First Load of Wheat Delivered to Hart Monday

The first load of wheat of the season was received by the Farmers Grain Company at Hart Monday. The wheat, produced by Earl Holley who lives southeast of Hart, tested 62 lbs. According to reports the wheat was harvested from a crop producing 21 bushels per acre. Some of the finest wheat in this area is to be found in the Hart community according to reports. Practically all of the irrigated wheat will make a good yield and much of the dryland wheat is expected to produce well above an average crop. With favorable weather conditions harvesting operations will get underway within the next week or ten days, and is believed that there will be an adequate supply of harvesting machinery and labor to complete the harvest in record time.

Tragedy Takes Life of Hart Baby Tues.

A fall into a two-foot-deep cattle tank brought death to Kathy Lee Timmins, baby daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Timmins of Hart, Tuesday afternoon. The drowning occurred within sight of the Timmins home, four miles southeast of Hart. The little girl had been in her mother's kitchen only a few minutes before asking for a cracker. Then she started for the chicken yard. "She always like to play with the chickens," Mrs. Timmins said, "so I just supposed she was out there." When the mother looked out the window later, Kathy Lee was nowhere in the yard. At that point Mrs. Timmins saw her daughter's body in the tank. Although she was immediately taken to Olton Hospital, efforts to revive the child were futile. Kathy Lee, a year and a half old, was the youngest of the seven Timmins children. Funeral services were held Thursday at the Hart Baptist Church. Burial was in Whitarral Cemetery.

The Highway 86 Association's first job will be erecting billboards at the road's entrances and encouraging tourist services such as motels and large gas stations.

The quota must be raised by Saturday, Bearden said, since his group has to report to a regional meeting at Silvertown Tuesday. Minimum dues are \$10.

At Tuesday's Lions Club meeting, T. A. Singer reported that Highway 86 is included in plans for an inter-regional highway reaching from Fort Smith, Arkansas, to the far west. Supported by businessmen along the routes, the project is making definite progress, he said.

H. H. Carlile, D. W. Brashear, and Bearden helped organize Highway 86 Association when they joined in a promotional trip to all towns along the road. B. M. Nelson also aided in early work.

Methodists to Have Churchwide Picnic Sunday

Huge Loan Is Approved for Electric Co-op

The Rural Electrification Administration has approved a \$495,000 loan to the Deaf Smith Electric Co-operative, which also operates in Castro County.

Announcement of the loan came Monday from Senator Tom Connally.

Nine lines extending 91 miles to 86 new consumers will result from the grant. In addition, it will go toward completion of already-started projects and nine miles of transmission lines.

With headquarters in Hereford, the co-op serves Deaf Smith, Castro, and Parmer Counties.

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

KOREAN VETERANS: The House passed and sent to the Senate H. R. 7656, a bill to take care of our veterans in the Korean War. This legislation is long past due, and we are all pleased that it has passed the House and is on its way to passage in the Senate. The delay in this much needed legislation was caused by the many abuses to which the veterans and the American taxpayers were subjected under the original GI Bill of Rights. The process of uncovering and weeding out some of the features of the old GI bill that permitted unwarranted raids upon the public treasury consumed long and tedious hours in the Committee. We hope that all of these avenues of abuse have been closed, although we surely realize that success in this particular field is going to depend a lot upon the veterans and the schools. The vote in the House was 361 yeas, one nay, and two answering present. The one nay vote was cast by General Devereux, a Member from Maryland. General Devereux is certainly not entitled to any criticism for his vote because it was not cast against the bill as such, but was a protest as to the manner in which the bill was brought up before the House. General Devereux has perhaps as illustrious a career as most any veteran of the United States. You will remember him as the commander of the garrison on Wake Island. He is on the Veterans Affairs Committee and is an outstanding and able member who definitely has the interest of the veterans at heart. His protest was because the bill was brought up under what is known as a "suspension of the rules". When a bill is brought up in this manner, the debate is limited to twenty minutes to the side and the bill cannot be amended. There are two amendments that I think should have gone on the bill, and General Devereux and I are in agreement on these two particular amendments. The bill contains a provision that would permit tax maintained institutions to charge veterans as much as \$31.00 per month without being subject to the penalties provided against excess charges from veterans. In many states this could result in a non-veteran going to school free while a veteran would be required to pay \$31.00 per month out of the money that he receives with which to obtain an education. The money is paid directly to the veteran under this bill, rather than to the schools, as it was under the old GI bill. I certainly do not feel that a veteran should be charged \$31.00 a month in order to go to the same school that a non-veteran can attend for a much less amount. We hope to obtain a correction measure in the Senate. The controversial matter that arose concerning the bill was the so-called Springer Amendment. Mr. Springer is from Illinois and is a member of the Veterans Affairs Committee. He is an excellent man and an able member of Congress. The amendment that he proposed was to pay the money to the schools rather than to the individual veteran, in somewhat the same fashion as provided in the old GI bill. Mr. Springer was most sincere in his efforts and had some very able and telling arguments in support

