Profit Producers.

Fom Green County will get some of the bonus money that heretofore has been going for pure seed and longer lint cotton.

This is indicated in the fact that 1.900 acres of irrigated land and about 200 acres day land are under contract te plant in 1926 the Thorobred cotton seed as developed by W S. Gallaway of Winters. Ac cordingly prospects for elevat ing the standing of this county in the cotton markets of the county are very bright in the opinion of Dor Brown county farm agent, and chief sponsor of the movement. The business of getting land signed for this seed is still going on, but enough acreage has been ob tained to guarantee 2,000 bales, under normal conditions, this amount being necessary to secure a special gin for this cotton alone during the season.
