About fifty of the Stanley rangers have arrived at Denison on a thirty-day furlough.

The president inspected Fort Meyer, Va., and was pleased with the manner in which it is conducted.

Rev. A. B. Morrison, chaplain of Roosevelt's rough riders, and Miss Elma Boyd of Anthony, Fla., were married at Ocala, Fla.

Gen. W. H. Jackson of Nashville. Tenn., who was tendered a place on the committee to investigate the reports affecting the army, has declined the appointement.

The navy department has ordered 400 sailors to be sent to Admiral Dewey's squadron at Manila. The men will be sent from San Francisco on a merchant steamer.

He is Very Indignant Because Great Britain Has Obtained Possession of Some Chinese Secrets.

Russians Incensed

London, Sept. 26 .- A special dispatch from Shanghai says that Kang dispatch also says that Sir Claude MacDonald, the British minister, gave instructions that Kang Yu Wei should be protected from arrest. The British consulate holds his baggage and documents referring to state secrets.

The Russians are incensed at the latter fact, and it is reported that Russia has offered the dowager empress the services of 10,000 troops from Port Arthur to keep order in Pekin if necessary.

It is stated that the British fleet in Chines waters has been divided between Taku and Shangaikwan under in the event of an attempt to land troops. A Shanghai correspondent tele-

On the arrival of Kang Yu Wei at Wu Hun he was placed for safety on board the steamer Ballcrat, which sails for Hong Kong at once. In the course of an interview yesterday he informed me that he left Pekin on Tuesday in compliance with a secret message from the emperor warning him of the danger and urging him to obtain assistance from those interested in the country's welfare. He further stated that recent events were entirely due to the action of the Manpress and Viceroy Yung Lu and including all the high Manchu officials. The latter were displeased by the emgency of the dowager.

The reports seem to bear all the evidences of truth. I don't think it possible that there can be any other than the usual local causes of sickness in Manila and that vicinity at this time of the year."

Houses Inspected.

Jackson, Miss., Sept. 26 .- A partial house-to-house inspection of the original infected district of the city was made yesterday. About 125 houses were examined and no trace of fever found. The number of people left in the city is hardly enough for a respect able epidemic, and the reports of the inspectors has caused a very cheerful feeling among those who remain. A curfew ordinance requiring everybody to be in thei rhouses at 9 o'clock at night has been passed, and with the ten-mile cordon now surrounding the town the board of health is hopeful of checking a further spread. A simple Test.

Here is a simple test for the presence of sewage in water. All drinking water should be tested, in town or country, frequently, as there are other impurities besides sewage which are quite as deadly, and every cistern of water is liable to be a source of bloodpoisoning. Mice, rats and other pests must have water, and many a case of typhoid is set up by such as these falling into the cistern and remaining there for months in a decomposed state. To detect this impure condition is very simple and unfailing. Draw a tumbler of water from the tap at night, put a piece of white lump sugar into it and place it on the kitchen mantel shelf, or anywhere that the temperature will not be under 60 degrees Fahrenheit. In the morning the water, if pure, will be perfectly clear; if contaminated by sewage or other impurities the water will be milky. This is a simple and safe test well known in chemistry.

A Shaved Cat.

Arrive at Dallas.

Dalles, Tex., Sept. 24 .- The first train of the four which brought the second regiment of Texas volunteers back from Florida rolled into Dallas before daylight yesterday morning. It was composed of freight cars and Pullman sleepers. The freight cars carried the camp equipments and the sleepers contained, besides the sick of the regiment, a detachment from each company who had been detaied to prepare the grounds for the camp.

The ambulance belonging to Parkland hospital was at the depot to carry the sick.

A wreck delayed the other trains sev. eral hours and it was not until 2:30 o'clock that the train carrying Col. L. M. Openheimer and staff and companies E. K. M and G arrived. When the train stopped at the fair grounds the crowd which had assembled to welcome the soldiers saw, scrawled in chalk upon the sides of the cars, "Flagler's Improvement company." As the men filed out the Dallas artillery company fired a salute in honor of Col. Openheimer. They quickly formed in line and, led by the regimental band, John L. Bennet trumpeter, and Col. Openheimer and staff, the companies marched to the grounds. The third arrived at 5 o'clock and the fourth, and last, train stopped at the fair grounds just before dark. The companies now on the grounds are A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, K, L and M, making in all about 1250 men.

