"Advertising is the most democratic institution in the world. Every time you buy a product, you cast a vote. For and Against.

"And, every time you write a letter, you speak for 500 people. Every advertiser is painfully aware of this."

## Over 2,000 Registered Voters in County

Callahan County will have over 2,000 registered voters this year when final tabulations have been made, according to Albert Lovell, County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Lovell reported over 1,800 registrants had been counted Wednesday morning with approximately 200 uncounted, bringing the total to over 2,000.

## Surplus Commodity Program Proven Successful In County

The program that has become of great importance to so many people in our county and this county, is the Surplus Commodity Program. It was originated during the Depressions as a part of President Roosevelt's Relief Program. It was then known as the Food Stamp Plan, which was defined as a new method of moving surplus agriculture products from the farm through regular channels of trade to families who needed these surplus foods.

Callahan County Commissioners voted to begin our Surplus Commodity Program last year. The first issuance was in June of 1966. In that first month, the commodity office issued food to 357 people in this County. It has increased to 410 persons and expectations are for a bigger increase in the weeks and months to come, as the cost of living goes higher and education requirements become more prominent.

This program is of great benefit to the people who need it. There are many that have no income at all, and others who only receive a very small pension or income of some type. 265 out of the 410 cases are public assistance cases over 65, and receiving some sort of pension.

In Callahan County, recipients are not required to be a citizen of the United States, but must

## HIGHWAY COMMISSION ASKED TO PAVE COUNTY FM ROAD

The Highway Commission was asked by a Callahan County delegation Tuesday to put a paved Farm-to-Market road where a dirt county road now exists near Cross Plains.

Callahan County attorney James Paul Shanks, in a public hearing on the request, said the present road is a mail route and a school bus route. He said landowners along the road have pledged right-of-way without cost to the county.

The proposed Farm-to-Market road would run from U. S. 283 at the intersection of F. M. 2926 east to the intersection with Texas 36, at Cross Plains, for a distance of 16 miles. Estimated cost of the project is \$420,000.

FM 2926 from Oplin east to US 283, western terminus of the requested road, is now under construction and is 32 percent complete.

## License Plates Now on Sale

New license plates for all vehicles operating on Texas highways went on sale at the Callahan County Courthouse Wednesday morning, February 1.

Albert Lovell, County Tax Assessor-Collector, said Wednesday morning that his office had received approximately 7,415 sets of 1967 plates. Of this number, 4,210 are for passenger cars and 1,375 for commercial vehicles. The remainder of plates are for Motor Scooters, house trailers, trailers, farm vehicles, truck tractors, farm tractors, machinery, Soil Conservation vehicles, permits, and 6 personalized plates.

Plates assigned for passenger cars will bear the prefixes DCM, DCN, DCR, and DCP. Commercial vehicle plates will display 1W1100 - 1W2474.

Although sale of plates began Wednesday and may be installed on vehicles any time after purchase, they do not have to be displayed until April 1.

Purchasers of new tags are asked by Mr. Lovell to bring a copy of their last registration form and their certificate of title when applying for plates.

In Cross Plains, tags may be bought at McCuin Insurance Agency, otherwise, all county residents will have to purchase tags at the courthouse in Baird.

Friday's judging of the Carcass steers resulted in Danny Vestal showing the Reserve Champion Red Angus Steer. Final placings of the carcasses were made Tuesday after all cuts were measured and graded.

## CALLAHAN COUNTY SOIL SURVEY IS IN PROGRESS

Soil scientists of the Soil Conservation Service are in the process of making a soil survey of all land in Callahan County. It is expected that the field work will be completed in December 1969.

The three men who will make the survey have recently completed field work on a soil survey of Coleman County. Lee Botts is in charge of the survey. Buford Halley and Wayburn Mitchell complete the survey party. They will be assisted from time to time by soil specialists and correlators whose duty is to help develop and improve the soil classification system and to provide supervision of field work to insure uniformity of mapping procedures throughout the country. Wayburn Mitchell has recently moved his family to Baird. Lee Botts plans of move to Baird in the near future. Buford Halley resides in Abilene.

