Conservation Meeting Here Sat.

Louis B. Dawkins, the Assistant Planning Engineer of the State Soil Conservation Board, will meet with land-owners of Castro County at 9:00 o'clock, Saturday morning, November 22.

Important business in the formation of the new Runningwater Soil District will be transacted. This new District is being formed as a result of the election held on October 18, in which there were only four dissenting votes cast.

At the meeting to be held Saturday, the District will be sub-divided into five sub-divisions and District Supervisors from subdivisions No. 2 and 4 will be appointed. Men who are appointed to serve as District must own and operate a farm. Supervisors of subdivisions No. 1, 3, and 5, will be chosen at elections to be held later in the respective subdivisions.

The meeting will be held in the District Court Room and all who are interested are invited to attend.

Nisbet, Animal Husbandmen.

Sudan Seed Short Again

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 13—About this time last year, E.A. Miller, extension agronomist for Texas A. & M. College, warned Texas farmers that the sudan seed crop supply was lower than it ever had been before.

It's worse this year. Production of sudan grass seed for 1947 in Texas is estimated at 3½ million pounds. That's the lowest crop on record, and just about two-thirds of what it was last year.

It's not only bad in Texas. The total production for the United States is 14 percent below the small 1946 crop.

The harvested seed is reported by the USDA Bureau of Agricultural Economics as being a little cleaner than last year and the yield per acre average is 34 pounds higher than the ten-year average. The small crop is caused by the record small acreage.

It boils down to one thing: If farmers want sudan grass seed they'd better line it up now, instead of waiting for spring. The current supply for the U. S., including production and carry-over, is 38,358,000 pounds of clean seed, 22 percent smaller than last year and 45 percent below the last 5-year average. So there's liable to be trouble in getting the seed when planting time comes around.

Bobcats Down Eagles 12-0. Share District Crown

The 1947 edition of the Dimmitt Bobcat football machine ended the season with a convincing 12-0 victory over the highly rated Eagles of Canyon High School. This victory gave the Cats a share of the District IIA crown along with Canyon and Tulia. The only thing to mar a perfect season was the bleak night of October 17 when the local team fumbled itself to a heartbreaking loss of 14-6 to the Tulia Hornets.

This season marks the second best in the history of Dimmitt Schools with a record of nine wins in ten starts and a record 261 points scored to 58 for the opposition. The rival season was 1943 in which the Cats won a clean-cut district title, scoring 101 points in conference play to 0 for the opposition. This year's team scored 133 to 20 for the opposition in conference play.

Co-Captain Ziegler, Fulfer, Miller, Howell, Davis, Damron, Taylor, Parks, Thompson, and Warren played nice games to conclude their football careers in high school. Ballard, Birchfield, and Conard had to be content to watch the last game from the bench. Captain Lonnie Rice, Jewell, Martin, and Brannan also played good games. These four boys will be the nucleus around which the 1948 team will have to be fashioned.

Gasoline Blaze Fatal To Farmer

Happy, Nov. 17 (Special) — Frank Dorris, 36-year-old wheat farmer and prominent cattleman of Arney, about 17 miles southwest of Happy, died in Neblett Hospital at Canyon about 6:30 this evening, as the result of burns he received this morning while in his workshop.

He had been cleaning the workshop and garage with gasoline. When the gasoline ignited, from some undetermined cause, Dorris was burned extensively all over the body.

He was taken in his car to the hospital at Canyon by Mrs. Dorris. The accident occurred at about 7 o'clock this morning.

He was removed from the flaming garage through the rear window of the place. Although he managed to walk from the car into the hospital, he died without regaining consciousness.

Dorris came to this country in 1930 from Iowa Park.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Loretta Dorris, three children, including a daughter, Jannie, 5 years old, and a sister, Mrs. Bud Gaard, of Iowa Park.

Funeral arrangements are pending with Griggs-Warren funeral home in Canyon.—Amarillo News.

