TUESDAY'S ELECTION DEMOCRATIC VICTORY

Wilson & Marshall Win By Overwhelming Majority—A Democratic House Maintained With Increase.

The Democratic candidates for President and Vice Presidents were victorious by an overwhelming vote throughout the Nation. The best advances give Wilson 395; Roosevelt 117; Taft 15; Doubtful 4 of the electoral vote. The election of Wilson and Marshall is conceded by the other candidates, indications are that the Democrats will maintain their present majority in the house with possible gain.

General Election.

The general election in Coke county was a very tame affair, there being scarcely any interest taken, the primary having eliminated that. The vote was very light. The voting strength of this county is something over 900 votes, yet there was less than 500 votes cast in the gen-

eral election.

All Democratic nominees were elected. At Robert Lee Taft received one vote, Teddy one vote and Debbs five votes.

Dallas, Texas, November... The report of Tom Finty, Jr., Chairman of the Committee on Compensation to Employes for Casualties Occurring in Course of Employment to the Texas Welfare Commission, deals with one of the most important problems which will confront the next Legislature. Mr. Finty is a close and able student of economics, a gifted writer of national reputation, and as staff correspondent of the Dallas News, he has illuminated many important subjects of state.

Mr. Finty's report condemns the present method of fixing responsibility for work accidents as working a hardship to both employer and employee, and he very clearly lays down a much more modern and humane doctrine in the following language:

"It is economically and socially unsound to require workmen to assume the risks and to hold employers responsible only in the case of their own proven negligence, for the nature of modern industries is such that

accidents are inevitable; that the seeming negligence of employees oftentimes is not negligence at all and that as accidents are incidental to the industries, the industries themselves, and not the employees, should bear the burdens resulting therefrom. In the end society must bear the burden of compensation for work accidents, and such compensation ought to be reduced to a definite system and considered in the light of a pension just as the government pensions its disabled soldiers."

The Commission recommends

to the 33rd Legislature the enactment of a comprehensive workman's compensation law, modeled after successful legislation of other states and counties, fully set forth in the text of the report.

Department of Agriculture.

Fort Worth, Texas, October—Mr. J. L. Quicksall, State agent of the Federal Department of Agriculture, recently held a convention of the West Texas County Field Agents in this city.

Fifty-three agents were present and spent four days discussing practical problems of the Texas farmer. The adaptation of crops to soil and climatic conditions and the conservation of moisture were among the themes discussed by the demonstrators.

Mr. Quicksall announced in favor of encouraging the business men to co operate in the development of our agricultural interests and in discussing the Farm Life Commission proposed by the Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association, said:

"The commercial clubs in my territory have rendered valuable assistance to my department and have co operated in demonstration work in a substantial manner. I am glad to learn that this co-operation is to be carried on in a state way. The farmers of Texas need the assistance of the progressive business men in solving many problems of farm life. The Farm Life Commission can render a great service to Texas.
