The new school law provides for the appointment by the commissioners court of five trustees no wise to interfere with the duties of the various district trustees now provided for under the law. Following is a clipping showing the restrictions and some of the duties of this county board of trustees: Under provisions of an act of ast legislature providing for the county school board, investng said board with all duties heretofore exercised th the comintssioners court, undef a valing of the attorney general the commissioners court will continue o exercise control and manage ment as follow:

1. To approve the reports of he depositories of school funds. 2. To make changes in the boundaries of indpendent school districts.
2. To make sale of school 4. To invest the county permnent school funds.
3. To levy special school taxe, and to issue and provide for he sale of common school dis6 .
rove To orjer the election, apof bond, and pay the salary 7 . county superintendent. into school districts and to make changes in district lines.
The seven above duties, or unctions will remain in the commissioners court.
The duty of the county trusrees is to classify the schools of he county into primary, internediate and high school. They and supervise the county seber nd confer with the truppers ol constitute a body corporate. They shall apportion the state vailable fund among the sever1 districts.
They shall meet once eacl quarter on the first Monday in August, November, February. and May.
They shall be paid actual ex penses not to exceed $\$ 3$ a day, or more than $\$ 24$ per year.

The New Law For Marking Cotton Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
That the owners, lessees, operators or receivers of all cotton gins, in this state, shall stamp or write, upon each and every bale of cotton ginned by them, in plain figures, the weight of the bagging and ties in which the cotton is wrapped, said figures to be written or stamped with indelible ink, and shall be not less than four inches in height and three inches in width and shall be preceded by the word "tare," written or stamped upon the bale with indelibe ink, the letters composing said word to be not less than four inches width. Any person wilfully violating the provision of this section shall be guilty of a mis demeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten, nor more than one hundred dollars.

The Spirit of Co-operation In spite of all this, the counry prospered. The first bank was established in 1888. This
was the beginning of the end of high prices. The bank lent money at a reasonable rate, and the farmers and business men The first compress was built in 1895. The merchant got rid o his boll weevil, the cotton com nission merchant. The com press was flourishing and every thing was running along smooth $y$ and then in 1908 came th boll weevil. This was the con dition of things at the time of the renaissance, the grand awak ening. We began to observe think, deduce. It was only then that we realized that the inter ests of the farmer and the busi ness man were mutual made noney, the other prospered. If one failed, both failed They were linked together more closely than the Gold Dust twins, Percy and Alexander, even from Vardaman standpoint. They began with on with each other. The Boar nd we discovered that whil we were making annually a crop of cotton worth $\$ 800,000.00$ to $81,000,000.00$, we were paying
out each year almost $\$ 700,000.00$ for corn, meat products and fer or corn, meat products and fer Hizer. We realized that w were both suffering from the
one crop mania and that a farmone crop mania and that a farm-
ing country would always be poor if it were unable to raise ood enough to feed man and beast. We began planting plen ty Fall oats, raising corn fo hogs and cattle. Your speaker got enthusiastic and wrote a book on grain growing and bought in partnership with the
present sheriff of our county, who is also a farmer, a portable oat threshing machine and gavd demonstrations every Saturda during the grain gathering sea son.
That little threshing machin was sent to all parts of the coun
try. Even if the farmer try. Even if the farmer ha only twenty bushels of oats teach him how to put uphis oats in marketable packages. We farmers. We employed, at the farmers. We employed, at the instructors to go through th country and teach the farmer how to farm under boll weevi conditions. We organized county fair. We commenced work on good roads, and in less than a year, with the aid of the good roads apostle, Charles W Thatcher, we had succeeded in ketting a bond issue of $\$ 150.0{ }^{0} 0$ 00 for District One of the county which contains the city of Brook haven. We organized a Co-op rative Creamery, the farmers taking one-third of the stock and the business men two thirds. To show the effect of the co-operation, I wish to state that this creamery ran along in a desultory manner for about three months after it was organized,
receiving about 200 gallons of receiving
milk daily.

The business men relized that omething would have to be don to stimulate it. A meeting of the Board of Trade was called, and each and every business man and banker in the citv would help any customer who wished to engage in the dairy business provided he was worthy and regardless of whether they owed money or not. We sent a
committee with the resolutions to a meeting of the Dairy Men.
and in less than four weeks the receipts of the creamery were increased to 700 gallons of milk daily. We organized a molasses manufacturing company and commenced working with the United States Government for the eradication of the cattle tick. the eradication of the cattle tick.
We introduced monthly trade We introduced monthly trade
day, setting aside the first Satday, setting aside the first Sat-
urday of each month as a trade urday of each month as a trade
day, the object being to get all day, the object being to get all farmers who had anything to sell or to trade to bring it in to market on that day. In order
to make these trade days interto make these trade days interesting, and in a measure to make he farmer forget the boll wee vil, we gave a series of entertainments on each alternate rade day. We opened it with big barbecue, advertising that e would entertain all our coun y friends, and we entertained hem royally. After that we ad a trade parade. Then on nother trade day, a horse show. On the last Saturday we pulled
off one of the prettiest flower ane of the prettiest flower We have secured an appropation of $\$ 77,000.00$ for a post ffice building at Brookhaven; and our latest work was to col lect from our business men $10,000.00$ to aid in building a 50000.00 improvement to Whit orth College, a sectarian in titution.
I run the risk of boring you with all these statistics, my riends, in order to show you how we are pulling together up here in the "hills" and to prove o you the old philosophy that, what appears on the surface as calamity, as a rule proves to We blessing.
We never improve when we travel in a rut. It makes a "jolt" 6 wake us up, and it takes ad ity to put us on our mettle bring about an improvement or condition.
Now, these are things as they were and as they are. What of the future? We are going to keep on working. We enjoy it. We are working shoulder to shoulder, farmer, business man
and professional man. Our motto is the same as that of the three guardsmen in Dumas' grea work, "All for one and one for We are going to build up our country and make it prosperous. We expect to plant orchards and vineyards on its red hills. We expect to fill up the gullies, blow up the stumps, broaden out the patches into fields, enrich our lands and lift the mortgage which now hangs like a dark cloud over the roof of the little farm house.
We are introducing improved farming implements, and we hope in the near future to see
