

# CofC banquet set Monday

## County goes for PIK in big way

program to be presented at 3 p.m. Sunday in the DHS auditorium. The choir, which includes singers from 12 churches throughout the county, has been rehearsing since early February — including five rehearsals this week.

Castro County registered almost full participation in the Payment In Kind (PIK) Program, and may even lead the nation in percentage of participation in corn, grain sorghum and cotton acreage diversion.

Figures released Tuesday by national and local government offices showed that Castro County farmers responded to the government program by signing up to lay out 179,392 acres of farm land (about 40% of the county's total cropland).

Ninety-six percent of the county's cotton farmers signed up for PIK, 94% of the county's corn and grain sorghum farmers, and 85% of the wheat farmers in the county signed up for the new government program.

Nationally, 78% of the nation's corn and grain sorghum farmers signed up, with 39.5% signing for the full 50% diversion, 88% of the cotton (with 44% signing up for full 50%), and 86.2% of the nation's wheat growers signing up for the 50% diversion.

In Castro County, 728 cotton farms (96%) signed up to lay out 103,138 acres of cotton land. Of the county's corn and grain sorghum farmers, 835 farms (94%) signed up for PIK and will divert 148,568 acres. Wheat farmers signed up to divert 121,376 acres on 725 farms (86%) in the county.

USDA officials reported Tuesday that more than one-third of the nation's farmland, and almost one-half of Texas' farmland, will be idled by the PIK program which calls for the government to pay farmers with commodities (in storage) in return for idling up to 50% of their land.

Castro County's ASCS office will be unable to open whole base bids in the county Friday because "participation in the program was so good that we didn't have any available acres left for whole base bids," said ASC program official Mary Roundtree.

Local farm leaders have urged full-scale participation in the program.

"I think the level of participation is good in that it shows the willingness of farmers to cooperate and try to work the surplus off," said Ray Joe Riley, a member of the US Cotton Board.

"The program is probably two years late, but it's better than none at all," Riley added. "The level of participation shows the drastic state things were in."

"The realization of my prediction of 90 to 95% participation in this county was a real joy, and the percentage of participation nationwide is a great victory for the American farmer," said Texas Corn Growers President Carl King. "I was hoping for 75% nationwide, and it went 3% over that."

Texas corn farmers opted to divert 6,887,766 base acres of corn land, with 80.4% of all Texas corn growers signing up to participate in the program.

Agriculture Secretary John Block said in a Washington press conference Tuesday that 187 million acres of farmland has been enrolled across the nation in the program, with 82 million of those acres to be idled.

"I am a farmer and I want to produce, but it will take four to five years for us to get a program together that would get our exports back on the right track," Block said. "You can give the credit to the nation's farmers because they all got together."

In Texas, 87.2% of all eligible farmland was enrolled in the program as farmers signed up 20.7 million of a possible 23.7 million acres. Texas farmers also agreed to idle 9.3 million of those acres, meaning 45% of the acres enrolled will not be in use during the coming year.

## Absentee voting deadline nears

Tuesday is the last day for county residents to vote absentee for candidates in the upcoming city and school board elections.

Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth will hold city and school board elections on April 2, and absentee voting clerks in all three towns encourage

people who will be out of town on that day to cast their absentee vote by Tuesday.

In Dimmitt, absentee votes may be cast at city hall. In Nazareth voters should go to the high school, and in Hart school board absentee voting may be done in the school tax office and for city elections in city hall.

## Mobile home ordinance passes first reading

At Monday night's meeting of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen, the ordinance governing mobile homes in the city was passed on the first reading after several amendments were made, including two requested by a group of mobile home and mobile home park owners.

The amendments included changing the minimum square footage of mobile homes allowed in Zone 2 from 750 square feet down to 600 square feet, eliminating the age requirement for homes in Zone 2 and increasing the time limit for skirting of existing mobile homes in the city.

After a second reading at the next meeting of the aldermen followed by two publica-

tions of the ordinance in the local paper, the ordinance will go into effect. Existing mobile homes will have to be tied down and skirted, with a limit of 60 days on tie down and six months on skirting, and mobile home park owners must submit a sketch of their park's layout, including dimensions, placement of lots and layout of utility lines.

All other provisions of the ordinance will apply only to mobile homes moved in after the effective date or parks established after that date.

A group of protestors who attended the meeting said they felt the amendments made to the ordinance would satisfy them, although they added that they would like to

be included on the next Zoning Commission that is appointed.

The aldermen voted to conditionally accept the bid of High Plains Pavers, Inc. of Plainview for the airport improvement project that is being done through the cooperation of the Texas Aeronautics Commission (TAC), which is also paying 75% of the cost.

Conditions of acceptance of the bid rest on the TAC granting a waiver on the "through the fence" provision of the project contract and on the granting of an extension for the commencement of the project if neces-

## 'County cantata' is coming Sunday

Singers from throughout the county will join voices Sunday to present the popular Easter-season cantata, "Alleluia — A Praise Gathering for Believers."

The one-hour cantata will be performed at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Dimmitt High School auditorium, and is free to the public.

Directed by DHS Choral Music Director Doug Henry, the Palm Sunday cantata will feature a taped orchestral accompaniment and a professional guest soloist, Ruby Moultrie of Dallas.

"Alleluia — A Praise Gathering for Believers" is a contemporary reflection on

Christ's birth, his life, his crucifixion and resurrection, and his influence on people's lives. Arranged by Bill and Gloria Gaither and Ron Huff, the cantata includes choral arrangements of both traditional and contemporary religious songs, plus solos, spoken testimony and dramatic orchestration.

The Palm Sunday presentation is unique in that it brings together singers from 12 churches in Dimmitt, Hart, Nazareth and Sunnyside. The 50-voice choir has been rehearsing since early February.