Applications were received recently from the following farmers for assistance in conservation work on their farm: E. C. Burks, Arthur G. Gripp, M. A. Parmer, and C. W. Petty. Soil surveys will be made on these farms and the farmers will receive assistance in developing conservation plans whereby each acre of land will be put to use according to its qualifications. Then, assistance will also be given in establishing these farming practices on the land.

Locations for new irrigation wells were made the past two weeks on farms located as follows: two miles south and two miles east of Sunnyside, farmed by Furche Riley; seven miles west of Flagg, owned by O. L. Fortner of Amarillo, and operated by Eugene Morton, Rt. 4, Dimmitt; four miles east and two miles south of Dimmitt, owned by M. A. Parmer, of Amherst, and operated by C. W. Petty, Dimmitt.

Other farmers who have developed conservation plans on their farms are L. O. Waggoner, who lives eight miles south of Dimmitt, and Forrest Motley of Hollis, Oklahoma, who owns farms six miles west of Flagg. Their plans include such conservation practices as the use of soil-building crops in rotation, crop residue management, green manure crops, and installation of a proper irrigation system.

The accident, declared to be unavoidable because of the blinding lights of an automobile traveling in the opposite direction, occurred on Highway 51 in North Dimmitt. Kenneth and Wynema, son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Fulfer, were rushed to the Plains Memorial Hospital where Kenneth is receiving treatment for numerous bruises and shock. Wynema, not as fortunate as her brother, sustained a broken left thigh, a broken nose, and abrasions about the head. The condition of both of the children is reported as favorable.

Lease Form Protects Both Parties

College Station, Nov. 20—It's farm lease signing time for landlords and tenants and chances are they'll find Texas A. & M. College's B-144, "General Farm Lease Form," helpful in getting together on their agreement.

Thousands of the lease forms have been used since they were first issued in July of 1946.

The instrument contains 13 major headings and provides for some fifty questions which might arise. Points on conservation practices, rental rates and arrangements, livestock share agreements, hunting and fishing rights and improvements and repairs are covered.

The form was drawn up by an A. & M. committee consisting of L. P. Gabbard, chief of the division of farm and ranch economics of the Agricultural Experiment Station; J. L. Matthews, extension specialist in agricultural planning; and J. Wheeler Barger, head of economics.

Barger says that, on the basis of its 18 months' trial to date, the "lease form is a protection for both parties and will save time and money." He added that the principal concern of the committee was "not to produce something useful in court, but rather something to keep people out of court."

A Houston bank issued a reprint of the lease form in addition to the thousands of copies so far distributed by the Extension Service. Copies of B-144—which comes in two copies, one for the landlord and one for tenant—can be secured at the offices of county agents. It's free.

Are You An Amateur?
 College Station, November 26 It's easy to spot an amateur landscaper gardener.

He does two things that give him away. First, he plants too close to the house, especially when the shrubs are small. They look better there, he thinks, and he forgets that when several feet tall, the plant will be crowded and its shape spoiled. Long limbs will scrape paint from a house, too.

Two, the amateur landscaper will often plant too many shrubs. In his enthusiasm, he wants every kind of shrub he sees. The well-planned landscape will look rather barren for the first few years. After that, the shrub growth will fill the bare spots.

Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist for Texas A. & M. College, says that large growing plants, such as Arizona Cypress, was ligustrum, cherry laurel and evergreen privet, need ten feet or more of space. Other plants and shrubs need space in proportion to their full growth. An overplanted yard, like an overcrowded home, lacks neatness and symmetry. A well-developed landscaping plan, prepared before planting, will pay dividends in the end.

