Texas Industrial Notes.

A charter has been granted the Brady Oil and Gas Company; capital stock \$100,000.

Four hundred and thirty-three acres of land in Ellis county recently sold for a cash consideration of \$40,000.

The Rio Grande Horticultural Society has been organized at Brownsville with a membership of fifty.

Amarillo has been selected as the next meeting place of the Panhandle and Southwestern Cattlemen's Association.

It is reported that Fort Worth has been chosen the eastern terminus of the Stamford and Eastern Railway.

Actual construction has begun on the terminal railroad leading from Port Aransas to Aransas Pass.

The state railway commissioner has been advised that the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe has appropriated \$1,125,000 for improvement of its lines in Texas.

The Coleman Commercial Club will raise \$500 to be given to the winners in the Boys Corn Contest.

A Truck Growers Association has been organized at Magnet, Wharton County.

The Katy will run a special train from Fort Worth to San Antonio for the annual convention of the Texas Bankers' Association to be held in San Antonio May 7th, 8th and 9th. The train will be especially decorated for the occasion.

A charter has been granted the Eureka Orchard Corporation of Houston; capital stock \$85,000.

The Harlington Board of Trade has been succeeded by the Harlington Commercial and Agricultural Association.

The Pioneer Gas Company has completed laying its pipe line from the Moran Natural Gas fields to Albany, a distance of 17 miles.

Arrangements are being made by the Brady Commercial Club and the Santa Fe Railway Company for a beautiful park along the track of the Santa Fe in north Brady.

Work is rapidly progressing on the new eight-stand gin at Harlington. Four of these stands will be for long staple cotton, of which that section has 2000 acres this year.

March 20th will be Hog and Corn Club Day at the Fat Stock Show to be held in Fort Worth March 18-23rd. The members of both organizations will be entertained by the merchants of Fort Worth.

It is reported that an immense irrigation scheme will soon be launched near Kingsville, capable of watering 50,000 acres of land.

Plans are being made by Game Fish and Oyster Commissioner Sterett, to establish a museum of stuffed birds, animals and fish at the Capitol.

A Ten Thousand Club has been organized at Persall for the purpose of advertising the city.

According to figures of the State Department of Agriculture, 3,906,445 bales of cotton have been ginned in the state this season against a total of 2,921,655 bales for the corresponding part of the season of 1910-11.

Two hundred head of sheep, raised near San Angelo, were recently sold for \$20. each.

Tracklaying has begun on the Victoria extension of the Brownsville railroad at Bloomington. It is reported that a half mile of track will be laid a day and the work will be completed within a month.

Four train loads of homeseekers arrived in Houston last week from various sections of the Middle West. They will go to all parts of South and Southwest Texas.

A Civic League has been organized at Temple.

A contract has been let for the construction of two more stories on the new terminal station at Houston to cost approximately \$200,000.

It is reported that there are from 40,000 to 200,000 acres of land susceptible to reclamation in Brazoria and Fort Bend counties.

The Northern Texas Traction Company will doubletrack part of its line between Fort Worth and Dallas soon. For this purpose the capital stock has been increased \$1,500,000.

A track of land consisting of 823 acres, near Brownsville, recently sold for \$77,000.

The City Council of Lufkin, has granted a franchise for a new automatic telephone system for that town, and work will begin soon on its installation.

The Bering Manufacturing Company of Houston has filed amendments increasing its capital stock from \$80,000 to \$300,000.

Johnson county farmers have agreed to plant 4,350 acres of peanuts in order to secure the installation of a peanut oil mill.

It is reported that a farmer of Ohio has purchased 200 acres of land in Hale county and plans to irrigate and sow the entire tract in alfalfa.

As a result of the straightening of the Texas-New Mexico boundary line, 10,000 acres of land will be added to Texas.

The Magnolia Petroleum Company is installing a pumping station at Richards with a capacity of 20,000 barrels of oil per day.

The Texas Good Roads Association will meet in Fort Worth March 19th. The purpose of the meeting is to devise ways and means of carrying on the work of the association.

The Jobbers and Manufacturers League of Fort Worth is planning to hold a six days excursion through Fort Worth's trade territory.

A Comparison.

Conditions in Coke County compared with Middle Texas: While we have had it hard enough here, many parts are in a worse condition than here. In the Dallas and Collin counties where land is worth from \$75 to \$150 an acre, thousands of acres planted in corn did not make a flat grain, and the most of the country being in cultivation, there is no grass and all stock had to be fed during the winter.

