

Disease has depleted the turkey "crop" of central Kentucky and obtainable birds bring 6 cents per pound.

During the past two years B. Weller of Hillsboro has paid out nearly \$300,-000 for hogs. Nearly all were shipped to California markets.

A few days ago the largest consignment-89,000 boxes-of dates in one day was received at New York. The dates were from Persia.

J. D. Jeffries of Clarendon sold to Theodore Rice and Norton Thayer of Chicago 2100 head of stock cattle, calves included, for \$53,740.

Capt. J. B. Porter of Terrell had six bales of long staple cotton grown on his farm near that city. The staple measures one and three-eighths inches.

A. J. Nesbitt, president of the Amer-Ican Livestock and Loan company of Denver bought at private terms of J. D. Jeffries of Clarendon 1200 head of 2-year-old steers.

W. L. Blake of Doniphan, Fannin county, put in a patch of June corn in the late summer and nearly every day he takes a load of roasting ears to Bonham. One day last week he sold \$10 worth.

What is claimed to be the largest apple ever grown in Clay county, Arkansas, was raised on W. M. Hardy's farm, near Piggott. It measured thirteen inches in circumference and weighes a pound and a half.

B. H. Brown of Calvert and W. A. Poague of Albany sold to R. E. Gatewood of Rio Vista, Johnson county, 600 head of fine 3 and 4-year-old steers. The price was \$33 per head, delivered on board cars at Albary.

A trainload of seventeen cars was shipped from Albany to northern markets. The cattle were fat. Reynolds Bros. shipped thirteen cars, C. M. Caubla two and N. M. Berryman one and a half miles north of Waco and John Honeycutt one.

Dr. O'Brien of California recently purchased a tract of land in the Corpus Christi section with the view of setting out a lemon orchard. This is a decided novelty, but the doctor is of the opinion the venture will prove to a success.

The insurance adjusters and the owners of the burned Hutchins house, Houston, have agreed on \$53,594 as reimbursement for fire loss. Insurance carried was \$55,000.

W. R. Dooley of Van Ormy, Bexar county, says if the expenses of himself and one companion are paid to Turkey and return and he be paid \$50,000 when the task shall have been completed, he will restore Miss Stone to her people. Dooley is an old frontiersman.

Ramon Martinez, the alleged leader of a band of Mexican burglars and thieves, reputed to have stolen from stores in different Texas towns merchandles valued at over \$5000, was tried at San Antonio for burglary and given two years. This is his third conviction, with a total punishment of fourteen years.

The Sublime Porte Has Accepted All the Claims of France.

Paris, Nov. 4 .- The departure of Admiral Gaillard's squadron from Toulon to Turkish waters has already had its effect. The French foreign office received a telegram from M. Baptiste, counsellor of the French legation at Constantinople, announcing the sultan sent him a message accepting all the French claims, including the Larando matter.

The porte also telegraphed to the French minister of foreign affairs, M. Delcasse, informing him that the Lorando claim had been settled and that the sultan had signed an irade accepting the figure of the claim. M. Delcasse proceeded to the Elysee palace and to the ministry of the nterior and consulted with President Loubet. the premier, M. Waldeck-Roussean, and the minister of marine, M. de Lanassan. He afterward had another conforence with M. Waldeck-Rousseau.

Gooch, it is alleged, forged 358 names in the census returns for McNairy county. Should he receive the full limit in each case he would be sent to the penitentiary for 716 years.

Killer of Jim Fisk Dead.

New York, Nov. 4.-Edward S. Stokes, who was known to fame as the man who killed Jim Fisk, died at 3:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon. On Jan. 6, 1872 Stokes shot and killed Jim Fisk at the Grand Central hotel. Stokes was convicted of murder in the first degree and was sentenced to die on Feb. 28, 1873. He got a new trial, and was again convicted. On a third trial he was convicted of manslaughter. He served four years in Sing Sing.

Many Lives Lost. London. Nov. 4.-It is announced in a dispatch from St. Petersburg that scores of fishing boats were wrecked, and that 170 men were drowned during a recent storm on Lake Baikal.



DOLLARS DESIRED

And Demanded for Miss Stone Must Rvery One be Paid

BEFORE HER RELEASE OCCURS.

The Brigands Will Accept Nothing Less Than One Hundred and Ten Thousand as a Ransom.

