The Castro oCounty monthly War Bond quota has been broken down by the Rgionale Office into community quotas, according to an announcement this week by Mayor H. W. Golden, County War Bond Chairman. Regardless of any able growth and development of change in the county quota from month to month, the community quotas remain on the same percent basis. Following is an excerpt from a letter from Mr. C. M. Smith, Regional Manager with offices at Plainview, explaining the methods by which the commonity percentages were arrived at:

This office has made a survey of the resources of each school district in Castro County and has broken down percentages to apply to the Couny War Bond quota. This percentage will apply both for monthly quotas and for special drive quotas. The percentage has been arrived at through a study of five different items, namely: population, assessed valuations, net overall income, net overall debt and area."

Even though repeated appeals have been made, and the dire necessi ty of the purchase of War Bonds has been cited through every news and advertising media, Bond purchases in Castro County have lagged and consequently during recent months sales have fallen far short of the County quota. According to a notice from State Headquarters of the War Finance Committee of Texas at Dallas, only \$3,860.00 of the \$11,600.00 November Castro County Bond quota was subscribed. Chairman Golden declared that the December quota for Castro County was the same as the November quota, \$11,600.00, but unless more spirited bond purchases resulted during the remaining days of the month the County woould again fail to raise its quota.

Following is the percent of the County quota given to each of the communities in the county, and a break down in dollars and cents of the December commuity quotas arrived at according to the District Office instructions:

The Department of Agricultural Engineering, University of Illinois, has just completed an illuminating 16-months all-weather test of some 30 different "rust preventives." Professor R. I. Shawl, Chairman of the Power and Machinery Division of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers, reports the results of the tests as follows:

"Crank case and transmission oil prevented rusting only from 7 to 30 days.

"Axle grease and pressure-gun grease prevented rusting from 60-90 days.

"5 samples of rust preventive compounds prevented rusting 276 days... but were not suitable for continued outside use.

"9 samples of rust preventive compounds prevented rusting for 365 days or more."

On the basis of this test, farmers would be well advised to get and use one of the effective new rustproof compounds today.




