

MOTIVE OF THE MAN

Leon Czologosz Tells Why He Shot President Mckinley.

HEARD EMMA GOLDMAN SPEAK

And From that Day Up to the Minute Me Shot Down Mis Victim Determined to Do the Deed.

Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 9 .- The statement of Leon Czologosz, made to the police, transcribed and signed by the prisoner, in part is as follows:

"On Tuesday night I went to the fair grounds and was near the railway gate when the presidential party arrived. I tried to get near the president, but the police forced me back. They forced everybody back so that the great ruler could pass. I was close to the president when he got into the grounds, but was afraid to attempt the assassination because there were so many men in the bodyguard that watched him. I was not afraid of them or that I should get hurt, but afraid I might be the shooting was accidental. seized and that my chance would be gone forever.

"Well, he went away that time and I went home. On Wednesday I went to at Franklin, same state. the grounds and stood right near the president, right under him near the stand from which he spoke.

"I thought half a dozen times of shooting while he was speaking, but could not get close enough. I was afraid I might miss, and then the great crowd was always jostling, and I was afraid lest my aim fail. I waited Wednesday and the president got into his carriage again and a lot of men were about him and formed a cordon that I could not get through. I was tossed about by the crowd and my spirits were getting pretty low. I was almost hopeless that night.

"I first thought of hiding my pistol under my handkerchief. I was afraid if I had to draw it from my pocket I would be seen and senzed by the gaurds. I got to the Temple of Muwhere the reception was to be held.

Czologosz neded his story in utter exhaustion. When he had concluded he was asked:

"Did you really mean to kill the president?"

"I did." was the cold-blooded reply. "What was your motive; what good could it do?" he was asked.

"I am an anarchist. I am a disciple with not the slightest tremor.

"I deny that I have had an accomplice at any time," Czologosz told District Attorney Penny. "I don't regret my act, because I was doing what I confidants, no one to help me. I was to oppose the alliance. alone, absolutely."

Austin. Tex., Sept. 4.- The free conference committee on congressional districts made yet another change before reporting its bill. It took Burnet county out of the Austin (Tenth) district and gave it to the San Antonio (Fourteenth) district. The Austin district had excess of population, while the San Antonio district was shy. Legislative.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 4.-In the senate Tuesday, Sebastian presented the report of the free conference committee on representative districts, being the same as published. It was adopted without discussion, and the vote reconsidered and tabled.

It was discovered that the house bill prohibiting the running of blind tigers in independent school districts, passed Monday under a suspension of the rules, was without an emergency clause, and the chair held that therefore the suspension of the rules and final passage of the bill were null and void. SECOND SPECIAL SESSION.

Appropriation Bills Carrying Over Five Million Dollars Introduced.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 6 .- Senate began second special session by chair having call of governor read. W. B. O'Quinn of Angelina county was selected secretary and Clyde Smith of Wichita assistant.

Senator Dibrell, chairman of the finance committee. introduced a bill making appropriations for the support of the state government for the two years beginning Sept. 1.

Savage introduced a bill appropriating \$35,000 for pay of members and officers during this session.

Turner introduced the following res-

'Whereas, The second called session of the Twenty-seventh legislature was convened for the sole purpose of making appropriations to cover the expense of the state government for the two years beginning Sept. 1, 1901, and ending Aug. 131, 1903; and,

"Whereas, It is conceded that the finance committee of the senate and las. house of representatives will be prepared to report a general appropriation bill on or before Tuesday, Sept. 10; and,

"Whereas, The Twenty-seventh legislature owes it to the people of the state to dispatch business with as little delay as possible; therefore be it

"Resolved, by the senate, th ehouse concurring, That the second called session of the Twenty-seventh legislature adjourn sine die on Sept. 19, 1901."

The resolution was laid on the table subject to call.

A recess for thirty minutes was taken. Upon reconvening the finance committee reported favorably the bills by Savage and Turney. Hanger offered a resolution author-

izing each senator to subscribe for five daily newspapers at the regular subscription rates. Adopted. The finance committee reported favorably the general appropriation bill,

with minor amendments. The bill carries \$5,700,000 for the two years. House took up the consideration of

a resolution by Beaty and others dispensing with the services of all the committee clerks except the two now serving on the finance and judicial districts and the speaker's private sec-

Schluter opposed the adoption of the resolution.

