## DISD eyes new curriculum

## District winners named

Raymond Annen, Dona Hendrickson and Carolyn Sides were the major winners in the Running Water Conservation District's annual awards banquet Friday evening.

Annen was announced as the Conservation Farmer of the Year; Mrs. Hendrickson won the award as the Conservation Teacher of the Year; and Mrs. Sides was named the Conservation Homemaker of the Year.

Also, the Castro County News won a special Communications Award for its coverage of conservation programs and activities during the year.

Winners of the district's annual conservation essay and poster contests for students also were announced at Friday night's banquet in the County Expo Building. Essay winners were Joyce Schilling, first; Joel Birkenfeld, second; and Jackie Spinhirne, third. Poster winners were Laura Lee Acker, first; Bernadette Hochstein, second; and Beth Sams, third.

Annen, who started farming east of Dimmitt more than a half-century ago with four mules and a one-row lister, was cited by District Conservationist Gary Rainwater as "a firm believer in sound farming."

Through a long-range conservation program that he's still carrying out, Annen has been able to reverse the erosion damage that stemmed from the common early-day practice of maximum tillage.

"Like many farmers of the late '30s and the war years, Raymond at first followed the path of production on all his land," Rainwater said. "He plowed under too much of the

marginal land and put it into crops. As a result of this, he, like many other farmers, started losing soil to wind and water erosion."

After consulting with Running Water SWCD directors and SCS specialists, Annen started restoring the marginal land on his farm by planting native grasses and soil-holding pasture grasses — bluestem, switchgrass, sideoats grama, bromegrass, blue grama and buffalo grass. "Proper grazing use and timely rest on (his planned pastures) have caused them to improve greatly," Rainwater reported.

Annen's 640-acre farm now consists of 385 acres of cropland and 255 acres of rangeland. He has "a sound conservation cropping system" that includes wheat, sugarbeets and milo, and also runs a cow-calf operation with a herd of 30 animal units, Rainwater noted.

After getting his marginal land in shape, Annen started terracing his cropland to control further erosion. With the help of the Soil Conservation Service here, he has installed 6,000 feet of gradient terraces and 10,000 feet of parallel terraces, with an additional 9,000 feet of terracing scheduled for this year. He also leaves crop residue on or near the soil surface until the seedbed is prepared for the next crop.

"Raymond is a strong backer of conservation," Rainwater said. "According to him, 'We can look back now and see all the mistakes that have been made, and must go forward and make sure these are corrected and never allowed to happen

again.'"

Mrs. Hendrickson was chosen as the Conservation Teacher of the Year "because of her intense dedication in the education of her students in the field of soil and water conservation," Rainwater explained.

She teaches life science to a class of seventh graders and earth science to five classes of eighth graders in Dimmitt Middle School.

"Dona has stated that her science books do not have an

entire chapter covering soils," Rainwater said. "She has requested help from the Running Water District on programs relating to soils," he said, "and makes sure that her students have a thorough knowledge of soil and water conservation and what it really means."

Mrs. Hendrickson also conducts labs so her students can conduct soil tests, work with soil and learn its basic principles.

## Man critically burned in home fire Tuesday

Dr. John Douglas Damron, a veteran school administrator, was critically burned early Tuesday morning in an explosion at his home in Flagg.

The explosion, which occurred shortly before 4 a.m., set off a fire that destroyed the two-bedroom frame home by the time the Castro County Fire Dept. could get to the scene.

Dr. Damron reportedly was attempting to light a bathroom heater when the explosion occurred. Despite his burns, he walked to the nearby home of his nephew, Clyde H. Damron Jr. His nephew turned in the fire alarm, then rushed Dr. Damron to Plains Memorial Hospital.

The burn victim was transferred from here to an Amarillo hospital, then was flown to the Parkland Hospital Burn Treatment Center in Dallas.

Dr. Damron was reported to be in critical but stable condi-

tion Wednesday morning, with second and third degree burns over 65% of his body.