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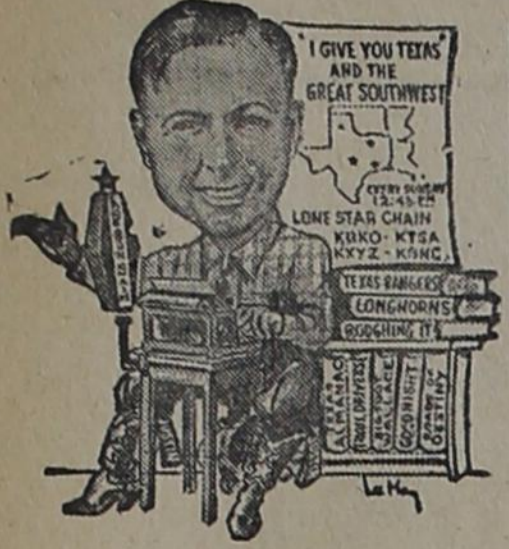

Texas Press Association Sees Dawn of A New Era

December 1 will mark the dawn of a new era for the Texas Press Association in the opinion of Paul Fulks, president of the Texas association and publisher of the Wolfe City Sun.

On that date the daily and weekly newspapers of Texas join hands to open their own central office with a full-time staff of experienced press association workers in charge.

Texas Press Association directors have contracted with Vernon T. Sanford, for 13 years secretary-manager of the Oklahoma Press Association, to manage the Texas association. Officials of the Texas organization are now endeavoring to locate office headquarters in Dallas.

Said Fulks, "Our central office will issue information bulletins to the newspapers, serve as an employment bureau for newspaper workers, look after the legislative interests of the publications, represent our newspapers in the sale of political and state advertising, and arrange our convention programs."

The TPA president also stated that "our plans call for activities not alone in the interest of the press of Texas, but for the state in general. Details of a promotion program for Texas will be announced as soon as the central office can complete arrangements with other interested groups and individuals who want to see the great state of Texas grow greater and greater."

Sanford has been with the Okla-

homa organization since August 1, 1934. Prior to then he was manager of the Nebraska Press Association.

He is a native Oklahoman. Care Urged In Choice of Family Physician

Austin, Texas, Nov. 20—According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, there are too many persons who approach the choice of a family physician casually. Viewing the doctor much as a fireman, whose services are required only in an emergency, such families wait until an illness strikes, and then get hold of the first doctor who can respond to the call. While such an attitude still reasonably assures one of satisfactory medical services, it can handicap the physician somewhat, and in the long run does not permit the supervision and close personal contact which can exist only by having a regular family doctor. "Knowing his patients enables a physician to give advice on maintaining health and preventing dis-

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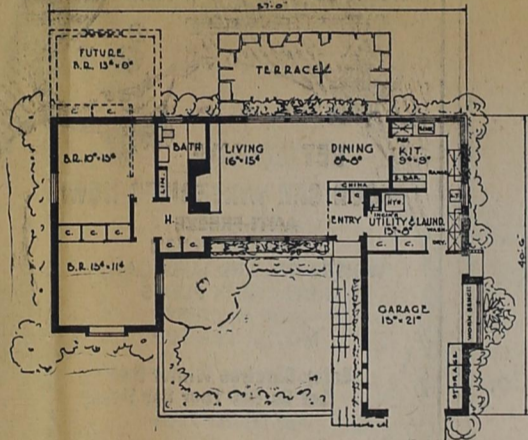
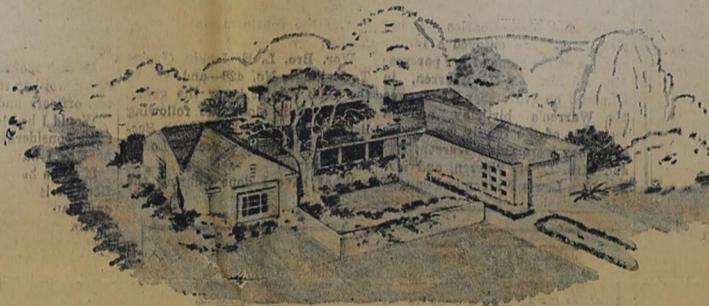
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
