Such a road would be of inestimable benefit to San Angelo as it would give her an outlet to a country with which the city has thus far had little connection with and would put her in touch with several of the largest rail roads operating in Texas. It is understood that the H. & T. C. is controlled by the Southern Pacific, whose advent into the West Texas field would open a new era in railroad construction and development.

The main line of the Houston & Texas Central runs from Denison in the extreme northern part of Texas to Houston, via Sherman, Dallas, Corsicana and Hempstead. A prong of the railroad extends from Hempstead to Llano, running via Austin, while another branch of the road operates from Burnet to Lampases. The system traverses practically the entire length of the state from north to south and stretches about half across Texas from east to west. It has connections with Katy, Frisco, Santa Fe, and other big systems.
