have the Underwriters Laboratories approval. Rubber washers will keep tinsel out of sockets.

Check last year's lighting sets for frayed cords, exposed wires, chipped sockets and loose plugs. If disorders are found, either repair them or discard the sets.

2. Metallic reflectors for bulbs can cause a short; styrene plastic ones are safer. Insulated staples are best to secure lights strung around a molding or door frame.

3. Candles are taboo near might be brushed across the flame. Neither should they be used around greens, which, as they dry out, become resin-filled torches.

4. A tree that is kept damp is safer. The tree-holder should have a water well, and it should be filled every day. If it's a very large tree, split the electric load by plugging lights into two different outlets.

5. Anchor the tree securely a safe distance away from the heating unit. Trim it from the top down. Place the lights first (after uncurling kinks in the cord) so they may be out of the way of other ornaments.

6. Arrangements for tables, mantels, or buffets, may combine various materials with lights. Whenever you pair paper, cardboard or fabric with lights, leave an air-hole for heat to escape.

Card styles have changed, but no one has improved upon the message inscribed on what is generally conceded to be the first Christmas card. The message, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You," has become a universal greeting.

Known as the Cole-Horsley card, the "first" card is in a private collection, the Hall-mark Historical Collection, in Kansas City, Missouri. The card is named for Sir Henry Cole and John Calcott Horsley. Sir Henry, director of the Vic-toria and Albert Museum, commissioned Horsley, a noted London artist, 'to design the card, which first appeared in print in 1843.

The card is composed of three panels. The center panel portrays a family at Christmas dinner, the other two panels illustrate the Christian virtue of feeding the hungry and clothing the needy.



RALLY ROUND . . . . The Wassail Bowl, however filled, is a traditional gathering spot during the holiday season. The greeting 'Waes Hael" as extended by medieval Saxons meant "Your Health". The term eventually applied not only to the greeting but as well the concoction which filled the Wassail Bowl.

SPOOKING SPIRITS In earlier times, Polish peasants "drove" spirits away from their crops during the 12 days between Christmas and Epiphany. They burned pine resin all night to rout witches from their homes, and on Christmas Eve, they wrapped cloth around the base of trees to keep spirits out, and fired shots into fields to prevent supernatural beings from harming the land.

Christopher Columbus is generally considered to have been the first white man to celebrate New Year's day in the western hemisphere. Columbus enjoyed a sumptuous meal with two monarchs on the island of Haiti, January 1, 1493, when his ships pulled in for repairs.




#### EASY EGGNOG