The fire alarm was turned in at 3:57 a.m., and by the time firemen arrived at the home — which is eight miles south and four miles west of Dimmitt — the house was engulfed in flames, with the roof caved in and the walls collapsing. Firemen extinguished the blaze within an hour, but the home was destroyed.

Dr. Damron had been living in the house just a few weeks, relatives said.

A 1946 graduate of Dimmitt High School, Dr. Damron is the son of Clyde T. Damron of Dimmitt. He holds a PhD degree in educational administration, and has served as superintendent of schools in Tulia and Pampa. He most recently was employed by the US Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare in Dallas as an educational supervisor.

The Dimmitt School Board got its first look Monday night at the new core curriculum that is being proposed for all public schools in the state.

Supt. Robert Ryan said the new curriculum proposals — which basically would require more English, math and science in high school and a drastic change in junior high social studies — can be met by the Dimmitt Independent School District but "would work a hardship on districts smaller than ours."

A new state law — House Bill 246, adopted by the 67th Legislature — repeals all previous laws on required subjects for public schools and establishes 12 subject areas for a "balanced curriculum" from kindergarten through grade 12.

The new curriculum is scheduled to go into effect in the fall of 1984.

The State Board of Education has been working with advisory committees drawn from 200 school districts to draft specific curriculum proposals that will meet the requirements of the new state law. These proposals have now been distributed to the state's school districts, and there will be discussion workshops, reviews and public hearings throughout the state before the adoption of a new state curriculum.

Local school officials will attend a workshop on the new curriculum plan May 4 at the Panhandle Region Education Service Center in Amarillo.

"I'm sure that the coming months will bring some interesting comments on these new proposals," Ryan told the school board. "The smaller school districts are already organizing."

He said many smaller districts will have trouble finding and paying the additional teachers (especially science teachers) that the proposed new curriculum would require.

Fred Bruegel Jr., Deanne Clark and Stanley Nelson took the oath of office for new three-year terms Monday night following the board's canvass of Saturday's election results.

Then the board re-elected Charles Wales as president, Bruegel as vice-president and Mrs. Clark as board secretary for the coming year.

The board adjusted this year's school calendar to [Continued on Page 15]

The Farmers Home Administration has run out of money for operating loans in 17 states, including Texas, but area FmHA officials said the shortages will have little impact in Castro County.

"We're out of operating loan funds," said Clinton Kennedy, district director of FmHA in Plainview, "but most people have gotten their loans through. A few may be caught by this."

"Basically in Castro County and our district, there may and probably will be a few people affected, but by and large most people have gotten their loans through," he said.

Kennedy said that FmHA's guaranteed loan funds are not exhausted and that some people are eligible for emergency loan funds. These two types of FmHA loans are still available to farmers who qualify.

The FmHA operating Loan funds are appropriated by Congress each year, Kennedy said. "Congress determines the amount appropriated to each state. Seventeen states are out of money, but the others still have funds," he said.

"There is the possibility of some of those states not needing all of their appropriated money, and possibly we can transfer some of that money," he said.

By April 1 the FmHA already had spent the \$652 million allocated for operating loans in the 17 states, and

needs an additional \$71.5 million to finance current outstanding loan obligations, according to FmHA agency spokesman Marlyn Aycock.

"The operating or production lending season is just about over in most parts of the country," Aycock said. "For the most part they've been in to get their loans, but in some cases, farmers may still be without their money, even though their loans have been approved."

"We hope that for any loan that's been approved but not obligated, that we'll be able to take care of them," Aycock said.

Kennedy said that in our area, "if a loan has been approved for the full amount, those funds have been set aside and obligated."

"Most farmers have already received their first loan check," Kennedy said, "and this doesn't mean he won't get his second and third checks."

On a local level, Assistant Castro County FmHA supervisor Dean Sanders said, "There will be very few people actually affected by this thing. The money is just out on the operating loan and actually I don't expect anyone in Castro County to be affected."

"A majority of our borrowers are under the emergency program," Sanders said. "That will not be affected. And there are other ways loans can be worked (guaranteed loans) in conjunction with the bank."

## Commissioners accept multi-peril coverage

Monday commissioners accepted a bid from Keith Lowe's Insurance Agency for the county's multi-peril and liability coverage.

