NEWS-GLOBE GOLDEN GLOVE TOURNAMENT DATES ANNOUNCED

Amarillo—The eleventh Amarillo-Globe-News Golden Gloves boxing tournament, one of the Panhandle's blue-ribbon sports events, is scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights next week, Jan. 21-22-23-24, at the Municipal Auditorium here.

Several defending champions are included in the entry list, which is expected to reach a total of 80 or more young amateur fighters from a dozen Panhandle cities. There will be at least 15 three-round bouts each night.

Competition will be in two divisions, High School and Golden Gloves, the champions of the latter group qualifying for the state tournament at Fort Worth next month. Oil 32 champions and runners up will receive handsome trophies. There also will be trophies for the winning high school team and for the outstanding individual competitor. In addition, every contestant this year will receive an individual, symbolic award whether he wins or loses.

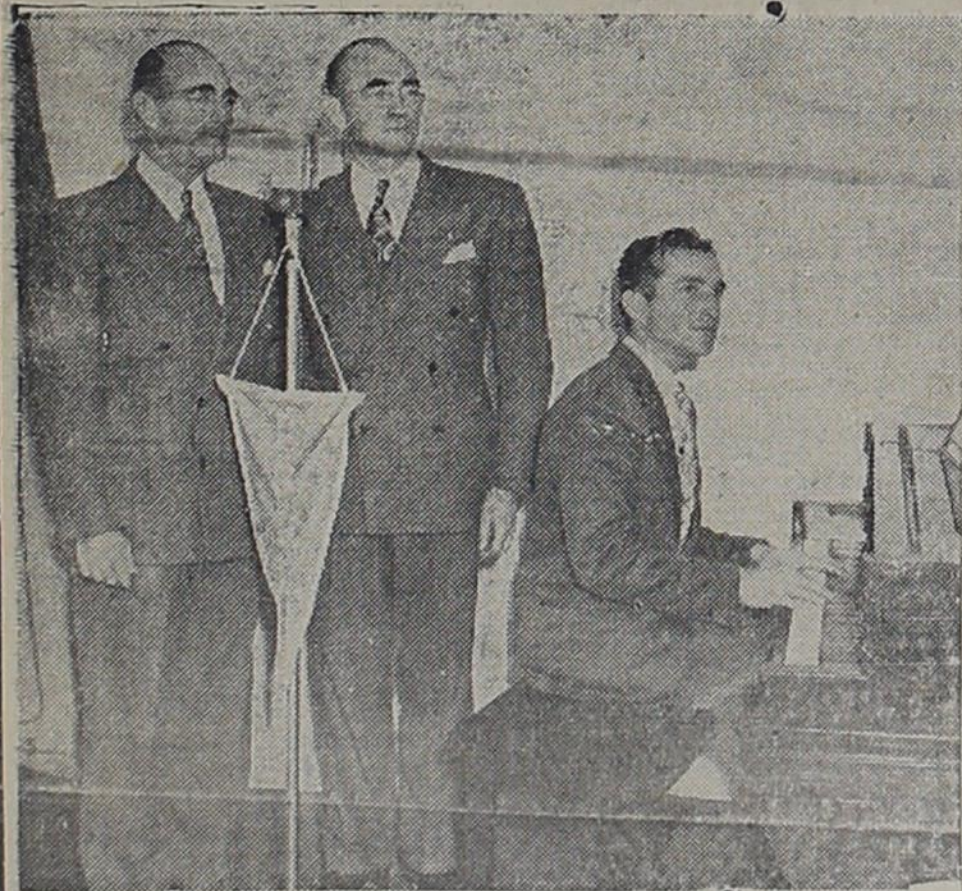

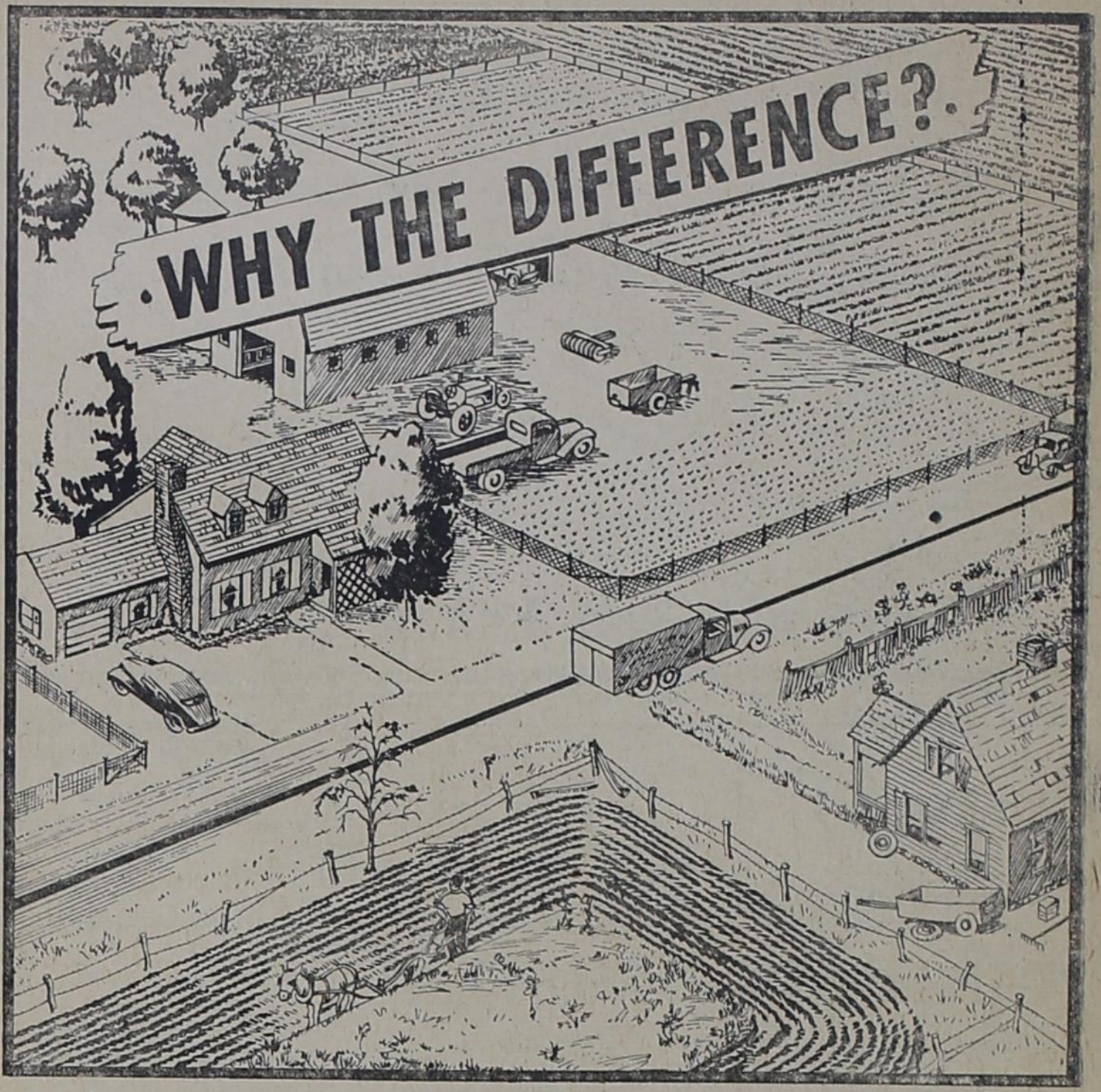