Miss Moultrie, the featured soloist, is a former music teacher in the Dimmitt Public Schools and former choir director of the First United Methodist Church of Dimmitt. After teaching here two years, she attended graduate school at Southern Methodist University, where she earned a master of arts degree in sacred music. She also holds a BA degree from West Texas State University.

Henry, the cantata director, is a graduate of Houston Baptist University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and also has studied at Texas Wesleyan College, TWU, Stephen F. Austin State University and Penn State University.

In addition to developing the Dimmitt High School Choir to a sweepstakes rating this year, Henry has earned a regional reputation as a performer and actor. He was in the cast of the musical drama, "Texas," last summer, and has just completed the role of Cornelius Hackl in the Lubbock performance of "Hello, Dolly."

The choir will hold its dress rehearsal — its fifth practice session this week — at 7 p.m. Saturday in the DHS auditorium. Women are to bring sandwiches and men are to bring either chips or soft drinks for a "break time" during the final rehearsal.

## Community honors its state champions

A standing-room only crowd of Dimmitt fans gathered in the County Expo Building Monday evening for a state championship "afterglow" party to honor the Bobcats.

From the community's kitchens came decorated cakes and thousands of cookies — many in the shape of basketballs, stars or the state of Texas. There was even a saucer-size sugar cookie for each player, coach and manager, complete with basketball seam-markings and purple numbers. A big purple-and-white victory cake was decorated with the team's season record, 38-0.

Also on display were a hundred or more snapshots of team members, taken during their state tournament trip, plus a dozen or more congratulatory letters and telegrams from local fans, high school and college coaches (including Coach Ken Cleveland's Coleman High School coach), the Friona High School basketball team, Congressman Kent Hance, and basketball lovers from other parts of the state who had watched the Bobcats steamroll their way to the state championship.

It took the big crowd most of an hour to go through the players' reception line, load up on punch, cake and cookies, and study all the pictures, letters, telegrams and clippings.

Two-thirds of the crowd filled the bleachers while the rest

stood for the brief program.

When he took the microphone, Coach Cleveland drew an explosion of cheers when he announced, "There are 1,152 schools in the state of Texas, but there's only one team that can say they're undefeated — and it's that bunch standing over there."

Introducing the individual members of the undefeated state championship team, Coach Cleveland praised each of them: "Jeff Watts was a three-year starter, which is unusual in itself. He was an all-stater both last year and this year."

"John Smith is the most improved ball player on the squad, and made the all-state team. He really carried a load for our team."

"John David King was unheralded most of the season. He stayed in the background and did his job. But he played perhaps the best game of his career in the state championship game against Van Vleck, and was rewarded by being named to the all-state tournament team."

"My son, Kevin — I'm certainly proud of him. He's certainly carried his load, and has received many honors. We just got a call from the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, and they have selected him as the outstanding high school

basketball player in the state of Texas.

"Fermin Gonzales — if I had my way, he'd be an all-stater, too. I think he deserves these honors as much as any player, and in my book he's an all-state player."

The coach also had words of praise for all the other members of the squad — seniors Keith Gregory, Richard Saucedo, Tony Martinez, Steve Lunsford and Robert Murillo, juniors Dwight McDonald and Brad Holcomb and sophomore Nathan Nelson, and for the team's managers, Bruce Bryant, Blake Brown and Todd Braafladt.

Coach Cleveland publicly thanked his assistant coaches — Alan Steidle, George Rasor and Jerry Durham — and repeated his most-quoted line: "We've got the greatest fans in the world."

"I'm mad at myself because I didn't really appreciate until it was all over just how great a team this bunch was," Coach Cleveland concluded.

Garner Ball, president of the sponsoring Dimmitt Athletic Booster Club, commented, "These young men brought our community together probably more than they realize."

And they did it again Monday night.

[Continued from Page 1] sary. The current contract between the city and TAC says that the work must begin by April 1. It also states that no aircraft may have direct ground access to the airport

from private property or vice versa. Aldermen said they were confident that the variance would be granted, because of the situation that exists at the local airport, which has been

known to the TAC for some time. The city received TAC approval of an additional \$9,148 expenditure on the project for addition of a cross-over to be installed between

the existing runway and the planned paved taxiway. That will bring the total cost of the project to \$97,148, with the city paying \$24,287 of that amount.

Gene Lantrip, district executive of the South Plains Council of the Boy Scouts of America, spoke to the board on the possibility of starting a Law Enforcement Explorers Post in Dimmitt, working in cooperation with the Police Department.

Lantrip said that it would involve high school age youth and would not be of any expense to the city or the police. He added that the program carries adequate liability insurance to protect the city as well as the BSA.

Police Chief Don Franklin said that he has heard several youth express interest in the program already. He said that he felt it would help improve police relations with the youth of the community as well as interest more young people in careers in law enforcement.

"This will be a great opportunity to reach some of the kids of the community, and get them talking to us," Franklin said.

The program would include opportunities for participants to ride along with patrolmen and observe them on duty.

The aldermen gave approval for the program.

Aldermen discussed procedures for beginning a street paving project in Dimmitt with City Attorney Jack Edwards and City Engineer Bill McMorris.

"We want to hear from anyone interested in having the streets by their property paved," Mayor R. L. Fleming said.

The board was advised that the city could go by an

assessment program or by a voluntary program. An assessment program would take over six months to get going, while a voluntary program could be begun as soon as September if enough interest is expressed.

McMorris estimated that the project could cost \$25 per running foot of frontage for property owners.

"The more blocks we can get into the project, the cheaper it would be," he said, adding that at least 10 blocks would have to be included before any pavers would bid on it.

The aldermen had a pre-session before the regular meeting began. Following the example of the Amarillo City Board, they met informally in the Mayor's chambers for a general discussion of items to be covered on the evening's agenda. The session was open to the public and lasted for about 20 minutes.

In other business, the

aldermen:

-Decided to ask for bids on the city's multi-peril insurance, with specifications being drawn up by City Manager Paul Catoe.

