If he drives scrub horses and mutes, his farming is done on the scrub plan and he will raise scrub colts, because he will breed scrub mares to the cheapest stallion, with no regard to improvement; only the color must suit his taste, but he cares nothing for size and quality that go to make up the market requirements; he cares nothing for the market-he does not breed to suit the market, but to suit himself, and never has a good horse to sell. An exchange says one who is not a plug farmer should be ashamed of a plug team. Let him raise his own horses and do it to some purpose. He will be silly to breed his large mares to anything short of a pure bred draft stallion. Horses of a good class will do far more work, and the rearing of them will cost no more than will that of poor ones.