thereof. I opposed this amendment for the reason that I basically believe that the veteran should be allowed to attend to his own business, to make his own arrangements, and to go to the school of his own choice. The bill is designed to help veterans and is not intended as a federal aid to education measure. Some of the provisions relating to GI housing also need clarification in order for the veterans to obtain the full benefits intended. Most of us feel that the corrections can be made in the Senate without delay and that these boys will begin to receive these benefits to which they are so richly entitled and which have been withheld from them too long.

1952 COTTON PARITY STANDARD: The House has also passed H. R. 5713, to provide that low middling seven-eighths inch cotton shall be the standard grade for the purposes of determining parity and price support for the 1952 cotton crop. The purpose of this bill is to protect cotton farmers against disastrous price declines if they produce a cotton crop of 16 million bales or more in 1952, as has been requested by the Secretary of Agriculture. This bill would do this by making low middling seven-eighths inch cotton the standard grade for purposes of parity and price support on the 1952 crop if any time during the calendar year 1952 the Department of Agriculture officially estimates the production of cotton in 1952 as 16 million bales or more. The cotton farmers have been requested to produce 16 million bales in 1952 as a defense measure. This type of legislation will give the cotton farmers some of the protection and incentive enjoyed by industrialists. It will do away with the injustices to which the farmers have been subjected when, in answer to a patriotic call, they have produced and then were left to take all of the risk of financial loss if they accidentally produced more than was needed or if the Department of Agriculture had overestimated the need for their product.





THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW what the seventh and eighth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States, being a part of the Bill of Rights, are?

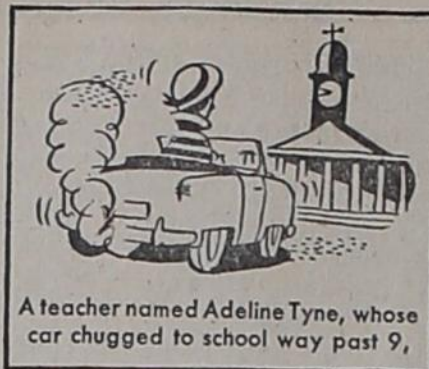
Amendment Number Seven states "In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States than according to the rules of the common law."

Amendment Number Eight states "Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted."

In all cases of any consequence there may be a trial by jury, which jury of course must come from the persons living in the same area where the case is tried. Thus a person is tried before a group of persons who are familiar with local customs and practices, and who will have similar political and social backgrounds as the party being tried, or that are involved in the civil case. This amendment also establishes that once a final verdict is entered in a case, that the same may not be thereafter re-opened. This does not of course interfere with the individuals right of appeal in any case, but that after the appeal has been taken, and the judgment found against him, that individual may not thereafter re-open the case, and that all parties may know what their rights are upon the final judgment in the case.

The Eighth Amendment guarantees that concentration camps, the like of which are found in other parts of the world, can never develop in this country, and impose cruel and unusual punishments upon the individual. It guards against harsh and cruel jailers beating and abusing individuals charged with crime and held for trial, and those who may have been convicted and are being held in confinement as punishment.