Col. L. M. Openheimer's staff is as follows: Lieut. Col. J. A. Styron, commanding second battalion; Maj. B. B. Buck, commanding second battalion; Maj. E. A. Stuart, commanding third battalion; battalion and regimenadjutant, F. J. Badger; quartertal master, R. L. Robertson; major and surgeon, D. L. Peeples; first lieutenant and assistant surgeon, T. J. Jackson. Maj. B. B. Buck did not accompany the regiment. He was detained at Jacksonville by sickness in his family. Dr. W. B. McLaughlin, one of the surgeons of the staff, was assigned to hospital duty at Jacksonville. He will not come to Dallas, but Maj. Buck is expected in a few days.

The regiment, privates and all, traveled in Pullman sleeping cars. This, it is said, is the first time that the government has ever transported an entire regiment in this manner. The trip was made in very fair time, considering the distance traveled, and the men arrived here in good condition. Many of the invalids-there were twenty-five or thirty in all-were very, very sick men. Some of them had to

Fight on Mallory Wharf.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 23 .- Blood has again been shed on the Mallory wharf. There has been an ominous quiet there for several days past, and but six policemen were on guard duty.

At 11:15 o'clock last night a mob of about forty or fifty colored men made a sortie, forcing their way past the two sentinels at the western end of the front shed and effected an entrancé through the rear door .

The two policemen guarding the central front of the shed ran in, but were covered by the guns of the mob. The mob then opened fire on the Houston colored men, who had knocked off work for the night and had gone to sleep in this shed. The pursued men soon got to cover behind the many boxes and barrels and the mobbers emptied their pistols without inflicting any more serious injury than a scalp wound on the head of one man. Some fifteen minutes after the shooting a Galveston colored man was found in an apparently dying condition west of the shed. It is believed that he was accidentally shot by some of his comrades. He wore a white handkerchief over his face and had a 44-caliber pistol on his person. Three of the chambers had been freshly discharged. He died on the way to the hospital.

Officers Hury and Smith made the following statement: "We were at the center door in front of the shed when the watchman rushed from behind the west end of the shed and yelled 'Go to the back.' We ran in the shed and were covered by six or eight men wearing masks and armed with sixshooters. Others were crowding in the door and in a moment there were thirty or forty masked men there. They said: 'Officers, stand back.' We were powerless to do anything against such an overwhelming force.

"The men then opened fire on the Houston colored men who were sleeping in the west end of the shed. They must have fired 100 shots, but the Houston men got to cover behind the boxes and barrels. When the mob had exhausted their pistols they went out the back door and ran off to the east. We went outside and all the officers opened fire on them as they ran."

Andrew Thomas, the colored man who brought the gang from Houston to work on the Mallory dock, was at first reported missing, but this was a mistake. Shortly after the shooting he was found in the back part of the shed putting on his shirt. He did not seem alarmed, and was trying to calm some of the men who were showing marked signs of trepidation. Thomas as to whether her permit entitied her and others of the colored men declared to carry the number of passengers she that they were able and willing to go protect themselves if they were permitted to carry arms. "Oh," said one of the number, "they would not allow us to carry a match,"referring to the arrest of one of his companions on last Tuesday for carrying a pistol and to the fine of \$25 imposed upon him. Thomas was quite anxious to know what protection was going to be afforded, and he seems anxious that the police should let him and his men have guns. Thomas is inclined to the theory that the mob fired blank cartridges, but it was plain to be seen that he was trying to calm the younger and more fearful members of his party. Huntsville, Tex., Sept. 22 .- Promptly at 9 o'clock yesterday the opening exercises of the twentieth session of the Sam Houston normal began in the chapel. The exercises opened with song, which was followed by prayer. Superintendent Pritchett then made his opening address in which all matters pertaining to the normal work were fully explained. The students were classified to the best advantage possible, though this will be made more perfect in the next few days. There were 367 in attendance at the opening, the largest enrollment at opening in the history of the school, and all things promise good work at the Sam Houston normal this year. Two hundred more students could be accommodated.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 22 .- The barge A. C. H. of the Houston Direct Navigation company capsized in Galveston bay yesterday, dumping 1000 bales of cotton into the water.
