

SILFNCE OF SLEEP

Prevented Some Prospectors From Hearing a Flood And

Senator Quay of Pennsylvania, with ALL THIRTEEN WERE DROWNED.

Six of the Bodies Mave Been Recov ered, but it is feared the Other Seven Will Never Be.

San Antonio, Tex., Sept. 28 .- News of an appalling disaster in Presidio county on the 25th instant rached the city Friday. Meager details tell of the death by drowning of thirteen men, who were prospecting for cinnabar along the banks of Alamito creek. which has been nothing but a dry ravine for fifteen months on account of the drouth. The men were camped at two places a mile apart in the creek bottom, and after having prospected all day went to their "shake-downs" at 8 o'clock at night. At the camps there was a good rain in the afternoon, bit it caused no apprehension. Fifteen miles north, however, there was a waterspout or cloudburst such as had never been known before in that country. The water rushed and roared down the creek bed that had been dry for so long and caught the prospectors asleep. The bank of water is said to have been twenty feet high and came down the ravine with such force that it moved boulders weighing over a ton, carrying them several hundred feet. The water was on the two camps before the sleepers had warning of its coming and every man, thirteen in number, was drowned.

Alamito creek heads near Fort Davis, in Jeff Davis country, and empties into the Rio Grande thirty miles south of Presidio. Only six bodies of the drowned men had been recovered at last accounts and it is feared the otac. seven will never be found.

GONE TO COVERNOR.

The Second Investigation Resolution Has Passed Both Houses.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 28 .- The matter of general investigation is up to the governor. The house Friday morning passed the resolution finally by a vote. of 47 to 34, although there was difficulty in holding a quorum. In the senate an effort was made to non-concur in the house amendments on the ground that the house had provided for too small a committee. But the amendments were concurred in.

A message was received from the governor nominating Richard D. Levy. of Longview to be judge of the Fourth judicial distrct, vice W. J. Grantham, deceased. The senate went into executive session to consider the nomination.

The senate was in executive session two hours. It refused to confirm the appointment of Mr. Levy by a vote ot 14 to 8. There was no objection to him personally, but the senator from that district (McGee) had recommended another man, and thirteen other senators deferred to Mr. McGee's wishes in the premises.

The refusal of the senate to confirm the governor's appointment of Richard D. Levy as judge of the Fourth district has caused quite a stir here. It. has been a long, long time since a Texas senate has turned down a goverpor's appointment. That causes comment. Furthermore, the fact that no objections were urged to Mr. Levy, makes the case exceptional. It seems that twenty-three of the senators had joined Senator McGee in asking the governor to appoint another man to the place and when the governor sent in the nomination, thirteen of the senators stood with Mr. McGee against the appointment.

Mr. Levy's friends are very much disappointed. They say that they had the indorsement of Gregg, Panola and Rusk counties, but they did not attempt to get Harrison county indorsements because that county was asking for the appointment of one of its citizens. LATE PRESIDENT'S WILL.

Secrefary Cortelyou and Judgo Day to Wind Up Estate,

Canton, O., Sept. 28 .- President Mc-Kinley's will, which was read Friday, is as follows:

"Executive Mansion, Washington, D. C .- I publish the following as my latest will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills:

"To my beloved wife, Ida S. McKinley, I bequeath all of my real estate wherever situated and the income of any personal property of which I may be possessed at death, during her natural life. 1 make the following charge upon all of my property, both real and personal: To pay my mother during her life \$1000 a year, and at her death said sum to be paid to my sister, Helen McKinley. If the income from property be insufficient to keep my wife in great comfort and pay the annuity above provided, then I direct that such of my property be sold as to make a sum adequate for both purposes. Whatever property remains at the death of my wife, I give to my brother and sisters, share and share alike. My chief concern is that my wife, from my estate, shall have all she requires for her comfort and pleasure and that my mother shall be provided with whatever money she requires to make her old age comfortab's and happy.

"Witness my hand and seal, this 22d day of October, 1897, to my last will and testament, made at the city of Washington, D. C.

Brenham, Tex., Sept. 28 .- As Col. L. J. HOUSE PASSES BILL.

Governor Vetoes Investigation and Senate

Passes Another. Austin, Tex., Sept. 26 .- The house Wednesday passed the general appropriation bill to its third reading. An effort was made to finally pass it ,and Henderson of Lamar, who has led the fight against the bill, and who still opposes it, begged the other opponents not to pursue dilatory tactics, but to join with the advocates of the measure so that the bill might be finally passed. The greater portion of the session was devoted to discussion as to which should be adopted, the majority or the minority report of the committee which investigated the alleged assessment of clerks by heads of departments

for campaign purposes. The majority of the committee, in reporting on the subscription raised by the clerks in the comptroller's department to pay off a note given by Mr. Love to raise money for campaign purposes, concludes that Mr. Love was not in any way responsible. It further says that if any of the heads of departments have made a practice of assessing their clerks, the practice should be condemned. Adopt-

ed majority report. Secretary to the governor, Judge Cravens, was announced in the senate, and presented from the governor a message vetoing the investigating resolution and transmitting an opinion of the attorney general, holding the resolution unconstitutional. Upon the conclusion of the reading

of the veto and opinion, Judge Cravens delivered another message from the governor, submitting the question of an investigation of the state departments and institutions. A resolution adopting them carried. The act appropriates \$10,000 to carry on investigation. Senators Dibrell, Savage and / Tur-

ner offered a resolution for investigation of the departments and institutions, it being drawn to suit the constitutional objections. It was read the first time and referred to the finance committee. 1 201





unique plan for enjoying these intensely hot days than that adopted by



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

artist D. Orrin Steinberger, whose home is a few miles north of Springfield, Ohio. Perched in a house fifty feet from the ground, in a majestic oak, secluded from the world, excepting the lowing cows in the field, a man whose pictures have demanded the attention of the nation spends most of his time. It is an ideal spot for his house in the tree. The entrance to the nest is through a long lane of willows. The tree-top house is made of boards with saplings bound across the side for support and protection. There is an elevated step on the west side, where Artist Steinberger sits and paints and sketches at will. While thick foliage of the overhanging boughs form a protection from the rain, yet the rays of the sun penetrate even to a certain extent, and to keep this out a canvas has been stretched on the east side. There is room on the floor of the nest for a dozen people. To reach the house a block and tackle is used for the more timid, who are seated in a swing and pulled up through a trap door. The trip up affects the nerves of some, especially the ladies. Artist Steinberger does not use this means of going to his nest. 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

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
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