Lowe's bid of \$18,752 for one year's coverage was accepted by commissioners over three other bids. The coverage will be renewable for three years.

Other agencies and their bids were: W. T. Sanders Agency, \$22,258; Smith Agency, \$21,959; and Jones-Rawlings Agency, \$21,430.66.

Commissioners voted to split the cost with the city for the purchase of a used truck for the Castro County Fire Fighters Assn.

Representatives of the Fire Fighters Assn. met with commissioners and ask them to put up half (about \$3,500) the price for a 1978 one-ton Chevy truck. They plan to make a rescue vehicle out of the truck. The Fire Fighters presently have all their emergency rescue equipment in a Suburban, and they said it is overloaded, and dangerous to drive.

The Fire Fighters Assn. will use \$1,100 out of their budget in the county fund (\$4,933) to send three men to a rescue school May 21-22.

Laura Reyes, a secretary in the County Clerks Office, met with commissioners to ask for extra compensation for translating for offices other than the Clerks office.

"I have been having to translate for other offices," she said, "and I think it is unfair that I don't get extra pay."

County Judge Polly Simpson said she would check the legality of the matter, "whether the county can

legally pay her extra for translating," and commissioners will discuss the matter later.

Commissioners passed a motion to write a resolution opposing the dumping of nuclear waste in Castro County or any surrounding counties.

Two representatives of American Public Life Insurance met with commissioners and discussed their health insurance program which included cancer coverage, diseases, and family life insurance. The two representatives will meet with county employees to discuss the policy, and employees can decide whether they wish to sign up for the coverage.

County attorney Jimmy Davis presented to commissioners a report from the salary grievance committee. The committee recommended that commissioners not grant Justice of the Peace Marshall Young's request for an increase in salary to cover travel expenses. The committee recommended that the commissioners continue to follow [Continued on Page 13]

The Hart High School Band rated a III in concert and a IV in sightreading.


Other sweepstakes winners included Littlefield, Olton, Hale Center, Friona, Anton and Sudan.

## News wins press awards

The Castro County News has been ranked No. 1 among the Texas Panhandle's weekly newspapers in agricultural news reporting and sports photography.

The News also won a second-place plaque for sportswriting, a third-place plaque for spot news photo and honorable mention for best use of photography in the annual Panhandle Press Association Contest.

The PPA includes 88 daily, weekly and semi-weekly newspapers in North Texas.

Award-winning newspapers were announced at the annual PPA Awards Breakfast Saturday morning, during the organization's 1983 convention at Amarillo's Holiday Inn.

This is the second year in a row for the News to win the Panhandle's first-place plaque for sports photography.

The News's entries, taken from issues published during calendar year 1982, included an action photo from the Dimmitt Bobcats' state championship game, a "final buzzer" photo taken when the Nazareth Swiftettes captured their sixth consecutive state basketball championship, and a bareback bronc-riding picture taken during the annual Nazareth Country Rodeo & Wild West Show.

The agricultural news reporting category was new in the PPA contest this year. The News submitted a cross-section of its 1982 agricultural

stories, including crop progress reports, coverage of the Texas Corn Growers Association convention and projects, and stories originating from county, state and federal sources. The News's entry also included a "scoop" in the Dec. 2 issue on the forthcoming announcement of the federal government's Payment in Kind (PIK) Program.

"Sheer weight of superior articles put this paper at the top of the class," the judges commented. "And you have to mention the variety of stories. Truly outstanding."

The News's sportswriting entries included a "color" story headed "Bobcats Are State Champions," a championship basketball game story

headed "Ask Phil King What's New," and a pregame story headed "Swiftettes to Meet Krum Today in State Tourney."

The spot news photo entered by the News was entitled "Edge of the Storm" and showed a pickup coming from wet pavement onto dry pavement along FM 3215 south of Dimmitt.

In the Use of Photography contest, the News submitted its DHS graduation issue, which featured photos of graduating seniors and student award winners in band, choir, athletics, academics and scholarships, plus two other issues showing the News's general use of photography in reporting the news.



