### News From The CASTRO COUNTY WIND EROSION DISTRICT

SUPERVISORS—Barber Eubanks, Chairman; R. A. Axtell, Secretary; W. V. Boston, Orbin Nowell, Flor ence Ball.

In the fall of 1943, Mr. W. F. Glenn, who farms six miles east and four miles north of Dimmitt, planted a forty-four acre field to crested wheatgrass. About twelve pounds of grass seed per acre were drilled right in the wheat stubble which had not been plowed or chiseled after wheat harvest. Mr. Glenn had such good luck in getting a stand on this field that the following fall, he planted another twenty-seven acre field to this grass, with equally good results. By rotating the grazing of these two fields, Mr. Glenn states that he has been able to carry from forty to fifty head of cows and calves during the summer months on these pastures.

Reports received from experimental stations on the High Plains have proved that crested wheatgrass pastures under dry land conditions will produce from two to three times as much grazing as native grass pastures. Crested wheatgrass has the additional advantage in that it is a winter-grow-

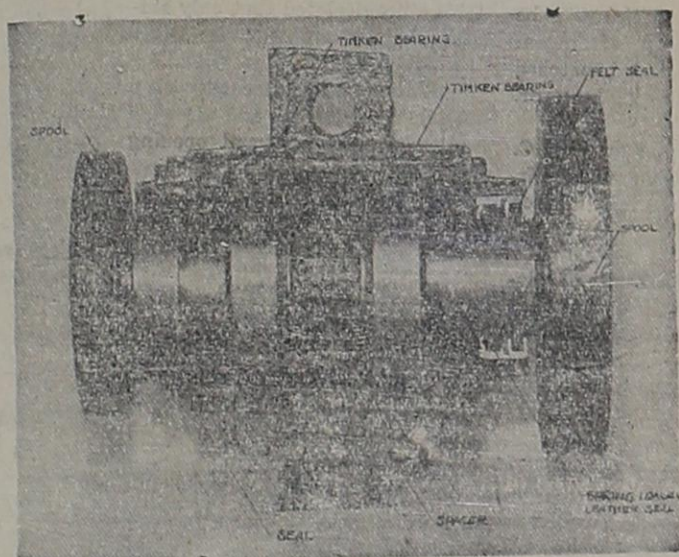

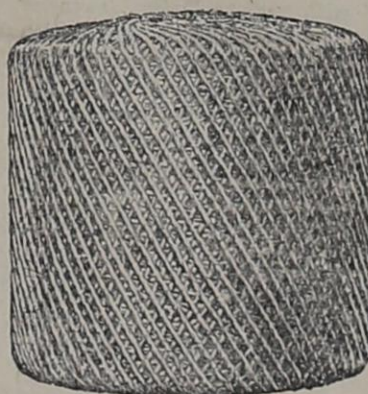

**Pyorrhea Not Incurable**

Austin, September 17.—Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is incurable, this is only true in the most advanced cases. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises those persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea to seek an early diagnosis from their dentist so that proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still curable.

"Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of its existence," Dr. Cox said. "Regular visits to the family dentist are therefore extremely important."

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therapeutic features is the proper hygienic care of teeth and gums as outlined by any reputable dentist. Carelessness regarding mouth hygiene is usually the basic cause for the condition.

The family dentist can usually remove the cause of the trouble, Dr. Cox said, and when this has been done, intelligent routine home care of the mouth by the patient will effect a cure in the majority of early cases.

**THE EGG AND YOU**  
Mattie Lee Seago

Whether you're a homemaker, husband or hotel manager you probably have some occasion to buy eggs at one time or another. And whether you know it or not, there's money to be saved in the way you buy eggs.

The Department of Agriculture . . . plus the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service and the Production and Marketing Administration here in this state . . . is dispensing information to consumers about egg-buying . . . giving you a chance to make your egg-money stretch. The grade label on the egg is your best guide to quality in an egg buy. Check the meaning of the egg grades with your grocer and then check at home to see that the eggs you buy measure up to the standards.

You may want to try this quality test. Take a look at the "broken out appearance" of an egg or two just as soon as you get home with them. AA and A grade eggs have a large proportion of firm white, standing up all around the yolk. The yolk itself is round and upstanding. Eggs of lower quality, just as good for many uses . . . have a smaller proportion of thick white, or no thick white at all. When broken up, the egg white covers a large area . . . spreads out thinly. The yolk is less round, and it may break easily. These differences in high and low quality eggs, don't affect food value. They do make some difference in the use you make of eggs. The higher quality, more expensive eggs are best for poaching, frying, and cooking in the shell. If you choose good eggs, be sure you get the quality you pay for.

