RAIN RAIN RAIN COKE DRENCHED

Never Before Has This County Received Such Bounteous Rains at This Season of The Year Colorado Very High.

The biggest rains in the history of West Texas for this season of the year have fallen and the prospects for a bounteous crop and good range this year was never better. Every one is cheerful and the old time optimism and push is visible on every hand. The rain era was wide spread, in fact it covered the entire west. The Colorado river at this place is the highest in its history at this season of the year. The south approach to the iron bridge at this place was washed out and on the Orient bridge near Bronte the road has a number of hands keeping off the drift and have a locomotive on the bridge to hold it. Local weather observer H. D. Pearce, gives the precipitation 478-100 for the month of February 335-100 of which fell last Thursday and Friday. The largest acreage of wheat, oats and rye in the history of the county has been planted this year and a wonderful yield is expected. Our farmers were well up with their work, haying all their land broke and the rainfall was just right for it all to go in. Every farmer we have talked to say that the prospects for a bumper crop was never better and that it will only take a little more rain to make a good crop.

HEAVIEST RAIN IN YEARS

18 Counties in This Section well Soaked by Last Rains

Accurate reports received Saturday morning at The Standard office indicate that a glorious general rain, the best of many years, fell over 18 counties in this portion of West Texas Friday and Friday night and that not one part of that stretch of country known as Concholand has been neglected by the rain god. The counties from which direct reports have been received by telephone so far are: Tom Green, Runnels, Coke, Coleman, Brownwood, Glasscock, Reagan, Irion, Concho, Menard, Schleicher, Sutton, Crockett, Val Verde, Pecos, Nolan, Mitchell and Howard. All portions of these counties have been virtually soaked by such a downpour as is seldom experienced in West Texas. All of those splendid sheep ranges in Crockett, Schleicher, Reagan, Sutton and Pecos counties, which had previously been sparingly dealt with by Jupiter Pluvius were virtually flooded by a downpour of fully two inches. In Reagan county, near Stiles, the rain lasted for 30 hours and amounted to at least 4 inches.

Stanton, Tex.—Rain began falling here early this morning and has continued all day.

About two inches has fallen up to this time, and it continues.

Reports from the surrounding country indicate this as general, and in some places very heavy.

Midland, Tex.—Floods of rain have fallen in the Midland country the last two days, and it is still raining steadily. The rain appears to be general. This is the best rain that has fallen here for more than three years.

Colorado, Tex.—A six foot rise in Colorado river this morning was proof of a good rain in the upper country. The rainfall at 6 o'clock today has been 1.36 inches, with prospects for an all night rain.

El Paso, Tex.—A good rain has been falling, the heaviest in a year, since 2 o'clock, with no indications of clearing.

Big Spring, Tex.—Rain began falling early this morning and continued all day. At 7 p. m. 2 3-4 inches had fallen, with indications for an all-night rain.

The record shows that this section has had more rain so far this month than any previous February in the last twelve years.

Commissioners Court.

Ordered that the quarterly report of G. S. Arnold, county judge be approved.

Ordered that the quarterly report of R. E. Douglas, county clerk, be approved.

Ordered that the bond of the First State Bank at Bronte as depositary be approved.

The butchers report of Fewell Sims was approved.

Ordered by the court that Dr. F. K. Turney be appointed health officer for Coke county for the next two years.

In the matter of the petition of M. Patterson et al for public road granted and W. O. Bnum, G. W. Davidson, B. W. Shropshire, R. B. Hart and J. C. Harmon were appointed a jury of view.

Quarterly report of C. L. Hughes, County Treasurer was approved.

Ordered by the court that W. D. Renneau be employed as court house janitor at a salary of \$15 per month.

Ordered by the court that G. S. Arnold, county judge be authorized to purchase on credit of county the following books: One Sale's Justice Guide and one Sale's Civil Statutes with supplement.

Ordered that school district No. 2 be authorized to issue bonds in the sum of four thousand dollars to run 40 years at rate of 5 per cent for the purpose of constructing a stone building and purchasing site for same, also ordered that a tax of 25 cents on the one hundred dollars to create sinking fund and pay interest on the same.

In the matter of canvassing the returns of a special election held Jan 7 in school district 26 to determine whether or not a tax of 30 cents on the 100 valuation for the purpose of supplementing the state school fund was canvassed and found as follows: For school tax 4 votes; against school tax, no votes.

Ordered by the court that the proposition of T. Sykes, proprietor of Robert Lee Water Works or successor to furnish water needed for court house yard and watering trough at 12 1-2 cents per 1000 gallons and T. E. Cullender was appointed to purchase a suitable meter.

Ordered that S. H. Chumley be appointed overseer on the Bronte and Marye road.

Ordered that G. S. Arnold County Judge, be appointed to oversee planting of trees in the court house yard and have same

leveled up, graded and planted in Bamuda grass.

Motion made to declare the Water Valley and Divide road a second class road was lost.

Ordered by the court that D. T. Averitt be employed by the court for \$25 to complete the appeal in the B. A. Taylor case to the court of Civil Appeals for the 3rd district and the county pay the expense of said appeal.

Motion by R. B. Hudson to settle the case with B. A. Taylor and also to settle with Vinyard for the road on his land was lost.

Ordered by the court that Valley View voting precinct No. 5 be put in commissioners precinct No. 1 and Wild Cat voting precinct No. 10 be put in commissioners precinct No. 3.

Ordered that W. P. Graves, county surveyor be employed to make a sketch of such changes in the boundary lines of commissioners and justice precincts affected and present to the court for adoption at the March term 1911. Also that he trace the public roads on county map at \$2 per day.

In the matter of the petition of C. C. Ivey et al for a change in the Bronte and Fort Chadbourne road that the matter be postponed for action until the March term of this court but that the proposed new road may be opened up but the old one not fenced or changed until the proper order is made for said change.

The petition for the change in Fort Chadbourne and Rannels county line was deferred.

Ordered that the class of the Robert Lee and Sterling City road be changed from a 3rd to a 1st class road.

In the matter of the suit of B. A. Taylor vs Coke county it is ordered by the court that the same be approved.

Ordered by the court that the appointment of road overseers be postponed until the special march term 1911.

Citation By Publication.

The State of Texas.

To the Sheriff or any Constable of Coke county, Texas—Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon R. E. Bentley by making publication of this citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper in the 51st judicial district; but if there be no newspaper published in said judicial district, then in a newspaper published in the nearest district to said 51st judicial district, to appear at the next regular term of the Justice Court for precinct No. two (2), in said county of Coke, State of Texas, to be held at my office in the town of Bronte, Texas, in the county aforesaid, on the 11th day of March, A. D. 1911, to answer the suit of South Texas Lumber Company, plaintiff, a private corporation, duly incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas, with an office and place of business at Bronte, Coke county, Texas, with E. J. Schwartz as manager in charge, against R. E. Bentley defendant, being numbered No. 86, on the docket of said court, and filed on the 26th day of January, 1911, the nature of plaintiff's demand being in substance as follows: Suit upon four verified open accounts as follows:

1st. In favor of South Texas Lumber Company against R. E. Bentley, defendant, for building material furnished and delivered to defendant by plaintiff, at the special instance and request of the defendant, during the year, 1909, amounting to the sum of \$25.20.

2nd. In favor of Butler & McCuiston, druggists, against R. E. Bentley, defendant, for drugs, and druggists' sundries, furnished and delivered to defendant by the said Butler & McCuiston, at the special instance and request of the defendant, during the year, 1909, amounting to the sum of \$14.55.

3rd.
