So far as strict reg ulations and effective controls are concerned there would have to be some other changes made, as the present Liquor Control Board doesn't have too savory a reputation as regards enforcement of controls and regulations.

The second proposition is on the question of whether or not we should have legalized pari-mutuel wagering on the sport of kings. Here again the argument is that state and local governments are in need of more tax revenue, and no doubt there would be considerable taxes derived if and when adequate racing facilities were constructed in a number of locations throughout the state. The detail that hasn't been explained is what percent of those taxes would be required to feed, clothe and house the people who could ill afford to lose their earnings at the tracks. The argument is made that people are going to gamble, regardless. Maybe they are, but why make it more convenient for the ones who can't afford to lose. This is no way to wage war on poverty.



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Look Closely Before Applying Insecticides

Effective cotton insect control is a result of wise decision-making regarding insecticides and not merely because chemicals were applied as a matter of routine, reports W. H. Newton, Extension entomologist at Texas A&M.

SEVERAL factors must be considered before the cotton producer begins insecticide application. Each individual should consider all of the alternatives and make decisions on the basis of his own

Knowing when to apply insecticides is one of the most important decisions. No single program can be used year after year-there are variances in weather and insect populations, and the insect problem may even vary from field to field. Treatments in the field should be made only when the insects reach a dangerous level and become an economic factor, emphasizes. Newton.

CHOOSING the proper insecticide can give the producer better control of the insects which are giving him the most problems. The farmer should know which pests are most important and treat accordingly, the specialist contin-

Insect resistance to chemical controls also can present problems to the cotton producer. Since the early 1950s, at least 10 or more species of insects and mites have developed resistance to one or more organic insecticides, Newton says.

When using insecticides, care should be taken to avoid unnecessary applications. When infestations of damaging insects reach economic levels, then insecticides should be used. Beneficial insects frequently keep damaging infestations below economic levels and should be protected. But, explains Newton, if damaging infes-**Conserves Water** tations get out-of-hand, then chemi

cal controls must be applied. NEWTON sums up the recommendations for control of cotton insects and other pests as follows:

"Praise him with the sound of the trumpet: praise him with the psaltery and harp." - Psalm 150:3


