San Angelo Standard: It is not a case with the farmers of the Concho County right now as to how much they can raise, but it is a serious matter with them as to how much they can gather.

That is the trouble generally in Texas at this time, and it has always been the trouble. If the Texas farmers would withstand the temptation of putting in more land than they can cultivate and, as a result, raising a crop which they are unable to gather, the progress of the state would have been much greater. But the rule is for the farmer to put every foot of land belonging to him in cotton or something of that kind. And then, the sea-

CARDEN SUGGESTS PRECINCT RALLIES

Full Democratic Vote Greatly Desired at Coming General Election—Address to Leaders.

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 27.—The following address was officially issued tonight, with the request that the Sunday morning papers print it; also, that the weekly newspapers of the state copy it: Headquarters State Democratic Executive Committee of Texas:—As a means of getting out a full vote at the general election it has been suggested to me that Democratic rallies, addressed by Democratic speakers in each precinct in each county in the state on election day would probably induce voters to go to the polls. I indorse this plan and commend it to you. Arrangements should be made through your committeemen for a meeting of Democrats and an address to them by a Democratic speaker in each voting precinct in your county.

As a further means to the same end I recommend, whenever it is practicable, that you will cause meetings to be held next Saturday or Saturday night in every precinct where it is practicable and urge the voters to take time enough from their personal affairs to cast their votes. A large vote will lend aid and strength to the public servants of the people in discharge of their public duties and their compliance with Democratic demands, and will increase the vote of each county in the state and district conventions, where that county polls an increased vote in the general election.

The election will be held one week from Tuesday, and it is important that every man en-

trusted with any duty with respect to the promotion of the party's good, spend as much of the intervening time as he can in seeing to it that a full vote is polled. GEORGE A. CARDEN, Chairman State Democratic Executive Committee of Texas.

son is good, his crop stands out till it is ruined because he cannot gather it. In Texas wheat can be grown with profit if the cultivation is proper. Years ago Dallas, Grayson and other counties in the black belt made from twenty-five to thirty-five bushels an acre. But then the farmers rolled their ground in the fall after the wheat was up. The effect of this was, to some extent, to prevent the soil from mushrooming in slight freezes and exposing the roots, which were killed or injured by the cold. But the roller is a thing of the past now and the crop has dropped to ten and fifteen bushels an acre. State Press has seen wheat and oats after they were cut in May and June, standing in shocks out in the fields in October. More than this, the shocks are never capped. In the country where wheat is the main crop except in California,

would be very large. It is the same way with cotton, corn and other crops. The farmers invariably overcrop themselves. Cotton will be unpicked in the fields this year till after Christmas, and it will have deteriorated. The corn will not all be gathered till after Christmas.

The result will be soggy, wet grain and much of it will be wholly ruined. We must, however, consider the temptation of the farmer to overcrop himself, when the size of all farms in Texas is considered. For if the average farmer looks out on his acres he concludes that all must be planted in something or they will yield nothing. And he generally concludes to plant cotton, thus making the crop large, the price low, and finally, leaving much of such crop in the fields. We have much to learn yet, though we have been learning a great deal in the past few years.

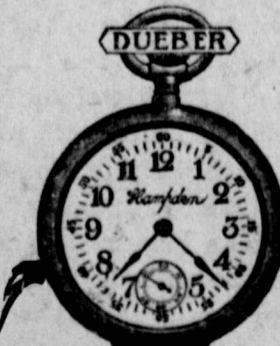

THE CROCODILE.

No Other Animal Can Look So Dead and Be So Much Alive.

There is little in the animal kingdom that can look so dead and be so much alive as a crocodile. The number of unsuspecting persons who have mistaken him for a log and have failed to discover their mistake until it was too late to be of any benefit to them will never be known.