The soil survey is made by soil scientists to learn what kinds of soils are in the county, where they are located, and how they can be used. As the soils men travel over the country, they observe the steepness, length, and shape of slopes, kinds of native plants and crops, kinds of rock and many other facts about the soils. They dig many holes to expose soil profiles. A soil profile is the sequence of natural layers or horizons in a soil; it extends from the surface down to the parent material that has not been changed much by leaching or by roots of plants.

The soil scientists make comparisons among the profiles they study and compare these profiles with those in counties nearby and in places more distant. They classify and name the soils according to nationwide, uniform procedures.

Aerial photographs are used as base maps for the soil survey. Lines and symbols are placed on the map to show the different kinds of soil and where they are located. Legends and descriptions are prepared to describe the areas represented by the different symbols.

The soil maps along with the notes and descriptions taken during the survey provide the cornerstone upon which a published survey is based. A typical published Soil Survey is a book nine by eleven inches and about one-half inch thick. It tells how soils are mapped, named and classified and describes the different soils of the county. Soil characteristics, uses and management are discussed. Soil profile descriptions, tables and photographs are included. Engineering applications, a discussion of physical geography, climate and how soils of the

county were formed is part of the published survey.

More than half of the publication consists of aerial photos shown on the maps. These maps are usually published at a scale of 1:20,000 (a little more than three inches to the mile).

There is a growing demand for the information contained in the published survey. The farmers and ranchers of Callahan County will benefit most from the soil survey as it will be written about their land and for their uses in planning their farming operations. The soil map shows the location and extent of different kinds of land on each farm. The published survey describes each soil, its limitations and recommended use. Specialists of the Soil Conservation Service and other agricultural workers, together with the farmers use the soil survey as a guide in planning farming operations for the best use of the land.

There are many other users of soil surveys. Highway departments use them for such things as routing new roads and for locating road building material. Contractors use the maps in selecting sites for housing developments.

The maps help in routing pipelines and power transmission lines. Some counties use the maps to help determine land values for tax purposes. Rural appraisers use soil maps to help determine land value. Vocational agriculture teachers and 4-H Club leaders find useful information in the soil survey for working with students and club members.

Others interested in the survey are real estate dealers, prospective buyers, bankers, merchants and sportsmen. Recent soil surveys of this type have been published in 25 Texas counties. About 25 more are in various stages of publication. The Soil Conservation Service has the major responsibility for these soil surveys. State agricultural colleges and experiment stations also help. It is all part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey which when completed will cover all the counties in the United States and territories.

Callahan County includes parts of three Soil Conservation Districts, the Middle Clear Fork, the Lower Clear Fork, and the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Soil surveys are published by the Soil Conservation Service and printed by the U. S. Printing Office. Copies are distributed free of charge by the local Soil Conservation Service office and the County Agent.

"When you check the Savings Bond line on your 1966 tax form," Mr. Farmer continued, "you automatically assure yourself of two advantages: You provide yourself with an easy method of holding on to your tax refund dollars and a sure way of making it grow one-third larger at maturity. When your mark is made, the rest is automatic. For example, if you're entitled to a refund of \$42, you

will get a \$50 face-value Series E Bond (cost \$37.50), plus a check for \$4.50."

# "CUSTOMER'S BILL OF RIGHTS" EXPLAINED BY POST MASTER

Postmaster John Towler today called attention of Baird mailers to the new "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights" to help meet President Johnson's government-wide goal of improving the quality of federal services to the public.

Directed at post office window services, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has ordered the Customer's Bill of Rights implemented by two immediate steps at Baird.

1. Posters will be displayed in the post office lobby and service counters containing 10 points which specify the kind of treatment customers have a right to expect.

2. Instructions from Mr. O'Brien call for careful observance of all points in the "Postal Customer's Bill of Rights." The instruction also provide directions for the most efficient management of window services.