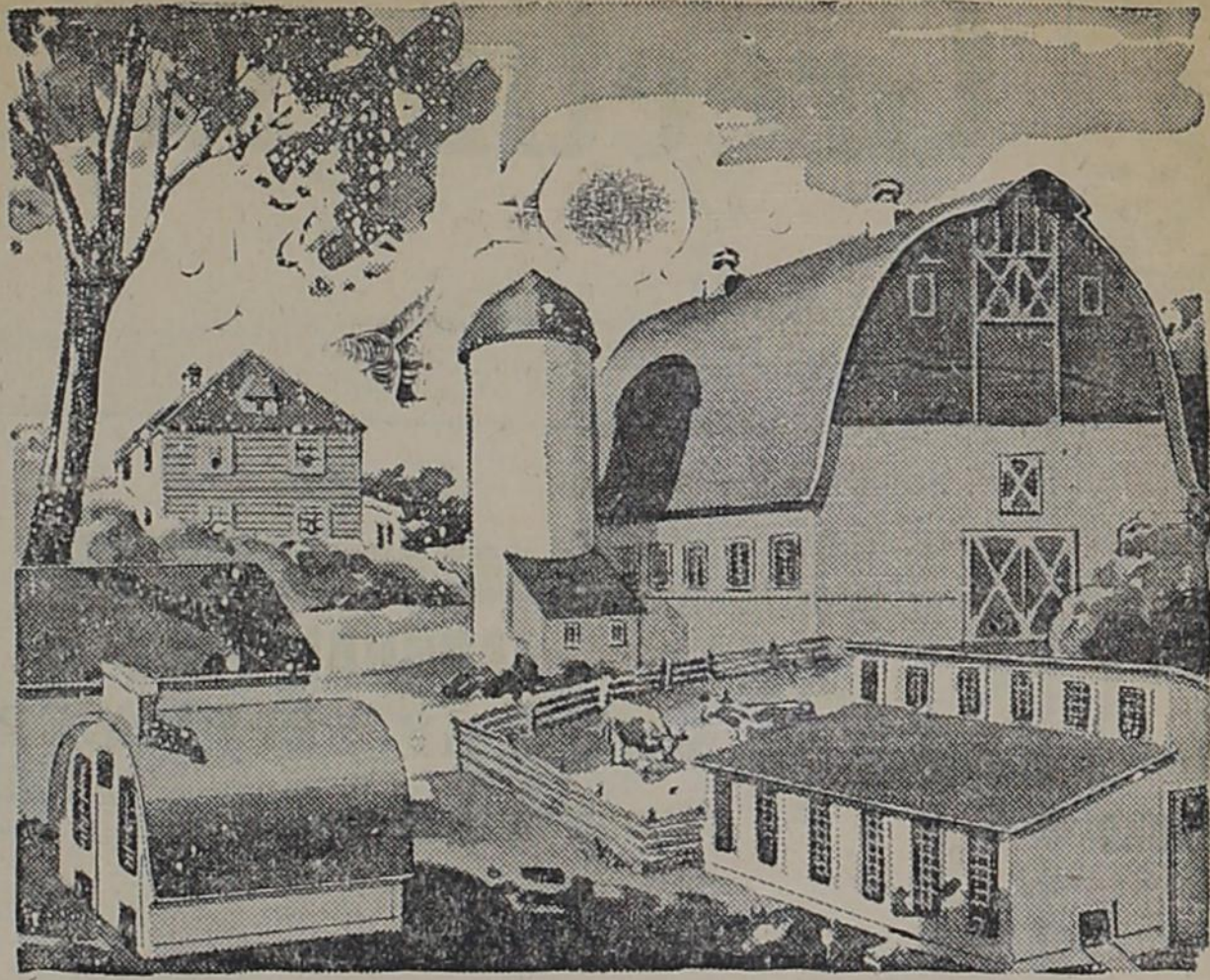

## Garden Club Sponsors Fair Flower Show

Mrs. L. G. Manning, President of the Dimmitt Garden Club announces that the Garden Club will sponsor the flower show to be held as part of the Castro County Fair. Every flower grower in the county is urged to help make this show the best ever held in this county by exhibiting their own blooms. Remember that if your flowers suffer from unfavorable weather conditions, your neighbor's plants have had to go through the same thing so don't fail to exhibit.