## Social Security ...in Castro County

By **TERRY J. CLEMENTS**

The celebrity with a somber tone explained that Medicare pays less than half of one's medical bills. He continued the television commercial by recommending that the viewers call toll-free for information about the medical plan endorsed by him.

It is true that Medicare, like most medical plans, will not cover all costs. However, a person considering additional coverage probably will need more of an explanation about Medicare than provided by the gentleman in the commercial. First, Medicare consists of two parts. Part A is a hospital insurance plan while Part B is designed to help pay for other medical expenses.

Hospital insurance (part A) has a \$304.00 deductible for the first 60 days that a beneficiary is a patient in the hospital. This deductible has to be paid for each hospital stay in which more than two months have elapsed since the previous stay. Part A covers services for a beneficiary while in the hospital such as semi-private room, meals, special care units, drugs, blood transfusions, lab tests, X-rays and radiology, medical supplies, operating and recovery room, anesthesia and rehabilitation therapy.

Medicare will not pay for personal convenience items such as TV or radio. Private rooms are covered if medically necessary. After 60 days in the hospital, Medicare pays all covered services except \$65.00 per day. When the hospital stay is over 90 days, Medicare will only pay if the patient draws upon a "lifetime reserve" that is available to each beneficiary.

Part B, the medical insurance plan, pays 80% of approved charges. The plan has a yearly deductible of \$75.00. Part B of Medicare helps pay for medical and surgical services, diagnostic tests, X-rays, drugs that cannot be self-administered, transfusions, medical supplies and physical therapy.

Medicare will not pay for routine physical exams, routine foot care, eye or hearing exams for glasses or hearing

aids, immunizations, or cosmetic surgery.

The amount of approved charges is determined by a yearly study. Claims are handled by an organization known as the carrier. Each year, the carrier reviews the actual charges by physicians for the previous year in the respective geographical area. The carrier, from this review, determines the "customary" and "prevailing" charges.

The customary charge is the amount most frequently charged by physicians and suppliers for each type of service. The prevailing charge is the amount high enough to cover the customary charges in three out of every four bills submitted in the previous year. When a claim is filed, Medicare will pay 80% of the customary or prevailing charge, whichever is lower.

# Cotton growers to meet April 22

Three more speakers have been added to the program for the 26th annual meeting of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., to be held at 1 p.m. April 22 in the Banquet Hall of Lubbock's Memorial Civic Center.

Nineteenth District Congressman Kent Hance of Lubbock, announced last week as the principal speaker, will be joined on the podium by State Senator John Montford; Ed Breihan, immediate past president of the National Cotton Council and current general manager of Plains Coopera-

tive Oil Mill, Lubbock; and Nick Hahn, Executive Vice President of Cotton Incorporated.

Each of the speakers, according to PCG President Tommy Fondren, has been asked to present the view from his particular area of expertise on the meeting's general theme, "Research, Promotion and Politics that Determine Cotton's Destiny."

Hance is a member of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, Fondren notes, a position from which he is able to have more than a little influence on federal legislation and on administrative decisions affecting PCG producer and allied industry members.

Senator Montford, as a member of the State Committee on Natural Resources and vice chairman of the Subcommittee on Water, is expected to review and assess his own and other efforts to develop and implement a Texas water plan. Montford is also a member of the State Education Committee and the Committee on Jurisprudence. The final speaker, Hahn, heads up the nationwide producers' research and marketing company, Cotton Incorporated, into which producers put by far the biggest portion of their annual investment in research and market development. And, Fondren says, "that fact should make every producer want to hear his outline of CI achievements and plans for future activities."

The PCG program also includes the annual President's and Executive Vice President's reports to the membership, highlighting PCG's contribution to research, promotion and services aimed at promoting and protecting the specific interests of producers in the organization's 25 High Plains counties.