A resolution by Griggs was introduced authorizing the committee on contingent expenses to purchase maps showing the new congressional districts, each member to receive two maps of the different kinds.

The resolution was referred to the committee on contingent expenses. Little of Bexar offered a resolution

authorizing the house to subscribe to three newspapers for each member, containing a report of the legislative proceedings.

Perkins offered an amendment fixing the price of the papers at 3½c. The resolution and amendment were

tabled by a vote of 46 ayes to 43 noes. Meitzen offered a resolution appropriating \$5 worth of postage stamps for each member. The resolution was adopted.

The general appropriation bill was

introduced by Schluter. Schluter also introduced the per diem and contingent expenses bills. The per diem appropriation is \$35,000 and the contingent expenses \$10,000. A message from the governor was

read.

Robbins' New Bond.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 6.-State Treasurer J. W. Robbins has filed a new bond with the secretary of state. It was approved by the governor. The bond is for \$75,000, the same amount as the former bond of the state treasurer, and is dated Aug. 30. State Treasurer Robbins is principal and the following are the sureties of bondsmen: T. M. SOME FREAK CASES.

PECULIAR SUITS U. S. HAS TAKEN INTO COURT.

Has Sued Dumb Animals and Inanimate Objects and as a Result Has Greatly Enriched the National Treasury-Jewelry Found Guilty.

By following his rigid rule of forever standing up for his rights, Uncle Sam becomes involved in some peculiar cases. On numerous occasions, for instance, he has sued inanimate objects and dumb animals, and as a result the treasury is greatly benefited. He is busy, just now, prosecuting numerous freak suits against inanimate things and animals. These helpless lawbreak breakers are held as defendants, just as though they were human beings. They are imprisoned in the custody of the court, and lawyers eloquently recite their misdeeds, for they are offenders in the unsparing eye of the law.

Uncle Sam made a snug fortune by suing fifteen packages of diamonds smuggled last June through Niagara. A few days ago the federal court of the western New York district sentenced them to be sold. Thirty-one thousand dollars were poured into the treasury as the result of this auction. Uncle Sam lately sued "581 diamonds, cut. etc." suspected of having been smuggled into Michigan, but the District court dismissed the case, and they were liberated from the custody of the United States marshal. "The United States vs. one diamond and pearl bracelet, one diamond and pearl brooch with pendant, one pair diamond and pearl earrings and one · diamond brooch," was the title of a case which lately went against the aforesaid jewels in the district court of New Jersey. They were held guilty for allowing themselves to be smuggled and were sent down to the auctioneer. Misbehaving cattle have troubled Uncle Sam to a serious degree of late. He has arrested and tried no less than 1,023 within the past two years. They were all accused of coming into the country in violation of the quarantine laws. In these cases it was deemed impracticable to commit the defendants to jail, like common human offenders, or to lock them up in the marshal's safe, as the diamond rings were treated. The government had to hire a pen wherein they could be kept under constant surveillancce and out of the way of the enterprising journalistic interviewers. There being no docks in the courts to suitably accomhave sprains in abundance. Light | modate them, they were denied an ear sprains, sprains that cripple, sprains in their own trials and had to entrust their cases entirely to their counsel The greater number were found guilty and sentenced to pass under the hammer. "The United States vs. . 1,736 pounds adulterated assafoetida" was a sensational case which lately called forth an eloquent and profound opinion from the circuit court of the eastern division of Michigan. The defendant when produced before the dignified tribunal remonstrated so loudly that the spectators saw fit to clear the court and take to the fresh air of heaven. The records show that the honorable court sentenced the defendant "to condemnation and destruction." In the federal supreme court is pending the case of the United States vs. certain vessels painted white," held for violating the law forbidding the importation of firearms into Alaska. similar case "vs. one certain vessel painted light drab," was lately decided against the defendant, and she was sentenced to "forfeiture and sale." But when Uncle Sam came to carry out the decree of the court he found that she had escaped from the custody of the authorities. The government has sued numerous schooners, tugs, steam-

boats and other water craft in recent years. Cases in which a schooner and a tug are held as defendants are pending in the supreme court. Five photographs were recently sued in California, twenty-one in New Jersey and "one lot" in Porto Rico. All of these pictures are accused of immorality, and were sentenced to "destruction by fire." "One gross of immoral articles." recently defendants in a Porto Rican

case, suffered like punishment. Areas of land appear as defendants in many cases before the federal courts. In the circuit court of Rhode Island was recently heard "the United States against certain lands in Jamestown," and "against certain lands in Boston Neck." These properties were defendants in condemnation proceedings, the government desiring their

FAMOUS GOLD CITY.

