Discussed at Charlotte, N. C., by the Minister.

WU ON SHIPMENTS OF COTTON.

## Celestlal Representative Declares

 Does Not Ship MoreOne. Sixth Required.

Charlotte, N. C., April 19.-Mr. Wu Ting Fang, Chinese minister, was the guest of honor at a dinner given
Thursday night by the Souther Manufacturers' club. He spoke on the cotton goods trade in China. Senator
John L. McLaurin of South Carolina was iso MeLaurin of South Carolin a paper on "Our Present Conditions in the South and Our Duty for th Future."
In his address Mr. Wu gave a gen
cral review of the trade conditions be eral review of the trade conditions be
tween the south and orient and tween the south and orient and of
China's importance as a market for China's importance as a market for
soxthern goods. He said: "Large as is the amount of Amer! can cotton goods which China imports the quantity she buys from abroad. Only the outskirts of the country have been entered. It is well known that to Manchuria and the province of to Manchuria and the province of Ch1
Li. Now Manchuria has a population of $7,000,000$ and Chi Li a population of $18,000,000$. These are by no means the most thickly populated parts of
the empire. There are seventeen other the empire. There are seventeen other
provinces of China proper, many of provinces of China proper, many of
which have a denser population than iether Chi Li or Manchuria. There is no reason why American cotton goods
cannot find as ready a market in the provinces of central and southern
China as in the north." "If properly placed before the Chinese, American cotton goods will
obtain the same foothold in southern China that they have in northern. The to meet the requirements. It must be borne in mind that the Chinese never wear wool; that, generally speaking,
the entire population clothe themselves in cotton all the year around.
Their bed clothes, umbrellas and in a cotton, and the consumption is prad tically unlimited if they are made in accordance with native requirements.
There is also a virgin market for cotton cloth which, tanned or otherwise
treated, will prove rainproof. All cotton goods would have to be put up in ments of the trade for which they are designed and such details could best
be learned after naving made a tria shipment.
"The recent troubles in north Cnina
have undoubtedly insure can cotton trade in that country for the market, for such country has de the midast camp for armed hosts. in the midst of warlike operations trade
and commerce cannot continue to flourish. The restoration of peace and
order to that distracted region will be a boon not only to the innabitants north China, who have already surfered untold losses and bardships, but
also to southern planters, manutacturers and laboring men of all classes
in this country, who depend upon the return of the normal trade conditions
in the Chinese empire for their con tinued prosperity, and I sincerely hope and trust that this will not be tong
delayec."