Concluding the day's activities for PCG will be a meeting of the 50-man Board of Directors at which 1983-84 officers will be elected. Current officers, in addition to Fondren, are Vice President Gerald Caswell of Brownfield, Bennie Claunch of Bula, Secretary-Treasurer, and Gary Ivey of Ralls, Chairman of the Board. # IH announces new purchase program

"We are initiating a 'Crop Swap' program that makes it easy for our customers to purchase new equipment at prices that never will be more


The program includes contact with major trading companies which allows the farmer to make an assignment of his corn, sorghum, wheat or cotton for delivery at a future date in return for cash that can apply toward the purchase of the equipment.

Hays said all the farmer needs to do to participate in "Crop Swap" is to come to the dealership and select the equipment he needs, taking advantage of current low machinery prices and incentive programs such as low-rate financing or elimination of finance charges for a designated period.

Once the selection is made and the customer's PIK entitlement is verified, the IH dealer calls a commodity trader. After the Customer and the trader agree on the transaction, the trader, at the customer's request, sends a check for the amount of the equipment purchase to the dealer. Any difference between the amount of the equipment purchase and the PIK entitlement will be paid to the farmer by the commodity trader.

If the farmer needs operating cash, he may choose to receive 90% of the value of his crop immediately and the remaining 10% upon delivery. The equipment buyer can apply investment tax credit and depreciation allowance for new equipment when figuring taxes for 1983.

"Crop Swap is one of the most innovative and best farm management tools available to help the farmer buy equipment that will assist him in making this year more efficient and more profitable," Hays said.



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
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


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## 'Mr. B' takes play to region

Admission for the jam session will be \$1 per person, and prizes will be awarded. All area musicians are invited to attend.

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

# Schilling sisters help lead Nazareth to District title

Dimmitt's Kevin Cleveland and Jeff Watts scored 16 points apiece to pace the North All-Stars Saturday night in the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches A-AAA All-Star Game in Waco.

But despite the Dimmitt lads' sterling performances, the South All-Stars won the showcase game, 86-80. It was the first loss this year for Cleveland and Watts, who went into the game off the state's only undefeated team.

The 5-10 Cleveland — one of the smallest players on the floor — received the North's Most Valuable Player award.

Watts, who tied Cleveland for high-scoring honors on the North squad, sank 10 points in the second half to pace a North comeback. He inter-

cepted a pass and drove the length of the court for a basket to cut the South's lead to two points (80-78) with 18 seconds left. But the South sank six free throws in the waning seconds to seal the 86-80 victory.

Cleveland and Watts "played better than anybody down there," in the opinion of their coach, Ken Cleveland.

"I may be prejudiced, but I'm right," the coach said. "They just fit in real well with everybody else, and played their game like they're capable of playing."

Dimmitt was the only school to have two players on an all-star team at the annual TABC clinic.

The South All-Stars' superior jumping ability made the difference in the game, Coach Cleveland said.

"They'd get two or three shots a lot of times and kept the North from getting a lot of second shots," the coach said.

"They blocked Jeff's first three shots, but he adjusted to the situation and started getting his shots. He's a smart player, you know," Cleveland said. "And he got fouled a lot — he got eight of his points on free throws."

Although the towering South squad rejected a lot of North shots during the game, they didn't get a hand on any of the slippery Cleveland's aeriels.

"Kevin hit seven field goals and played a good, solid game," his dad said. "He didn't have his hands on the ball as much as he was used to, but when he did he made some good shots and good passes."

Cleveland sank the game's final basket, a 30-footer at the buzzer.

The TABC all-star games drew college coaches from throughout the US. Among the speakers at the clinic were John Thompson, head coach at Georgetown, and Sam Jones, former all-pro player with the Boston Celtics.

Coach Cleveland also spoke during a session featuring the state championship coaches.

"Those all-star games are an education for the kids," Coach Cleveland said. "Our boys really enjoyed it. They said the other boys were all good guys, outgoing and friendly. It was the best playing the best, and they had a great time."

"I think I did all right — in fact, I'm real proud," Kevin Cleveland said after the game. "It's so much different here, but I proved to myself that I could play against good competition."

He added that he was "kind of surprised . . . but sure happy" to receive the North's MVP award.