Large Dahlias should be budded now, fertilized and kept well watered until show time for best results. A good feeding to give your lawn may be made from 2 gallons of cotton seed meal, 1 gallon of Vigoro and one quart of coppers. This should be good for flower beds too. Spread as if sowing wheat. A strong spray of water is about as effective as anything in getting rid of red spider, the mite like pest that is turning so many of our plants, shrubs and trees a rusty color. 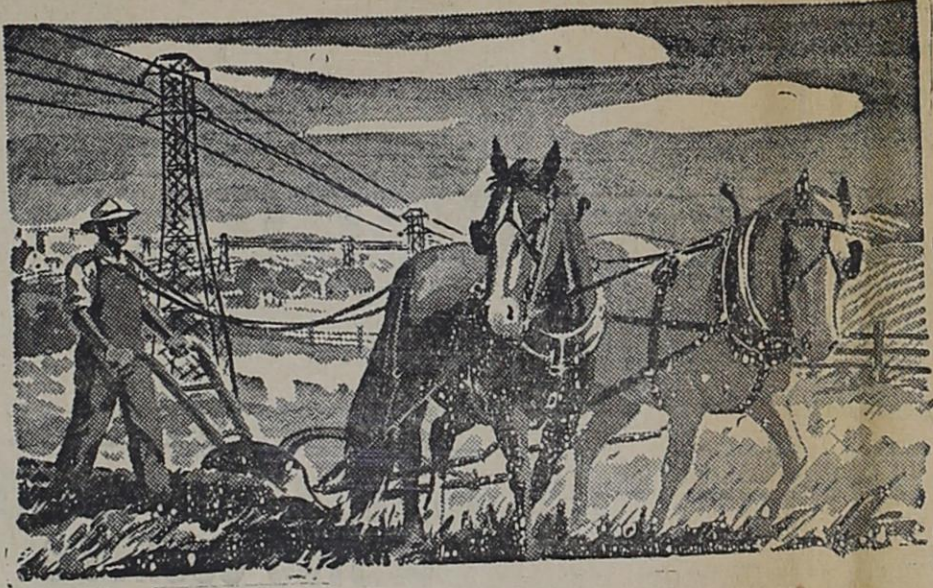

### Good Hearing Necessary In School

The child who cannot hear is badly handicapped. Hard-of-hearing children are often considered backward and become greatly retarded in school when in reality they may be highly intelligent but simply cannot hear much of what is said to them. Children who appear backward in school should be observed carefully to determine if hearing is a factor in the situation.

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, many injuries to the ear can be prevented by keeping foreign objects out of the ear canal, taking good care of the ears during colds and other diseases and observing certain precautions when swimming.

"The cause of middle ear trouble often is diving and swimming," Dr. Cox said. "Protect the ears by wearing a rubber cap, or ear plugs. The State Health Officer de-

clared that no hard instrument of any kind should be used in cleansing the ear canal since it may be injurious. Using ordinary precautions can do much to avoid minor ear trouble which may later lead to partial or complete deafness, the Doctor added.

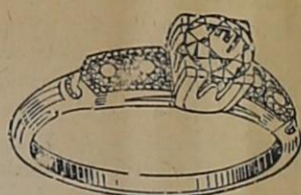

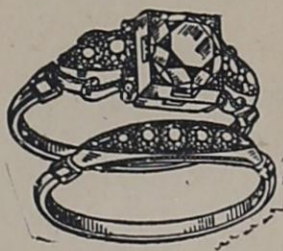

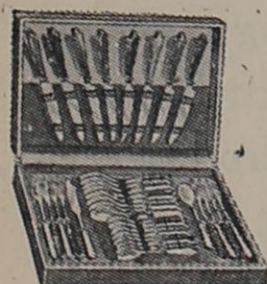

## Livestock, Product Classes Listed For Castro Co'ty Fair

In order to have the best representative list of products exhibited at the Castro County Fair, the following suggestions are given by R. L. King, Castro Coounty Agent, on preparing the products and the number of each product to select.