-Set the pay for election clerks and judges at the same rate paid last year - \$3.50 per hour for clerks and \$4 for judges.

-Voted to allow Fire Marshal Steve Jameson to move the fire siren located on the west water tower to a location on Western Circle Drive. Jameson told the city that it would cost \$250 to rewire the siren, plus the expense of having it serviced while it is down, as well as the addition of phone lines to its new location. The board advised him to get an estimate on the phone lines before going ahead.

-Postponed final approval of the personnel policies and procedures manual until board members could examine it more carefully.

Insects of interest

Scale insects

Have scale insects been a problem on your fruit trees or outdoor ornamental plants? If so, spraying a dormant oil in late winter is one of the most effective ways to control these pests.

Scales are tiny insects that often secrete a waxy covering over their bodies. Adult scales are immobile and damage twigs and leaves by sucking plant sap. These pests are difficult to control in

the summer since they often occur in large numbers and their waxy coverings protect them from typical insecticides.

Scale on euonymous shrubs and San Jose scale on fruit trees are two serious pests locally. These infestations are best controlled by dormant oils. Also, oils are not toxic to natural enemies and are safer to use than conventional insecticides.

Dormant oils should be applied late in the winter but before buds begin to swell and break. Most labels recommend spraying when temperatures are between 40-90 degrees F, and freezing temperatures are not expected within 48 hours of application. Avoid application during high temperatures and low humidity when plants may be under water stress. These precautions are important to avoid injury to the plant or tree. Read the product's label since certain plants (sugar maple, certain conifers) are sensitive to oils and should not be treated.

Dormant oils kill by suffocating scales, mites, aphids, and their eggs. Spraying thoroughly to obtain complete coverage of the plant is important for good control. One application is usually sufficient.

He also serves as special assistant to Bishop Isaac Aco in strategic planning and development of churches and Mission in the whole state.

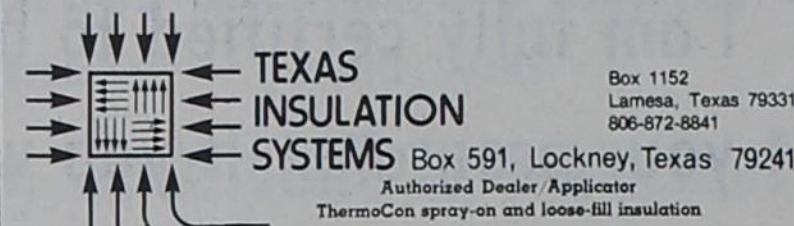

## CPR course starts

Fifteen local residents learned this week how to save lives through cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

Members of the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. conducted the three-night course at the fire station as a public service. The class met three hours each night, Monday through Wednesday, working with a textbook, films and training-aid "dummies" to learn how to apply CPR emergency treatment in life-threatening situations.

Class members who want to be certified as CPR technicians must pass oral, written

and application exams, then will need to take a refresher course each year or retake the basic course to retain their certification, instructor Roger Allison explained.

Seven members of the fire department served as instructors, and the local chapter of the American Heart Association provided the training aids.

Allison explained that the use of CPR training not only can save lives, but can sometimes achieve miraculous results. He cited a case in which a person who was trapped for hours in freezing water under ice was revived, and another in which a man survived after his wife had administered CPR to him for eight hours in an isolated situation, until help arrived.

"The only time you stop CPR once you've started is if

someone else relieves you, a doctor or a physician-directed team takes over, Emergency Medical Service personnel show up, or if you're too exhausted to continue," Allison explained.

The fire department has announced it will conduct a CPR training course anytime enough people show interest to form a class. Enrollment is limited to 20 per class, and the tuition fee is \$7.50.

He said CPR training has proven to be of such value in saving lives that many schools are making it a part of their curriculum, especially at the middle-school level.

