## A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Connbers, and lor of that Court .-

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, say five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwiee provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court uniess he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and uniess he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and than have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Sam Objet Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified vot ers of the State at a general election shall hold their effices six years, or until their successors are elected and quantited, and shall receive such ecn persation as may be provided by I aw. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general elec. | this State. tion for State officers, and at such election by the quairfied voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional As

sociate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the erm of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commistion of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

"Article 5. Section 3 The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals ave appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as he Legislature may prescribe. Unis our cause, the enfranchise- til otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of aw arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges f any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Jourt's Appellate Jurisdiction under he Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices hereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be rescribed by Law, and under such eguiations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the write of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari, and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may e necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Courtshall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court. The Supreme Court shall appoint a cierk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court for stitution of the State of Texas pro- good cause entered of record on the viding for a Supreme Court of nine amoutes of said Court who shall reselve such compensation as the Leg stature may provide."