- I. Corn (10 ears)  
 1. Popcorn 2. Corn, any variety  
 1. Select as soon as possible  
 2. Uniform in shape and color  
 3. Rows of Kernals should be straight.
- II. Small Grains and Seeds (Each sample to be one gallon)  
 3. Wheat, any variety 4. Barley 5. Sudan grass, any variety 6. Milo, any variety 7. Kafir 8. Hegari  
 1. All seeds should be carefully

- selected, clean, free from trash with plump whole grains.  
 III. Grain Sorghum Heads (Each sample to consist of 10 heads)  
 9. Milo 10. Kafir 11. Feterita 12. Hegari  
 1. Select at least a week before the show  
 2. Select 25 to 50 heads in the field, take to house and select 10 that are uniform in size and shape and color  
 3. Wrap and leave them wrapped until day of show

- IV. Sheaf Grains (Sheaf grains to be 3 inches and not over 5 inches in diameter at middle band)

 2. Get heads and stalks uniform in size  
 3. Tie below heads, in the middle and at bottom

 18. Alfalfa 19. Sudan  
 VI. Vegetables  
 20. Irish potatoes, any variety (12) 21. Sweet potatoes, any variety (12) 22. Onions (12) 23. Turnips

26. Tomatoes (6) 27. Watermelon (1) 28. Cantaloupe (3) 29. Bell Peppers (6) 30. Cucumbers (3) 31. Beans, any variety (1 gal.) 32. Peas, any variety (1 gal.)  
 1. All vegetables should be uniform in size, shape and color.  
 2. Name should be placed on everything to be taken home.
- VII. Fruit  
 33. Apples (6) 34. Pears (6) and 35. Peaches (6)  
 1. Fruit should be uniform in size, shape and color.  
 All products should be brought in to the Hays Implement Building by 6 P. M. Friday, September 19th, so products may be ready for display early on September 20.
- The number and size of product exhibited conforms with the rules of the Panhandle South Plains Fair at Lubbock and all products placing 1st and 2nd at the Castro County Fair will be entered in the Tri-State Fair at Amarillo on September 22, or Lubbock Fair on September 29th.
- The livestock exhibits will include: Milking Shorthorns, Jerseys, Guernseys, and Herefords. Anyone in the county is eligible to enter livestock. These should be on exhibit by 9:30 A. M., September 20 at the Higginbotham-Bartlett Co.

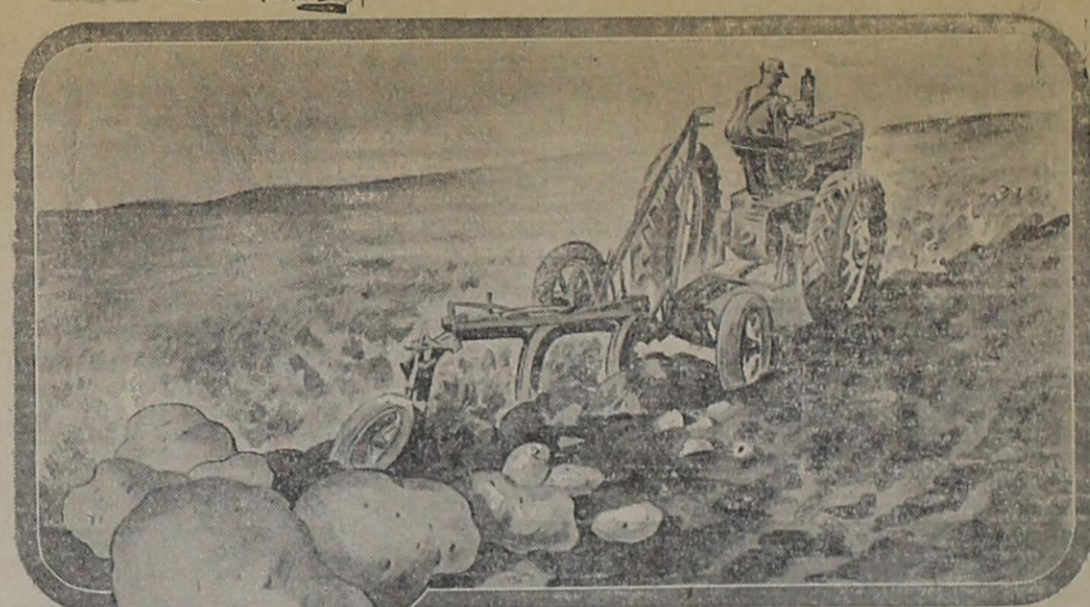