In ancient times, several years prior to the British occupation of Egypt, some of the people of that country worshiped the crocodile as a god, there being nothing else like him. They fed him on dainties and togged him out with jewelry. In other parts of Egypt, however, the natives looked upon him as a devil. Having no firearms, they did not fill him with lead, but they managed to immolate him successfully with such weapons as were fashionable at the time.

The crocodile is not so numerous in the Nile as he was in the days of the Rameses family. In fact, he rather shuns the river now below the second cataract on account of the annoyances inseparable from tourist traffic. It seems impossible for a tourist to see a crocodile without trying to plug him with a revolver, and to a reptile that is fond of a quiet life this sort of thing is simply insufferable. He will not molest a man unless he can take him at a disadvantage, and so long as man does not unthinkingly step on him the crocodile will go his own way and calmly await his opportunity.

He feeds on fish, but for a course dinner he would rather have humanity, black preferred, which shows that there is no accounting for taste even among reptiles. His methods of capturing large game are plural as well as singular. Sometimes he will lie on a river bank partly covered with sand or mud until an absentminded native wanders within reach. Having grabbed his prey, he will waddle into the water and there drown the struggler. He will then drag his victim ashore and bury him in sand or mud and wait for days before he gorges himself.—Pall Mall Gazette.

STRENGTH OF THE TIGER.

How This Fierce Brute Kills and Carries Off Its Prey.

I have taken considerable trouble to find out how tigers kill large game, writes an assistant comptroller of forests at Perah. Some time ago I was asked to come and see a full grown bullock that had been killed by a tiger. On examining it I found the animal had its neck broken, and there were claw marks on the nose and shoulder and nowhere else. There was no doubt that the tiger had jumped at the bull and landed on the shoulder, and when the bull turned his head to gore the tiger he must have put his claw out and with a sudden jerk broken the neck.

On another occasion I went to see a young buffalo which had been killed by a tiger and found the same thing had happened. There were similar marks on the nose and also on the rear shoulder, which clearly indicated that this animal had been killed in the same way. Malays who have actually seen a tiger killing a buffalo told me they saw the same thing happen; also that in dragging off a heavy carcass, such as buffalo or bull, he gets most of the weight across his shoulder.

This must be fairly correct, as I have often followed a kill, and the marks left indicated that only a portion of the animal was trailing along the ground. I have known a full grown bull which ten men would not move dragged two miles by a tiger in a heavy jungle, where roots of trees and swamp had to be gone through. In no case have I seen the pug marks facing the wrong way except when stopping to feed, which proves he must carry a portion of the animal over his shoulder.

The old idea of a tiger killing large game by a blow from his paw is nonsense. Besides, in this country a tiger never faces his prey, but attacks him on the flank, unless charged. Another curious fact that may seem very like a fairy tale is that a tiger does not seem to mind a small lamb being tied over a kill about ten feet high, but will come and feed. I have known three occasions when this has been tried, and each time a tiger has come to feed upon the carcass.—London Field.

Art of Pleasing.

A woman cannot charm because she wants to. A man is not agreeable because he sets out to be. The proper effect must, like repartee, be spontaneous and unpremeditated. It must be radiated naturally, like light and love. Books there are that pretend to tell how it is done. They do so quite as completely as grasshoppers teach entomology. The ability to charm, to be agreeable, to entertain perfectly and to be perfectly entertaining is an art apprehensible only through influences generally prenatal, but always prolonged. The mere technique is so volatile that it must be inhaled. Like the Mayfair intonation, little by little, it must be absorbed, says Edgar Saltus in the Delineator. Kings and thugs may abash the amateur in the art of teasing, but the artist is at home with them. He puts himself in harmony with them. In the ability to do that is the whole secret of the art of pleasing.

THE 360 DAY YEAR.

Why It Had to Give Place to the System Now in Use.