In this country many stock have wintered on grass without other food. Besides there is about feed stuff enough in the country for farmers to make a crop on, this year. So we may congratulate ourselves on conditions and not become too pessimistic.

The Borrowed Dollar Patriotic. Volume of Texas Money Too Small.

Cheap money is the fount that makes the brook of industry flow. Withdraw it from circulation and industry withers, civilization blights, prosperity stagnates and poverty stalks over the land.

The borrowed dollars vaults heavenward with its magnificent skyscrapers, delves into the bowels of the earth in search of hidden treasures, spans the prairies with bands of steel, thrills the air with the scream of factory whistles and searches land and sea on its mission of commercial adventure.

The borrowed dollar is the most patriotic of our circulating medium. No declarations of war are made without its approval; it fights our battles, dictates treaties of peace and at its bidding nations have sprung into life or sunk into oblivion. It is the first to answer the call "to arms" its voice is in the roar of cannon; it fills the knapsack of the soldier and it cares for the widows and orphans and is one of the best friends Uncle Sam ever had.

In times of peace, it performs deeds of industrial heroism by rescuing sinking enterprises and lifting up fallen industries and no worthy enterprises ever appeal to it in vain. Cheap money means prosperity to the people.

If, by inviting cheap money to Texas, we can reduce the rate of interest only one per cent, we have a net saving to the borrowing public of \$10,000,000 per annum and cheap money will enable many gigantic enterprises to spring into life by making it possible to finance them.

Equal rights of money is as important to our growth and development as equal rights of the individual, for money is power. We do not increase the wealth of the State by transferring money from one individual or corporation to another. It is in bringing money into the State from the outside that our increase begins. The volume of Texas money is too small; we must get development money from the outside.

Attracts Farmers Attention.

Fort Worth, Texas, March 18.—The announcement that the Texas Welfare Commission would discuss the production and marketing of cotton, has been received with approbation in all sections of the state. Especially has this been the case in the chief cotton-producing counties. Communications have been received from farmers in the great cotton-growing counties of Hill, Ellis and Williamson, manifesting great interest in the discussion. One prominent cotton-planter said: "Your commission could not have undertaken a greater work than the consideration of the cotton industry. It is the most vital subject before the Texas farmer today and the correct solving of the cotton problem means more to him than any other one thing in which he is interested."

25 Killed in Explosion.

San Antonio, Mar. 18th—25 men were instantly killed, 50 others were injured and four buildings wrecked at 8:50 this morning, when a locomotive boiler at the Southern Pacific round house exploded. The disaster is the most horrible of its kind in the history of the state.

Pieces of human flesh—legs, arms—are lying everywhere. The men were blown to fragments and pieces of them are being found three blocks away. Identification of the majority of them will be impossible. Walter Jordan, an engineer who was in the cab when the boiler exploded, has been identified.

Buildings within three blocks of the engine were wrecked. The locomotive boiler was blown three blocks away. The tender of the engine shot back 150 feet. Parts of machinery shot up into the air as high as 1,000 feet and rained down on adjacent buildings. Many were injured by falling machinery.

In the machine and blacksmith shops the men never knew what happened. Fourteen men in here were dismembered. In the round house and copper shops the men were killed by the falling walls. These buildings were complete wrecks. The

Average Value of Land, \$14.53.

Washington, D. C., March 18.—The Federal Department of Agriculture has just issued a bulletin which shows that the average price per acre of farm land in Texas was \$14.53 in 1910. In 119 counties the average is between \$10 and \$25 and in 91 counties it is less than \$10 per acre. The greater number of these counties are in the western and southwestern parts of the state, but a few are in the extreme eastern part. Higher average values of farm land, ranging from \$25 to \$50, are found in 28 counties, nearly all of which are located in the east-

falling walls in the machine and blacksmith shops buried twelve men. Rescue parties are at work. Weeping women and children, families or relatives of the dead men, besiege the scene of the disaster, the scene is ghastly.

Nearly all of the dead and wounded were strikebreakers, employed by the Southern Pacific to fill the places of the machinists who went out on a strike several months ago.

Crowds of people through the vicinity of the explosion. Some of them are gathering up small fragments of the bodies of the victims. Many arms and legs were found jammed in the crevices of either the roof of the shops or in the machinery. Robert Lipscomb, foreman of the shops, was hurled 30 feet by the explosion. He arose in a semi-conscious condition.