Washington, Nov. 1.-Despite the efforts of American officials and missionaries to convince the brigands holding Miss Stone captive, that it is impossible to raise the ransom of \$110,-000, the latter have thus far declined to reduce their demand by a single dollar.

While this is a discouraging feature of the Stone case, the fact that negosecretary of the American legation at Constantinople, has been advised that there is no likelihood of any considerable addition being made to the amount collected. It was stated by a high official that the Turkish government has given assurances that until Miss Stone is liberated no military movement will be made against the brigands.

In connection with the explanation of the sublime porte's cablegram Thursday from Constantinople, alleging that he is not responsible for the abduction of Miss Stone, the authorities say that the question of responsinot been fully determined, and they reiterated that the collection of evidence to support a claim for reparation will not be prosecuted until Miss Stone has secured her freedom. At this moment the view of the officials is that while Miss Stone was seized on Turkish te:ritory, the brigands who effected he capture were Bulgarians, and the suspicion is entertained that behind the brigands were the Macedonian committee and Bulgario. It ns this suspicion that was responsible for the belief at one time prevailing that Miss Stone's release would be secured without the



THE LATE ADMINAL BUNCE.

Won Distinction for His Services During the Civil War.

Rear Admiral Francis M. Bunce, who was retired from active service in the navy some time ago, died the other day at his home in Washington. He had been ill for several months and for the past few weeks had been failing so rapidly as to be unable to take much interest in current affairs.

Admiral Bunce was born in Connecticut in 1836, and entered the naval academy in 1852. He fought in several engagements in the civil war, winning particular honor for his bravery in the fighting at Yorktown, Va., and in the skirmishing with Fort Fisher and the batteries about Fort Caswell. He took part in the Wilmington, N. C., blockade and commanded the expedition which co-operated with General Gil-

thore in the capture of Morris Island He served also in the attack on Fort Sumter and in the siege of Charleston.

In 1863 he became a lieutenant commander, a commander in 1871, a captain in 1883, a commodore in 1895 and a rear admiral in 1898. His latest service in the department was rendered as commander of the Brooklyn navy yard, to which post he was assigned in 1897.

In all respects Admiral Bunce was a model naval officer, and possessed of high ideals of duty and service. He duced in 1876, "The Pirates of Pen-



Life of Donald G. Mitchell Writer of Fiction.

Donald G. Mitchell, who for nearly half a century has been known to fame as "Ik Marvel" and whose serious illness was reported a few days ago, was born in Norwich, Conn., April 12, 1822. After graduating at Yale in 1841 he lived for a time on a farm for the benefit of his nealth, and it was then that he acquired that intense love of things pastoral and rural which breathes in his books. Mr. Mitchell went abroad in 1844, and on his return he brought with him the material for his first work. This was called "Fresh Gleanings." In 1848 he again crossed the Atlantic and spent the summer of that year in Paris, gaining inspiration for his new work, "The Battle Summer." His two best-known works, published in 1850 and 1851 respectively, are "The Reveries of a Bachelor" and "Dream Life." In 1885 he purchased a farm of 200 acres near New Haven, and has resided there since that time, writing occasionally for periodical publications, but chiefly enjoying a healthy and happy old age as peaceful as the most pleasant of Arcadian fancies. Mr. Mitchell has written but one novel,







COSTLY CALAMITY

British Forces in Transvaal Mave Numerous Losses.

TWO HUNDRED CASUALTIES ARE

Reported by Gen. Kitchener, the List the Dead, Including Commander, Being About Sixty.

London, Nov. 2.-Lord Kitchener has reported to the war office a disaster to the British near Bethel, eastern Transvaal, in which two guns were lost, several officers killed and wounded, fiftyfour men killed and 160 wounded.

The following is the text of Lord Kitchener's dispatch, dated Pretoria, Nov. 1:

"I have just heard of a severe attack made on the rear guard of Col. Benzon's column about twenty miles northwest of of Bethel, near Broken Laagte, during a thick mist. "The strength of the enemy is re-

ported to have been 1000. They rushed two guns with the rear guard, but it is uncertain whether they were able to remove them

"I fear our casualties were heavy. Col. Benzon was wounded, but not seriously. A relieving column will reach him this morning."

