Sometimes I think small towns were ma'e for smal people, for the happy children who must run and shout and grow in the great outdcors.
Oven fields meandering streams, wild nlum ar darab apple thickets, and health gardens that flourish in the amall towns. All those things and chores and lasting friendships- all belong in the kingdom of the little folks. And they are found only in and near the small own, and the tiny village.
Ball teams, athletic clubs, little business partner-bip-those are the birthright of the children of the small town.
The city is for the adult the sophisticat and su cessful. Not for the poor or for the children., A child an have freedom in the small town and nct " un wild." n the city he cannot.
Ninety-five per cent of the successful men in the big cities spent their boynood and early manhood in the great country-in the villages and tre small towns Why? Beczuse men grow in the small towns. Because the associations and environments of the small town are conducive to the growing of gooi men and women. Jack London, who loved the great outdoors and who chafed at the ct amping limitations of city life, suffered in his soul for the little children of the great East Side in New York City. And he wroi-
"'here is one beautiful sight in the East Side," and only one, and it is the childiren dancing in the street when the organ grinder goes hifs round. ft is' fascinatung to watch them, thogne ${ }^{\text {el" }}$-bifrn' thig next 'gensération, swaying and stepping, with pretty littlo mimićries and greceful inventions ali their wn, with mus 铞 that move swiftly and easity, and bodies that leap airly, weaving rhythms never taught in schost.
"A joyous life is ro "ping "in then" blood.' They re light in music, and -otion, and color, and very octen they betray a startling beruty of face and form under their fil' $h$ and rags.
"But they disappear. Thay all disappear. One never sees them again, or anything that suggests them You may look for them in vain among the generation of grown-ups. Here you will find stunted forms, ugly faces and blunt and siolid minds. Grace, beauty magination, all the resitiency of mind and muscle, are gone.
"The children of the Ghret to possess alt the qualitie which make for noble mantood and womanhood; but the Ghetto itself, like an infuriated tigress turning on ts you-g, turns upon and distroys all these qualities, blots ou: the light and laughter and molds those does not kil' in o sodden and forior
That is what the city does to the children of the pocr. And yet, A-ericen histery has alw'ys been made by he children of the poor by Lineoins, and Edisons, an Grants, rnd Franklins. By children who lived happy healthy childhood in small towns or far out in th count: y itself.
The country and small town is kind to the poar. It respects them. The city crushes the chidren of the The
The city is always cruel to chiidren. It's iron-bound laws oppres and crush them. What the small town looks upon as pure mischief the city considers malicousness and punishes children by tearing them rom their parents and locking them up for yoars.
In the small town, class and money offer little barrier to the poor child. In the city they prevent him from ever enter.ng the more desirable parts of the town They isolate him, deny him, crush him.
Lucky indeed is the child of the small town.