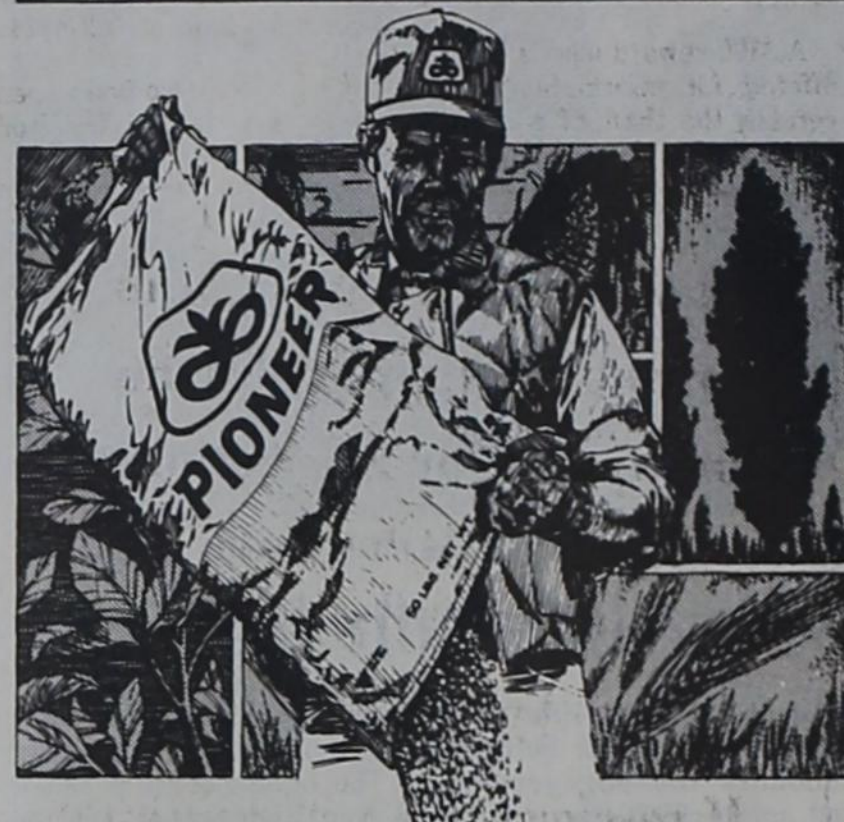

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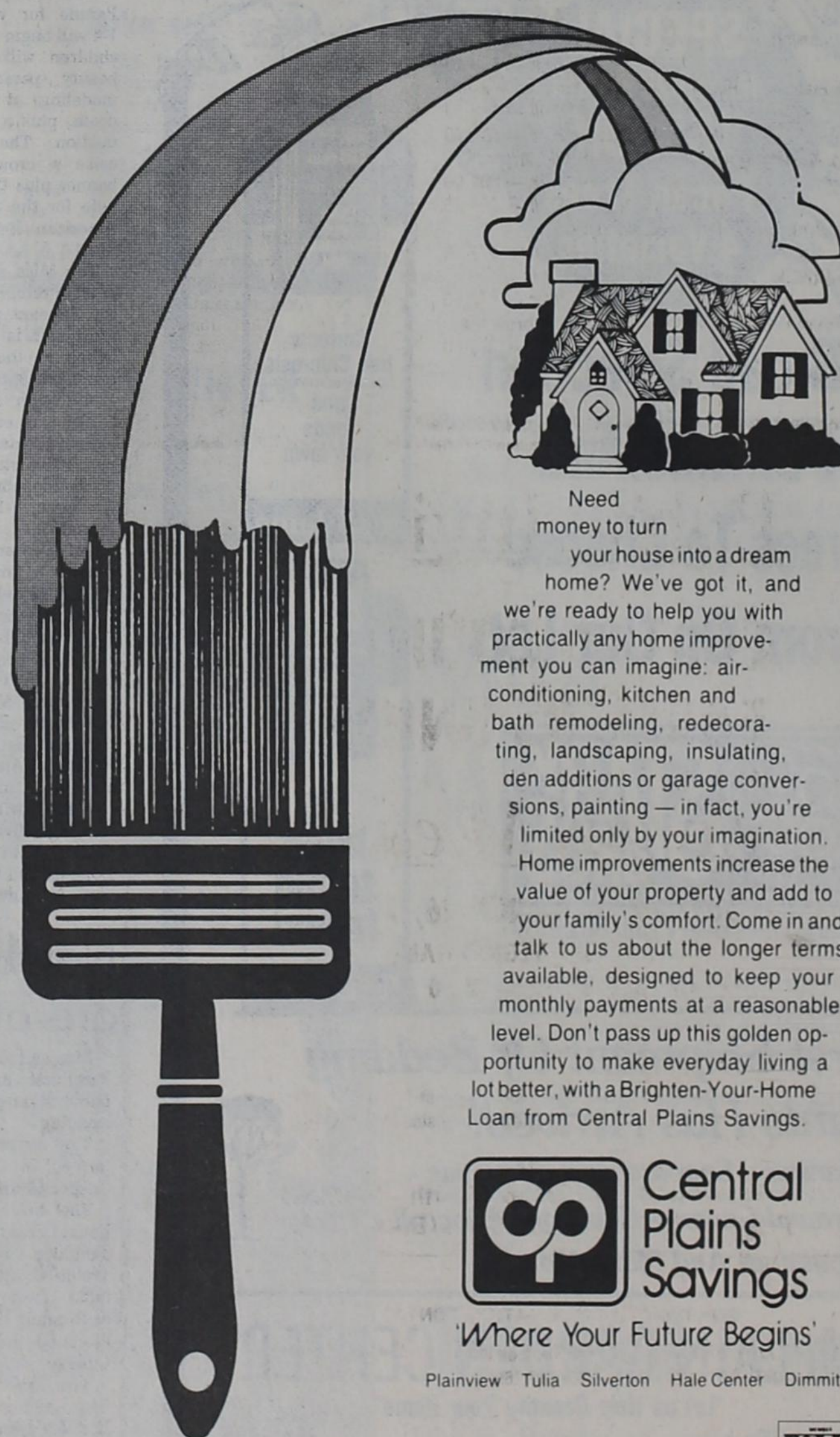