How Ballarat, Australia, Has Been Der veloped.

One of the finest cities in the British empire is Ballarat, the famous gold city of Australia. It has the anique record of being the only place in Australia where the people fought a battle with the armed forces of the British crown. Its population consists of English, Irish and Scotch in about equal proportions. They live happily free from the race prejudices that often become manifest between the same races in the United States. For the first three years of its existence as a gold field the authorities harassed the diggers in the most despotic fashion, treated them more like dogs than human beings, indulged periodically in "digger hunts" and collected, alike from successful and unsuccessful, an iniquitous monthly license fee at the point of the bayonet. This brutal behavier led to open rebellion at the beginning of December, 1854, the diggers running up a rude fort called the "Eureka stockade." At that time the Twelfth and Fortieth regiments were quartered in Melbourne, under the command of Maj. Gen. Sir Robert Nickle, one of Wellington's officers in the peninsula. They were hurried up to Ballarat and early on a Sunday morning they attacked the stockade and carried it by storm. The diggers were defeated in a military sensethere was lamentable loss of life on both sides—but the cause for which they took up arms won a speedy triumph. The hateful license fee was abolished, and the mining population was conceded Parliamentary representation which had previously been denied them. The Ballarat diggers chose by acclamation as their first member the young Irishman who was their leader in the insurrection, who had lost an arm in defending the stockade, and who was for weeks a fugitive with a heavy price on his head. As Peter Lalor, he was destined to play an important part in the political life of Victoria, to hold high office as minister of the crown, and to preside as speaker over three Parliaments with acknowledged distinction, and to decline the honor of knighthood on two His heroic statue in bronze, by Nelson Maclean, a London sculptor, is one of the ornaments of Ballarat's principal thoroughfares, and the site of the Eureka stockade, the great show post for visitors, has been converted into a handsome public re-

serve and an historic heritage. Ballarat ranks next in importance and population to Meibourne among the cities of Victoria, and it is vastly superior to the metropolis both in natural beauty and artistic embellishment. patriotically proud of the place, and they have enriched Start street with a succession of statues and gardens that no other city in the empire can boast. What was in the early days a dismal swamp has been converted into the beautiful Lake Wendouree at considerable expense and labor. Ballarat is a bishopric of both the Catholic and Anglican churches, and all of the leading religious denominations are well represented on the premier gold field. In its public buildings, private residences, business establishments and all the adjuncts of up-to-date civic progressiveness Ballarat ranks second to none of the cities of Great Britain.

THE BENDERS ALL DEAD.

No Solid Foundation for the Story Recently Told About Them.

The recent startling story that the authorities in a certain western town had found a trace of the celebrated Bender family, the Kansas murderers, has led "Doc" Pierce, a celebrated Indian scout of the Black Hills, to give out a story relative to the Benders which was related to him by a friend now dead.

When the York family was killed and the tragedy was traced to the home of the Benders, Pierce's friend was among those from the city of Cherryvale who went out to investigate the conditions of things at the Bender road-house. There were 2 men in the party, one of the men being an old buffalo hunter. They found the house deserted, and in searching the house the bedstead in the west room, about which so much has been said, was found to be full of bullet holes, and dried blood was on the mattress. They found the trap door behind a curtain, which led into the cellar, into which the dead bodies had been thrown until dark, when they were taken out into the garden and

Growth of Farm Lands.

The basic industry of this country is agriculture. In 1890 there were 4,564,641 farms in the country. There are today 5,700,000 and over, showing an increase in ten years of nearly 1,140,000 arms. This increase s arisen from two causes-the settlement of government lands and the division of great farms. We used to be told, ten or fifteen years ago, that the farms were being consolidated and that the bonanza farm would be that of the future. On the contrary, since 1850, there has been a constant decrease in the average size of farms; in that year it was 203 acres; in 1890 it was 137 acres.
