Amendment Number Seven states "In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise ree-xamined in any court of the United States than according to the rules of the common law."

Amendment Number Eight states "Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines mposed, nor cruel and unusual ounishments inflicted."