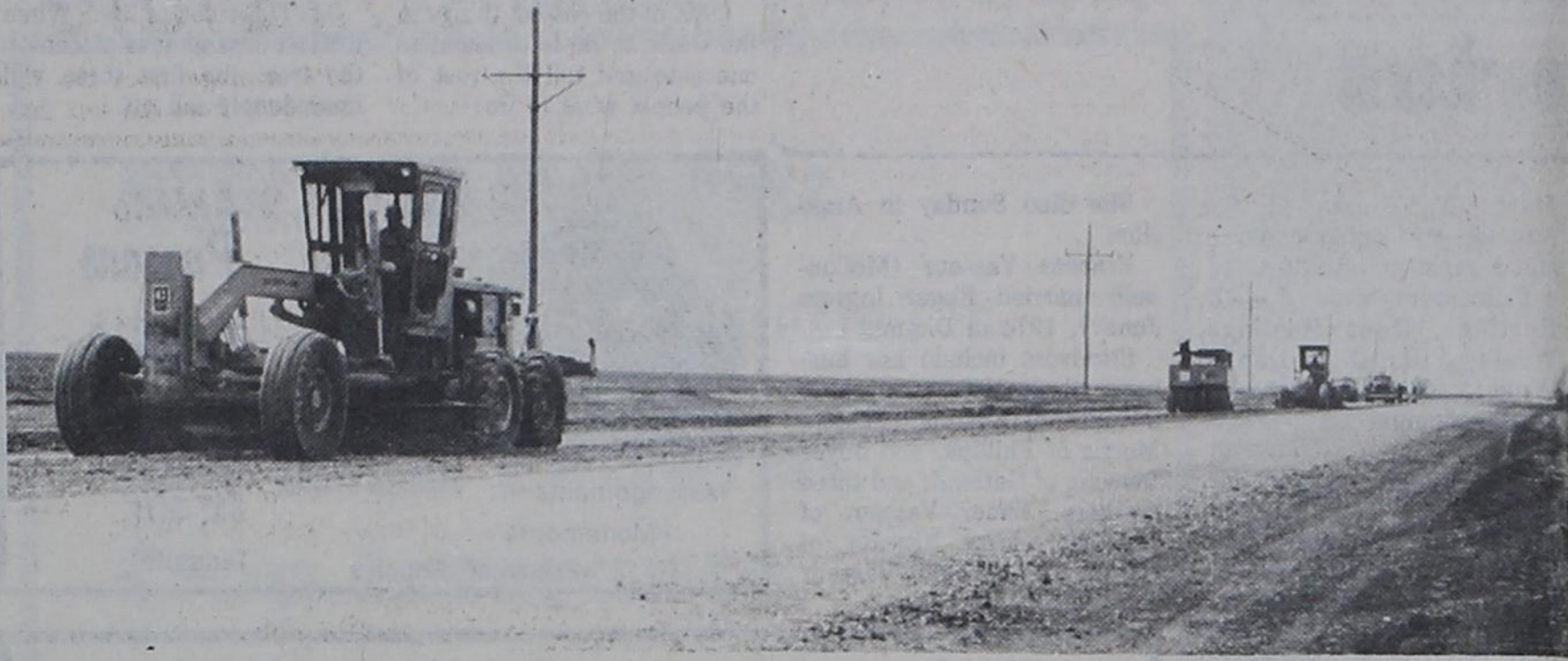

## Officials back Sarpalius bill to regulate rates of farm gas

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and Attorney General Jim Mattox have joined State Sen. Bill Sarpalius (D-Hereford) and Rep. Larry Don Shaw (D-Big Spring) in calling for the regulation of natural gas used for farming purposes.

In a Capitol news conference last Thursday, the four officials said the traditional practice of exempting only farm use of natural gas from

regulation allows gas pipelines to overcharge some customers and makes other live with an unstable pricing set-up that makes even short-term planning difficult or impossible.

Sen. Sarpalius introduced a bill Thursday that would place regulatory authority over utilities selling natural gas for farm use under the Texas Railroad Commission.

"These are utility companies that already are regulated by the Railroad Commission on their service to businesses and homeowners," Hightower said. "We're simply saying that our farmers should have the same right as other customers to contest gas company rate decisions. This bill is a response to complaints and requests I got from beleaguered farmers throughout my campaign last year. We're not asking the

gas companies for any more justification for their rates than they're already required to give their commercial and residential customers. "We're talking about simple fairness and plain old democracy here," Hightower said. "With no regulation, our farmers are getting willy-nilly rate increases by the companies. The farmers simply get a higher bill in the mail — no warning, no explanation, no recourse. Maybe some of these increases are necessary, but at least a farmer ought to have the same right of review and appeal that other citizens get. "And we're not talking about peanuts here," Hightower added. "A farmer like Ray Sneed up around Dalhart, for instance, uses about 3,500 m.c.f. (thousand cubic feet) a month when he's irrigating. Last November, his gas bill had a notice printed on it saying, 'Effective with this bill your gas rate has been increased by 2.954 cents per 100 cubic feet.' That adds up to a sudden jump of 30 cents per m.c.f., which cost Mr. Sneed an extra \$1,000 out of his pocket. Even worse, the increase wasn't announced in advance — this was an increase on gas he had already used, and there wasn't a thing he could do about it. Overall, his gas company raised his rates a total of 70 cents per m.c.f. in 1982. "Tommy Fondren, a cotton farmer from Lorenzo, saw his gas rates go up 25 percent over the past year," Hightower said. "And on top of that, if his cash flow situation makes it necessary for him to wait a day or two past the due date before he pays his bill, he gets socked with an 11 percent charge. This extra charge amounts to \$1,500 or more on every single quarter section of land he irrigates, and that's just for being late on one month's bill. Utilities are not allowed by the Railroad Commission to assess late charges on their other customers."

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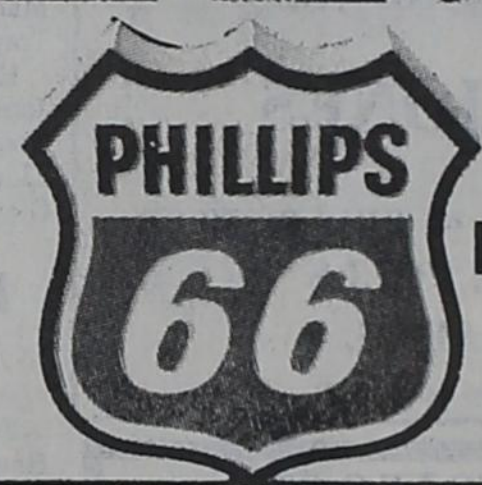