The posters tell customers they are entitled to:

1. A neat, clean counter on which they transact business.

2. Service by a well-groomed, neat window employee.

3. A friendly greeting that expresses a desire to assist.

4. Knowledgeable, well-informed, interested window personnel to help with postal needs.

5. Prompt, alert and efficient service.

6. Competent and correct information on inquiries.

7. An attitude that reflects helpfulness, patience and congeniality.

8. The courtesy and tact that would be expected from a friend.

9. Polite referral to another window or individual, when necessary, to give the appropriate service.

10. A feeling, upon leaving, that the post office is glad to serve and help at all times.

Instruction for fulfilling The Postal Customer's Bill of Rights are being distributed to a 11 window personnel by Postmaster Towler.

Mr. O'Brien stated in connection with the new postal service improvement effort:

"President Johnson insisted that every federal employee give added attention to providing the American people with the very best service possible. . . . Since your daily duties bring you in direct and continuing contact with our customers, I would like to tell you what I consider the type of service the American people have a right to

expect when dealing with the largest business operation in the world."

In addition to improving relations with customers, Postmaster Towler said, the Customer's Bill of Rights can expedite handling of transactions at the windows and make the services more efficient.

He urged Baird residents to assist in this effort, by stating their needs clearly, and having money and any necessary filled-out forms ready for transactions.

The Postmaster explained that demands on window personnel, who must deal with a wide variety of information, forms and varying services, are usually very heavy, and postal customers can assist them in meeting the new service goals by being brief and business-like as possible.

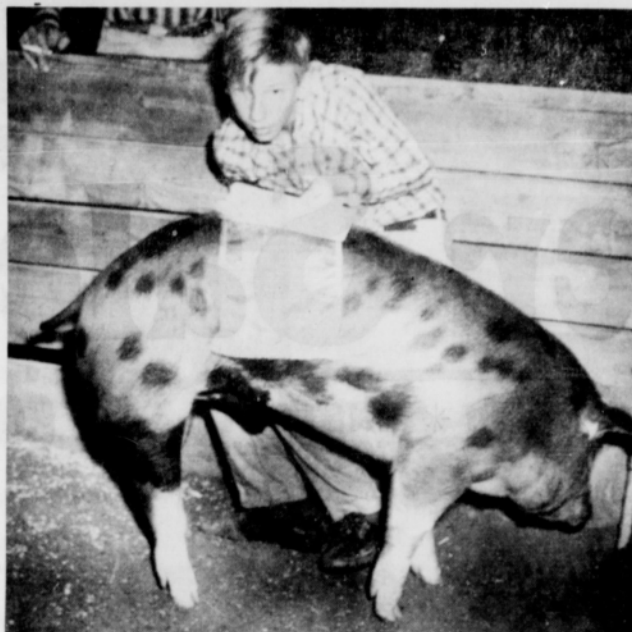

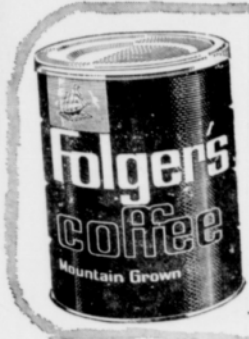
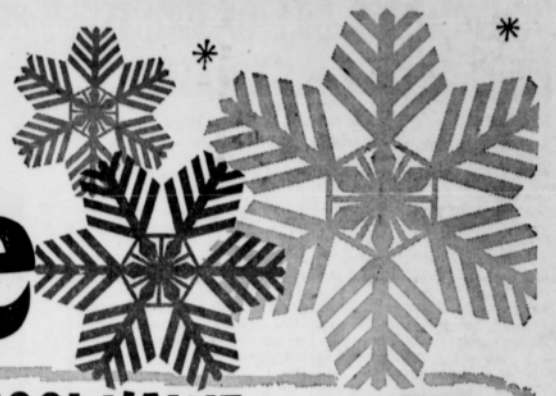