Later Lord Kitchener telegraphed as follows:

"Col. Barter, who marched from the constabulary line yesterday, reached Benzon's column early this (Friday) morning, unopposed. He reports that

Col. Benzon died of his wounds." The casualties were as follows:

Killed-Col, E Guinness, Maj. F. D. Murray, Capts. M. W. Lindsay and F. D. Thorouldt, Lieuts. E. V. I. Brooks and R. E. Sheppard and Second Lieut. A. J. Corlett.

Died of wounds-Capt. E. Lloud. Lord Kitchener then gives the names

of thirteen other officers who were wounded, most of them severely, and announces that fifty-four non-commissioned officers and men were killed and 160 wounded, adding that four of the latter have since died of their wounds. The dispatch then says:

FLOW IS FINE.

the San Jacinto Oil Com any a Splendid One.

Beaumont, Tex., Nov. 2 .- The well of the San Jacinto Oil company was opened Thursday afternoon and permitted to flow for about fifteen minutes in the presence of a number of the directors and President J. B. Cranfill of Dallas. The flow of oil from the well was something extraordinary. Mr. George W. Carroll, treasurer of the company, in speaking of the well, said he believes the performance was equal to anything the Lucas well did during the eraly days when it was unrestrained. It was the intention to leave the well open only a few moments, but soon after the flow started there was a quantity of rock which started coming from the pipe and the valve was left open in order to see what the development would be. The longer the flow continued the stronger it grew. The rocks continued to come out, but not in so great quantities as at first. Mr. Carroll measured the stream of oil which came from the overflow in the draining ditch and found that a solid stream fifteen inches wide and nine inches deep was flowing from the ground like a millrace.

The papers at the time gave a full account of the fact that in this well the contractor went deeper than most of the wells on Spindletop, and found a second stratum of oil-bearing sand below, apparently distinct from the first or gusher sand. This lower sand is separated from the first by a stratum of white sand about two feet thick. There were some suggestions of the oil being of a different grade, but so far no tests have been made of it, although a rough inspection seems to indicate that it may show different analysis. The well is certainly one of the best producers in the field, and by far better than the average well which has been brought in during the last few months.

The Huntley Oil and Refining company Friday shipped its first car of oil. The Huntley company has not yet finished a well, but is filling contracts for oil by a temporary traffic arrangement with other producers. The Huntley well is expected in Nov.





sidered Out of Date. Le Martin, a Paris paper of considerable circulation, recently printed an 'article on New York city and the wonderful things to be seen there. Some of the statements are a trifle tall, as will be seen from the following extracts: "The Americans are decidedly insatiable. While we are still using steam engines for our railways they have long ago tasted of the benefits of electrical traction, and now they are commencing to abandon electricity for compressed air. The New York line of Manhattan uses now, to the exclusion of all other modes, compressed air engines, and it appears that the results are so marvelous that the transatlantic papers proclaim steam as a thing of the past and electricity old-fashioned. The air is compressed in what the American calls a 'power station.' something like a gas factory. It is compressed until it attains an expansive power of 1,500 to 2,000 kilos per square centimeter that it occupies. It is then transferred on board the locomotive, where it is stored in a large steel tank, which replaces the boiler. There it is furthermore compressed by the use of reduction valves, and, reaching a certain pressure, it gets heated. It is then ready for use. In brief, to listen to the Americans, it is the locomotive long dreamed of."

Their Names on a Volcano. Leon J. Dutton is back from Guatemala, says the Philadelphia Record, full of enthusiasm over the unsuspected beauties of the southern countries. Mr. Dutton's mission was to map out a route and prepare an itinerary for a party of Philadelphia archaeologists, who will leave this city in February thoroughly equipped to explore the ruins of ancient cities that were built centuries ago. One of Mr. Dutton's strangest experiences was encountered while traveling from Chama, in Guatemala, to Belize, in Honduras. In his path lay the extinct volcano ot El Agua, the summit of which is 14,450 feet above the level of the sea. Ascending to this height he found a tablet of sandstone, on which an inscription had been carved. He had no difficulty in deciphering three-names, as follows: Alexander L'dvert, St. Petersburg; Edward Leigh Page, London, and Joseph Croskey, Philadelphia. Under these names was the date August 26, 1834. A further inscription announced that the three travelers had on that spot opened a bottle of wine and drank a toast to the rulers of the three nations they represented.