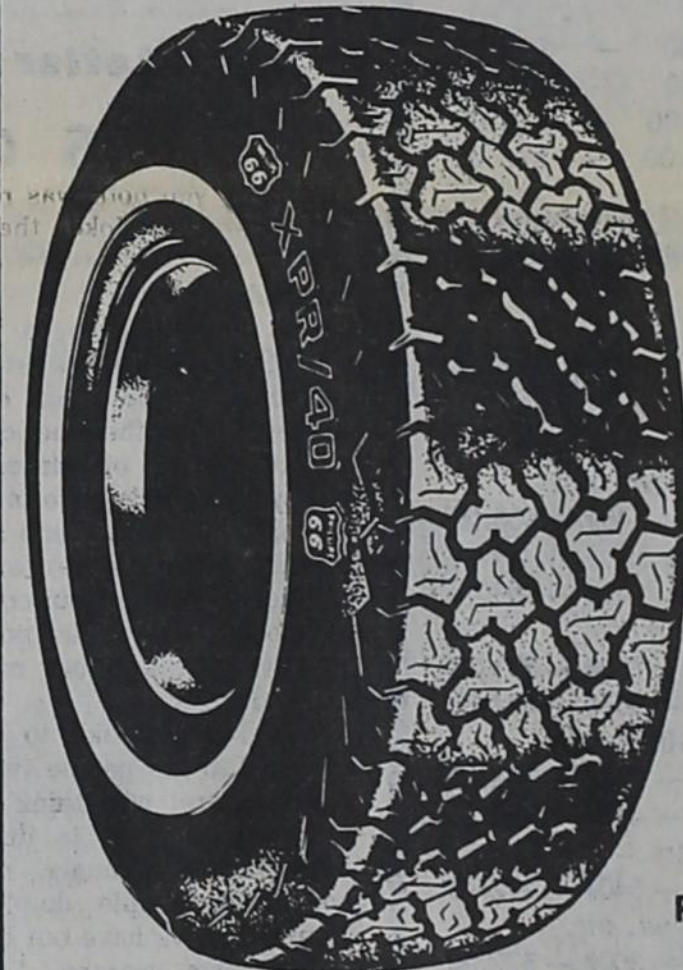

In the boys division the host Bobcats will be competing with teams from Littlefield, Happy, Kress, Friona and Nazareth.

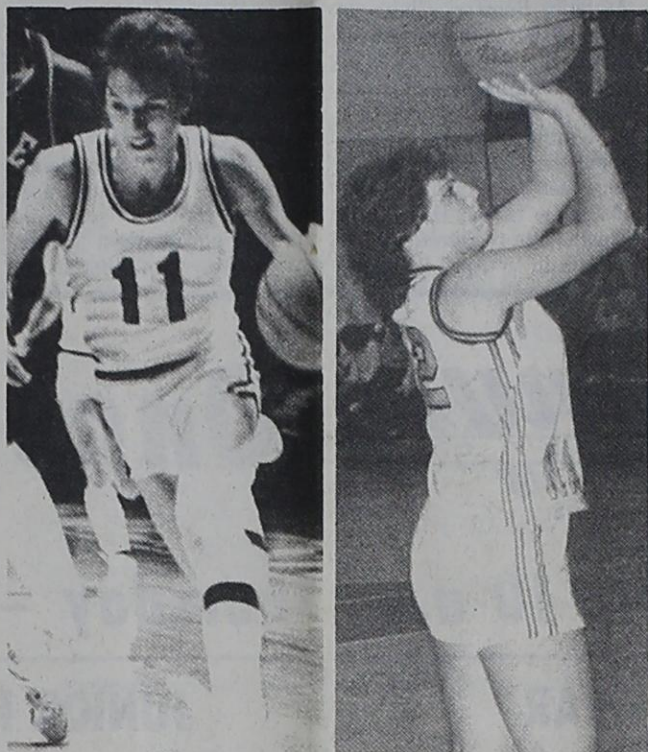
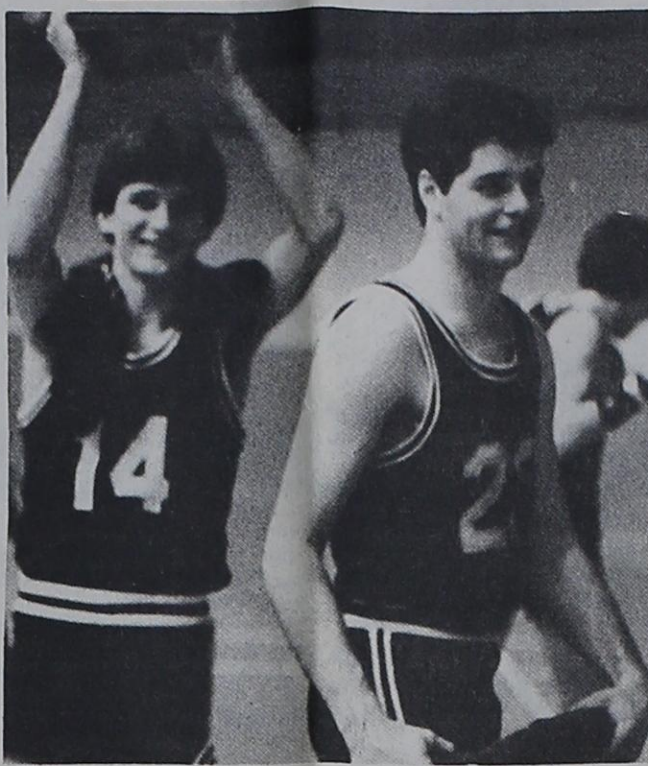
Bobcat coach Ken Nordell said he couldn't predict an overall favorite. "I think we should be pretty evenly matched," he said.