Watts said the North All-Stars relaxed "and played more like a team" in the second half. That teamwork almost made up for the South's superior jumping ability.

## VETERAN'S SERVICES

Unemployed or underemployed Vietnam-era veterans may be eligible for an extension of their educational benefits, advises the director of the Waco VARO office.

He pointed out that modification of educational assistance legislation provides for the extension of the 10-year education eligibility period for certain veterans who may wish to pursue further vocational, apprenticeship, on-the-job training or a high school diploma. The Vietnam era was August 5, 1964 - May 7, 1975.

"The benefit extension is aimed at putting unemployed and underemployed veterans into training or educational programs that will give them marketable skills so they can re-enter the work force," he stressed.

To qualify for the extension, a veteran must have been unemployed or underemployed for six months, and in need of additional training or education to obtain a more stable job.



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
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# Rites are held for Mrs. Garrison

make up for the two school days missed during the state boys' basketball tournament. The school year will end Friday, May 27, instead of Wednesday, May 25 as originally scheduled.

With the approval of the Texas Education Agency, the board voted not to make up the school day that was called off Jan. 21 due to snow.

These revisions will delay the end of school two days but will shorten the number of instruction days from 175 to 174.

The board also adopted next year's school calendar. The 1983-84 school year will begin with in-service for teachers Aug. 22-24, and classes will start Thursday, Aug. 25. Student holidays will be Monday, Sept. 5 (Labor Day), Nov. 24-25 (Thanksgiving), Dec. 22-Jan. 2 (Christmas and New Year's), March 12-16 (spring break) and April 20 (Good Friday). Teachers' in-service days will be Aug. 22-24; Monday, Sept. 26; Monday, Oct. 24; Friday, Jan. 13; Friday, Feb. 17; and Friday, March 30.

The final day of school next year will be Friday, May 25. In executive session, the board accepted the retirement resignations of three veteran

Dimmitt teachers — Avis and Ralph Smith and Loranell Hamilton. The board also accepted the resignation of vo-ag teacher Larry Gray, who reportedly is going into private business.

Acting as the fiscal agent for the Castro County Plan A Cooperative, the board approved the hiring of Kay Gfeller, Kelly Reed and Demaris Trotter to serve in the Hart ISD, and Paralyne Moore to serve in the Nazareth ISD. Reed is a speech therapist and Gfeller, Trotter and Moore are all Plan A resource teachers.

In other action, the board: —Approved the sale of two school buses — a 1971 International and a 1972 Ford — at a forthcoming bus auction in Abilene, and authorized the purchase of a new 71-passenger bus to be delivered next fall.

## Hartman ends career at UT

Cheryl Hartman, who led Nazareth High School to back-to-back state championships in basketball in 1977 and 1978, ended a successful cage career this season at the University of Texas.

A 6-1 senior center, Hartman led the Southwest Conference champion Longhorns to a 30-3 record and the finals of the NCAA Midwest Regional Tournament. Hartman alternated starting assignments at one center position with fellow senior and captain Joy Williams this season, and averaged 6.2 points and 3.8 rebounds. She hit 54.1% of her field goal attempts — second best on the team — and scored a season-high of 14 points Feb. 5 against TCU. She also grabbed a season-high of 12 rebounds March 17 during the Horns' NCAA National tournament opener against Louisville.

Hartman is now 11th on Texas' all-time scoring list with 1,078 points and a career average of 7.6. She also is sixth on the UT career rebounding list with 695 and an average of 5.3 per game, and her 52.5% career field goal accuracy is third-best among all UT players.

Hartman served as team captain during 1982-83, her fifth season at Texas. She incurred a knee injury in the

fall of 1981 which eventually required surgery, and received a redshirt season in 1981-82.

The Longhorns' three losses this year were the fewest ever in a single season. Texas also notched its fifth 30-win season in the last seven years and was one game from reaching the prestigious NCAA Final Four before being defeated by eventual NCAA runner-up, Louisiana Tech, in the final of the NCAA Midwest Regional.

Conrad, Texas has won 228 games and lost only 43 since 1976, a winning percentage of 84.1.
