# STATE RETURNS SHOW AMENDMENT DEFEATED

Only Counties From Which Reports Have Not Been Received Ar Upton and Winkler--Majority of 7,641 For Opponents--Nine Counties Only Partial Reports.

The News this morning prints practically complete returns from hundreds of people who gatherthe election held last Saturday upon the proposition to adopt an amendment to the Texas Constitution prohibiting the sale or manufacture of liquor within the state.

These returns give a majority of 6,037 against the amendment, and The News believes that the final returns will not show a material difference from these figures. A mass of reports is still when I hope to be prepared to coming in, but most of these are duplicates of former reports, and many others make only slight changes from the figures already reported. The News, therefore, regarding it certain that the amendment has been defeated upon the face of the returns by about 6,000 majority, will suspend compilation of the returns until the official figures are available from practically all of the counties. Only a few official reports have thus far been re ceived The returns received by The News show these totals:

For prohibition, 230,631.

Against prohibition, 236,668.

The only counties from which reports have not been received are Upton and Winkler, the combined voting strength of which is 202. The News has complete reports from 236 counties and very nearly complete reports from the ten remaining counties, in which, as a rule, the vote of all but one or two small boxes has been re-

The nine counties from which these partial but nearly complete reports have been received are Armstrong, Donley, Moore, Pecos, Presidio, Red River, Dickens, Tarrant and Bailey.

The additional reports from these counties can hardly prove an important factor in the result.

# Statement By Ball.

Houston, Tex., July 24. Col. T. H. Ball, chairman of the State-Wide Prohibition Amendment Association, has issued a statement conceding that the antis have won by less than 5,000 majority, but declaring that they had not won legally.

Col. Ball also issued a call requesting the executive committee of the prohibition organization to meet in Ft. Worth on Saturday, July 29, to determine the advisability of contesting the election.



# The Struggle for Power.

The outstanding ambition of the hua way as to multiply power. Labor, with as free trade. the mighty trend of a nation marshaling its army, is seeking to arrange its forces so as to increase power. The farmer, with the patient and honest endeavor typical of his occupation, is seeking by organized methods to gain power. Each is endeavoring to combine two or more economic units of their class in such a way as to increase the power of both. The purposes are laudable, but the methods each must employ present problems in which all humanity is involved and they must be finally settled at the fireside.

# The Problems Upon Us.

We are well into these problems with capital in the foreground, Numerous solutions have been suggested, but the most primitive one is that of prohibtting by law the extension and multiplication of power through organized effort. This solution is manifestly impracticable. No one would for a moment tolerate a law that would prevent the invention or use of an appliance which would multiply the power of steam or any other potential energy. because perchance it might also increase the danger-in growth the element of danger always increases at the same ratio as other component parts. To destroy or limit power is to strike down progress and return to the dark ages, and is an ac mowledgment of our incapacity to cope with human affairs. We must quickly recede from this position or pass rapidly on to government ownership.


To acquire the highest degree of etficiency in civilization, we must develop every pound of energy and power for usefulness there is in all things and multiply this power as many times as human ingenuity can devise, minimtzing, as far as possible, the element of danger without weakening the source of power.

Railroad mileage is the yard stick of progress. We have in Texas 14,000 miles of railroad and rank first of all states in the Union in mileage. In miles per area, we rank fortieth, having 5.15 miles of railroad per 100 square miles of territory. In mileage per population, we rank nineteenth, having 38.49 miles of railroad per 10,000 people.

The comparative test of railroad facilities is in miles per area. If we had the mileage per area that the state of Illinois has we would have 55,500 miles; that Indiana has 54,000 miles and that Iowa has 46,000 miles. We have only 14,000 miles.

According to the last interstate commerce commission report, compiled June 30, 1909, we constructed 273 miles during the previous year and ranked fourth in the list of states in the Union in construction during the year. We are more in need of railroad construction than any other state in the Union. The railroad development of Texas has not kept pace with the development of other lines of industry. Our railroad mileage during the past ten years has increased 35 per cent; the value of manufactured products has increased 92 per cent; the value of farm lands 157 per cent and the development of all lines of industry has been retarded for want of railroad facilities.

Texas is the most important field in railroad construction of any state in the Union. According to the 1910 comptroller's report, we have forty-seven counties in Texas without railroad facilities and we have approximately 40,000,000 acres of territory that is a distance of ten miles and over from a railroad. from a railroad.

The heavy con ADVERTISING RATES - Single struction is this side of Freder icksburg, where it is going to require a great deal of money to get through that section. Our chief engineer, after going over the situation, does not think the old grade can be utilized for first-class construction on account of heavy grades and curvatures. However, this has not been fully determined. He is going to look further into the matter.

"We would be very glad for others to undertake the construction of a line from San Antonio to Fredericksburg, where we could without any great difficulty meet them at that point. We are not anxious to undertake construction through the heavy work that will be encountered south of Fredericksburg.

"Concerning anything that was said to the people of Fredericksburg, that is a matter to discuss with them, as we only visited that section looking over the country, but the people of Fredericksburg are very anxious for and are certainly entitled to transportation. Gillespie county is one of the richest counties of Texas and is composed of the best citizenship of the state. They have waited so long and patiently for transportation that they have become abitious, not only for a local line, but to have Fredericksburg placed upon a trunk line. # Kill More Than Wild Beast

The number of people killed yearly by wild beasts don't approach the vast number killed by disease germs. No life is safe from their attack.