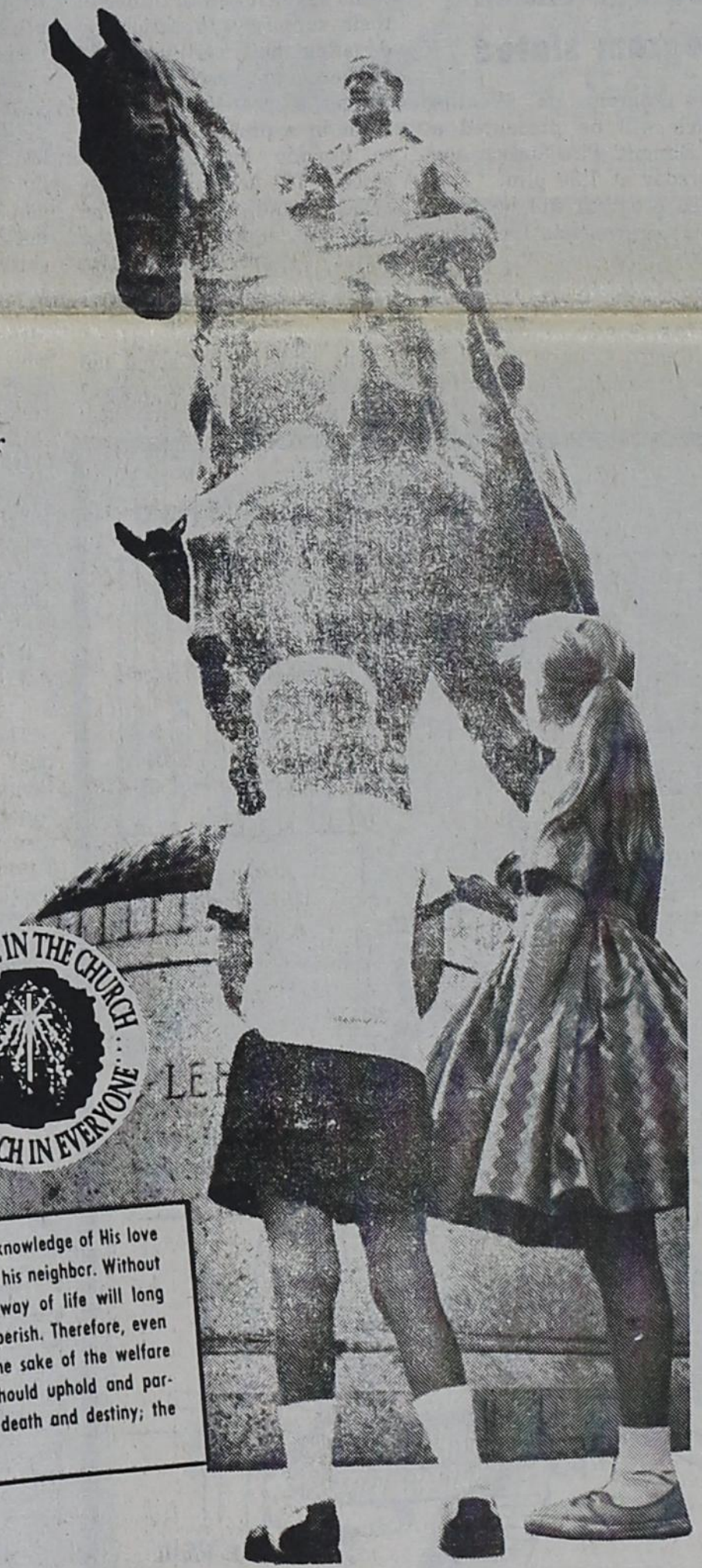

For the second week in a row, Russia led export sales of U.S. cotton with a purchase of 88,000 bales. Net sales for the week ended March 10 increased by 193,600 running bales for the marketing year 1982-83.

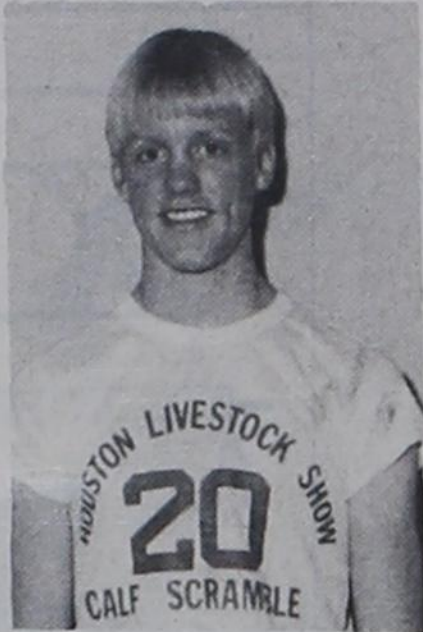
Besides Russia, the major buyers were Japan, 12,500 bales, and South Korea, 11,900.

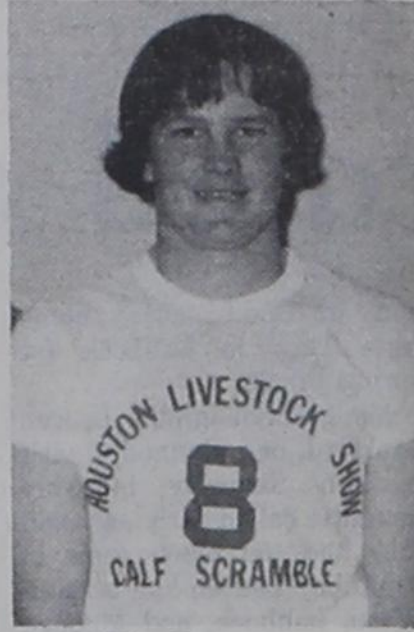

## Nazareth youths win in scramble

John Kleman and Kim Drerup, both 15-year-old, FFA members from Nazareth were winners of \$600 calf purchase certificates sponsored by Walton and Sons and Hudgins, Hudgins and Warwick at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's February 26 performance.

The calf scramble is an action-filled event that is the highlight of every rodeo performance. In the event, a dozen or so wild, young calves are turned loose in the vast Astrodome arena to be pursued by two dozen or so eager youngsters. To win, the calf must be caught, haltered and brought back across a finish line.

The winner then receives a calf purchase certificate valued at \$600 to be used toward the purchase of a registered beef or dairy heifer. These certificates are donated by Houston area businesses, firms and individuals who believe in the programs sponsored by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. These persons and firms have chosen to translate their support into action by donating these certificates.

Then, for each winner, begins a year-long involvement in a program designed to provide learning experiences. The heifer is carefully selected and all work done with her is done under the strict supervision of the winner's vocational agricultural teacher or county extension agent.

The show awards some 280 certificates per year to scramble winners. A research

study has indicated that this program alone yearly generates more than half a million dollars in economic activity throughout the state.

Since its inception, the Houston Calf Scramble and its sponsors have put more than \$1.9 million — some 9,000+ quality animals — into the hands of Texas youth. These thousands of animals have been purchased from purebred herds, directly benefiting the cattle raisers. In addition, the purchase of feeds, supplies and tools have a multiplying effect on the hometown economies of the winners.

