the steamboat City of Trenton was on her way from this city to Trenton, N.
I., Wednesday afternoon her port boiler exploded, killing seven persons and
injuring over a score of others. passengers are missing, others. as many
sustained slight Injuries, it is though the missing may be found among those who did not find it necessary to go to
the hospital. After the explosion the boat took
fire and ran aground. She lies a Ire and ran aground. She lies a
wrecked and blackened hulk in the marshes opposite Torresdale, sixteen
miles above the city. Her hold is filled with water, and it is feared more of
her passengers and crew may be found in the bottom of the boat when the water is pumped out.
At Torresdale the steampipe connected with the port boiler burst with a
oud report. Then another explosion rent the boiler in twain. Scalding
steam and water were poured into the steam and water were poured into the
cabin and sections of the wood work of the boat were torn away. Those of
the passengers who were not scarred by the scalding steam and boiling
water were struck by the flying porWhter were struck by the fiying por-
tions of the splintered cabin. Legs

of the injured could be heard on shore and the cries of those who leaped and
were blown into the river were heartwere blow
rending.

A short telegraphic account of the

The fight occurred about a half mile from the grading camp, thirty miles south of Lordsburg. N. M., Sunday

two Mexicans and two Americans, were engaged in the fight, and all are dead. For several minutes they stood face to face and fired with revolvers as fast as they could. The Hoffman brothers