There is a story in Plutarch which must convince every reader that one myth at least relates to an alteration made in the Egyptian calendar to extend the length of the year from 360 days to 365. A year of 360 days existed in Egypt at an early period. The lunar month, from new moon to new moon, being twenty-nine and one-half days in length, the convenient round number of thirty days was taken as a standard, and twelve months, of thirty days each, made up the year. The solar year is more difficult to observe than the lunar month, the intervals being longer, and a year of 360 days was a very convenient and reasonable approximation to it. At any rate, the year of 360 days came into use, and a curious custom at Acanthae, near Memphis, seems to allude to it. A perforated vessel was filled with water by 360 priests on each day of the year. In the island of Philae, again, 360 pitchers were placed around the tomb of Osiris, for making funeral libations, and were filled every day by the priests with milk. With 360 days in the year the ecliptic circle of the heavens, as represented in the charts, would be divided into 360 equal parts, and we must regard it as a relic of this time that the circle is still made to consist of 360 degrees. But so erroneous an estimate of the length of the year would soon be corrected by experience.

It is evident that in about seventy-two years a cycle would be accomplished in which the New Year's day would sweep through all the months, remaining only six years in each. The same month, so far as its name was concerned, would now be in the inundation time, now in the season of sowing and anon in the time of reaping, and the agriculturist must have been perplexed. A text in the papyrus Anastasi makes reference to such perplexity and may receive its explanation here. Goodwin translated it: "May Amen deliver me from the cold season, when the sun does not shine, the winter comes instead of the summer, the month is stormy, the hours shortened." Similar confusion would overtake the religious festivals, the New Year, for example, coming five days before its proper time, and then ten days before, and so on, and it might be thought that its observance at the wrong season would displease the gods. The year of 360 days had to give way and ultimately did so in favor of one of 365 days. The precise date of the change is not known, but it is referred to in inscriptions of the time of Amenemha I. (circa 2400 B. C.) and may of course have been introduced much earlier. When this was done the original months were not altered, but a "little month" of five days was interpolated at the end of the year between the month Mesori of one year and the Thoth of the next.—Westminster Gazette.

HABITS OF THE SHAD.

Interesting Facts About Its Incoming From the Sea.

The shad spends part of its life at sea and part of it in fresh water. At the approach of the spawning season it comes in from the sea and seeks the fresh water streams to spawn. At the close of this season it goes to sea again, there to remain until the spawning season again returns.

It is not known absolutely whether the shad remains in deep water in the ocean off the approach of the river whence it came or whether in winter it goes south into warmer waters; but it is commonly believed that when the shad returns from whatever point at sea it may to fresh water it comes back to the river in which it was born; but a percentage of the shad do not return. It may be a great percentage. It is certainly the expectation when shad fry are placed in such a river as the Hudson that the young fish which survive and go to sea will return to the Hudson. Here the shores of Long Island and New Jersey would serve as a great funnel to guide the fish, if they needed guidance, to the opening to the bay and river.

It is not supposed, however, that the shad of a river basin, like that of Chesapeake, for example, return each to its own particular stream. Chesapeake bay shad would come in from the sea together, but once inside the bay they would be likely to seek each the most convenient of the streams emptying into it.

Shad have sometimes been caught in New York bay in the early part of the season with the roe much advanced. These may be simply individual cases of early maturity in shad belonging here. Shad correspondingly late have been caught here. Roe shad have been taken in the bay as late as August, but generally the shad come in with the roe in the condition that might be expected in fish that knew where they were going and when they were going to get there, and fishermen incline to think of the early shad with the advanced roe that it is one that from some cause, perhaps stress of weather, has overrun its river.

That the shad does not always seek its own river is plainly shown on the Pacific coast, where the shad is not native, but was introduced from the east. Shad were planted there chiefly in the Sacramento river, but they have now spread all along the coast, as far north as southern Alaska. There is, however, along the Pacific coast a cold current which the shad does not seek to pass. It is found in the bays and estuaries and can be caught the year round, and the natural barrier that prevents its making an offing has doubtless led to its general movement along the coast.—New York Sun.