Each scramble winner agrees to keep monetary records, submit monthly progress reports both to the livestock show and to the individual sponsor, photographically chronicle the progress of the project and prepare a 500-word essay covering the entire year.

The entire learning experience will include proper livestock evaluation techniques, efficient cattle feeding and production methods, principles of economics and money management.

At the conclusion of the year and the show ring competition at the Houston Livestock Show, the heifer belongs to the winner to use as desired. Most heifers become the basis for future cattle herds. Thus, a one-year learning partnership is stretched into a life-time career. For those winners who decide not to continue their cattle program, they have still enjoyed a learning experience and perhaps may choose some other field of agricultural endeavor.

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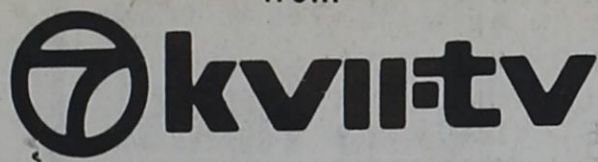

Nuclear Waste Transport also a problem

Dear Editor: As you may well be aware, many of the citizens of Deaf Smith County are drawing lines to do battle with the Department of Energy over

this proposed Nuclear Waste Repository. There are many aspects of this issue, such as, its effects on the economy of Hereford, and the vast agricultural industry of our county, that are yet to be resolved. Some say it will be good, some say it will be devastating.

The purpose of this letter is to point out that whatever the effect on our county, good or bad, the people of your community are going to receive one of the more controversial problems of the issue, the transportation of high-level nuclear waste through your town. This subject should be of great concern to all of you. High-level nuclear waste transportation has been studied by the railroads and their safety boards, they concluded that this mass volume of radioactive waste cannot be hauled safely, and they have told the DOE that they would not endanger the citizens

along their lines. So the DOE has turned to truck transport possibilities. One only has to study the size of the project and the amount of high-level nuclear waste in this country to know that the truck traffic will be enormous. Due to the fact that your community is on a main highway leading to this dump, you will be seeing these trucks all too often, if this project is completed in Deaf Smith County.

It would be to the benefit of your community for the citizens to take on the responsibility of becoming informed, aware and involved in nuclear waste issues. Your local elected officials and especially Governor Mark White can have the final say as to whether or not we have to put up with this project.

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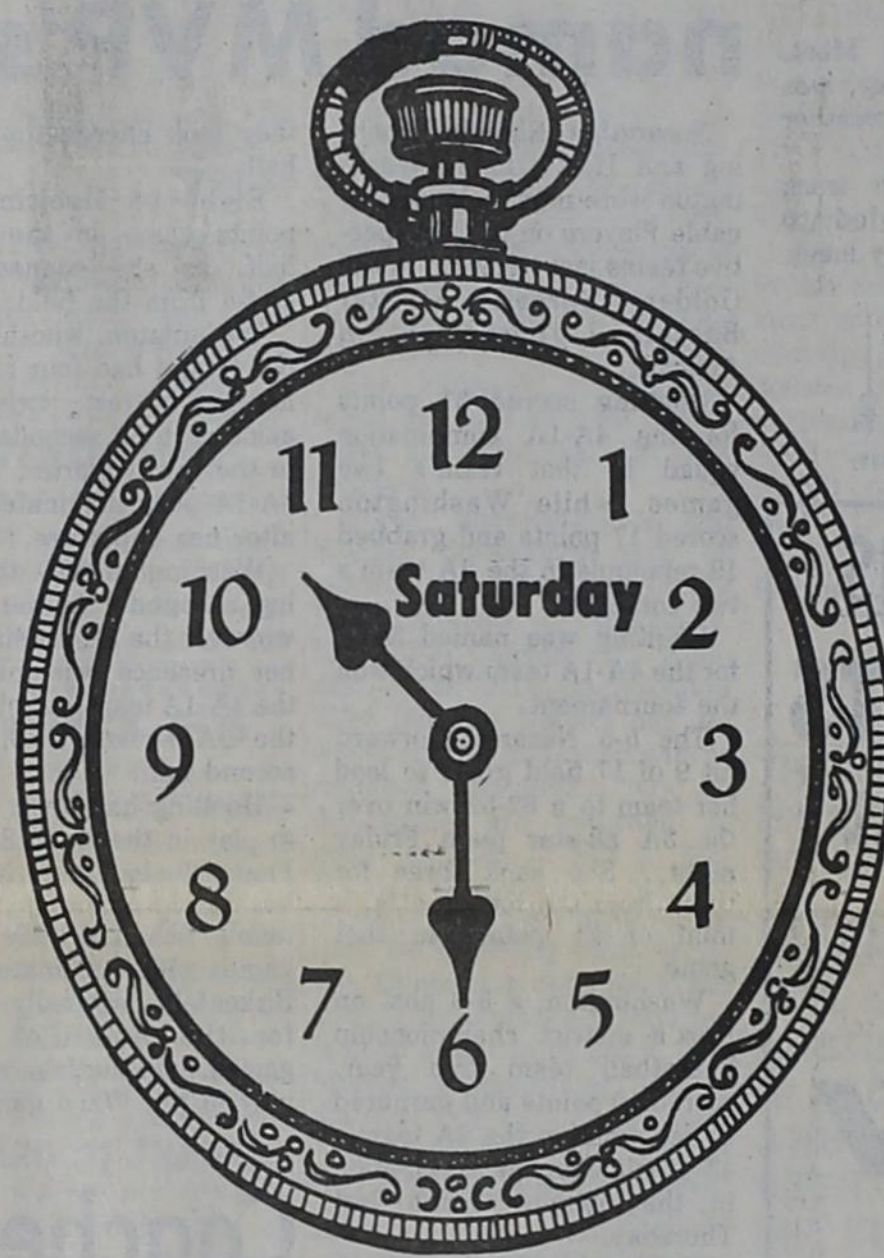
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
