A. & M. College Certain of Success

Austin, Jan. 25.—The West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College—that is what it will be called for the moment—rose out of the chimerical today and loomed on the legislative horizon of Texas' Capital City as the expected, following a day of work among West Texas and other members of the Legislature, by representatives here of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Where defeat threatened the bill last week, things shaped themselves today to give appearances that with the further proper management West Texas will realize its dream of ten years for a college teaching the art of agriculture upon the soil of West Texas.

A Caucus of West Texans was held in the Senate chamber tonight and at the conclusion of it all the West Texans were optimistic. Homer P. Brelsford, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce; Porter Whaley, general manager, and William Woodall, in charge of the Austin bureau, attended.

It may not be an agricultural or a mechanical college, because the mechanical phase of the work is likely to be cut out of the original bill. The teaching of the engineering arts is being done at the present Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and with equipment which has cost, during the course of years, more than a million of dollars. To duplicate it at the college to be located somewhere west of the ninety-eighth meridian would cost more money than this, because of the increase of prices for materials of this sort.

The condition which has always demanded the establishment of an agricultural school in West Texas has not been the demand for a technical school, because the technical schools in Texas are taking care of the educational work along this line. The need has been for an agricultural school because the climate and the soil and nearly every condition touching agriculture in West Texas is entirely different from that in Grimes County, where the Agricultural and Mechanical College is located.

The institution, as it will be established under the act which will be drawn, will be an agricultural institution of the first class, teaching the same curriculum as is taught at the Mechanical College of Texas, and ranking equal and coordinate, in academic and agricultural work with the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas.

One of the mooted questions now, as it has been since the inception of the campaign for a West Texas agricultural institution, is the method for the location of the school.

Talk varied yesterday to a legislative committee, three members of the House and two members of the Senate. That hardly has been favorably received, opposition cropping out.

The latest proposal is that the members of the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, after forthcoming vacancies are filled, select the location.

West Texas A. & M.

Austin, Jan. 21.—The West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College bill is in the hands of the Committee on Education in the House. There it will rest until Monday, and a hearing will likely be held on it Tuesday.

The West Texas members of the House and Senate are taking no action on the bill, and are doing nothing in its interest pending the expected arrival Monday of former Senator Homer P. Brelsford, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and Porter Whaley, general manager of the chamber.

The bill, as introduced by Representatives Chitwood, Hill and Rowland, is exactly the same bill as the one that was passed by the Thirty-fifth Legislature.

When it was introduced these members expected to introduce amendments, probably in the committee, definitely fixing the place where the new college will be located, but as it stands now it will be an open field, and every town in West Texas, or west of the ninety-eighth meridian, can bid for it. The commission which will locate it will be composed of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Commissioner of Agriculture and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. None of these people live in West Texas.

Governor Neff's home is in Waco. Lieutenant Governor Davidson's home is in Houston. Lewisville, Denton County, is the residence of the Speaker of the House. Geo. B. Terrell, the commissioner of agriculture, lives at Alto, in Cherokee County. Miss Annie Webb Blanton, prior to her becoming State Superintendent of Public Instruction, was a teacher in the College of Industrial Arts at Denton.

Sheep Queen Once Penniless

San Angelo, Jan. 23.—The funeral of Mrs. Johanna Wilhelm, 71, "Sheep Queen of the Southwest," and whose rise from a penniless German peasant woman to a millionairess rivals romance in the yellow backs, was held at Menard Sunday.

Mrs. Wilhelm came to Texas from Germany in 1868, her husband dying shortly afterward. Starting with a small flock which she herded herself, she acquired 40,000 acres of land and flocks worth more than \$1,000,000.

She bought land when it was worth 75 cents an acre and today most of it is worth \$25. an acre. Several years ago she became one of the leading figures of the sheep raising industry by being the first to inaugurate improved methods of breeding and fencing.

Her estate will be inherited by two sons and five daughters.

Plan-to-Cease Operations Preparations are to be made by hundreds of small telephone exchanges in Texas to cease operations on February 7, the date that the minimum wage of \$12 per week for operators goes into effect, it is announced.

The minimum wage of \$12 per week based on a 48 hour week means that the smallest exchange will be forced to pay operators \$182 per month where as at least 400 small telephone exchanges, it is stated, have gross receipts of not more than \$200 per month, many of them having gross receipts of less than \$100 per month. It is estimated that hundreds of operators will be without work.
