MeKinley received from the American peace commission Saturday the rreaty of peace between the United
Statee and Spain. In presenting the statee and Spain. In presenting th chairman of the commission, said it
represented the earnest efforts of tha American representatives at Paris and that it was submitted with the hope that it would redound to the peace
credit, and glory of the American na tion. Accepting the treaty from th hands of Judge Day, the president re sponded with heartfelt thanks and copr
gratulations to the commission gratulations to the commission as
body and the members Indivifually pllshed and of the happy method by which diffeult questlons had been ad justed. The formal ceremony, of de
ivvering the treaty to the president oc curred in the blue room and lasted
half an hour. The commission arrived here from New York on a special traln
