Building Contract Is Let For New Baptist Church Auditorium

LAST RITES READ FOR MR. HIRAM ALLDREDGE

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 3 p. m. at the Dimmitt Baptist church for Mr. Hiram Alldredge. The pastor, Rev. Earl Landtroop, officiated at the services which were in charge of the Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Home of Amarillo. Mr. Alldredge died at the Plains Memorial Hospital Monday following a long illness. He was 77 years of age.

Interment was made in the Dimmitt cemetery.

Mr. Alldredge was born September 27, 1870, at Thackerville, Oklahoma, being the first white child born in the Indian Territory. He was married to Ida Lewis in 1886. Two children were born to this union, both of whom survive. The family moved to Castro county in 1927 where Mr. Alldredge was engaged in farming until he retired and moved to Dimmitt.

Deceased is survived by his wife and a son and daughter, Marsel Alldredge of Colorado Springs, Colo. and Mrs. Dewey Powell of Dimmitt. He is also survived by twenty-two grand children and great grand children.

MORE RAINS FALL HERE

RAIN REPORTS SENT IN BY MR. EDWIN RAMEY

Recent rain reports heard over Amarillo radio stations and giving the amount of precipitation for Dimmitt, have possibly caused some of the townspeople of Dimmitt to wonder when the rain had fallen and where it had gone after falling. TYPHOID GERM SAID TO BE HITCHHIKER

A warning against the hitchhiking germ of typhoid fever has just been issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. They must catch a ride from the infected person to the well person; this is generally accomplished by water, milk, flies, fingers, or food. Every case is contracted by way of the mouth and digestive system.

A carrier is a person who has had typhoid fever at some time and who even after recovery carries the germs of the disease in the urine and discharge of the bowels. Carriers who are careless in their personal habits are likely to infect any food they handle with unwashed hands. Some of the most serious and far-reaching outbreaks of the disease have been caused by drinking milk or eating foods that have been handled by carriers. Persons may be carriers without knowing it.

MORE INTEREST IN DIMITT SCHOOL BANDS IS BEING SHOWN

Approximately thirty boys and girls have signed up for the newly organized Dimmitt School Bands. This total was revealed after a check-up late Wednesday.

Enthusiasm is running high on the part of both parents and students, and a number of parents end up with the bands have not yet who want to get their children lined up with the bands have not yet who want to get their children lined up with the bands have not yet.

Even some seniors who have only next year in school are taking advantage of getting to study an instrument and playing in the band. This is especially interesting because no one is cajoled, no one is persuaded that he "ought" to play in the band. Only those who expressly manifest a desire or strong interest and who seem most likely to succeed are considered.

Following is the number enrolled in each section to date: 13 clarinets, 3 cornets, 1 French horn, 3 flutes, 2 baritone horns, 2 bell lyras, and 3 trombones. This is the actual number of instruments, but there are some cases of younger brothers and sisters also studying on the same instruments.

The majority of the boys and girls are taking advantage of the rental plan which permits try-outs on instruments at low cost. These instruments are brand new or have been thoroughly reconditioned, of good quality and made especially for school bands. Second hand instruments are also being dug out of closets and attics. No restrictions is made as to the source or make of the instrument, although the bandmaster suggests that parents contemplating the instruments have them carefully checked by competent musicians.

The bandmaster will be at the High School Friday evening from 1 to 5 and again from 7:30 until all who wish to interview him have had a chance to do so. He will also be at the High School Saturday morning from 9 to 12.

Instruments are on display and a Chicago expert on music instruments available on the rental plan is also on hand to demonstrate the instruments and explain the rental plan.

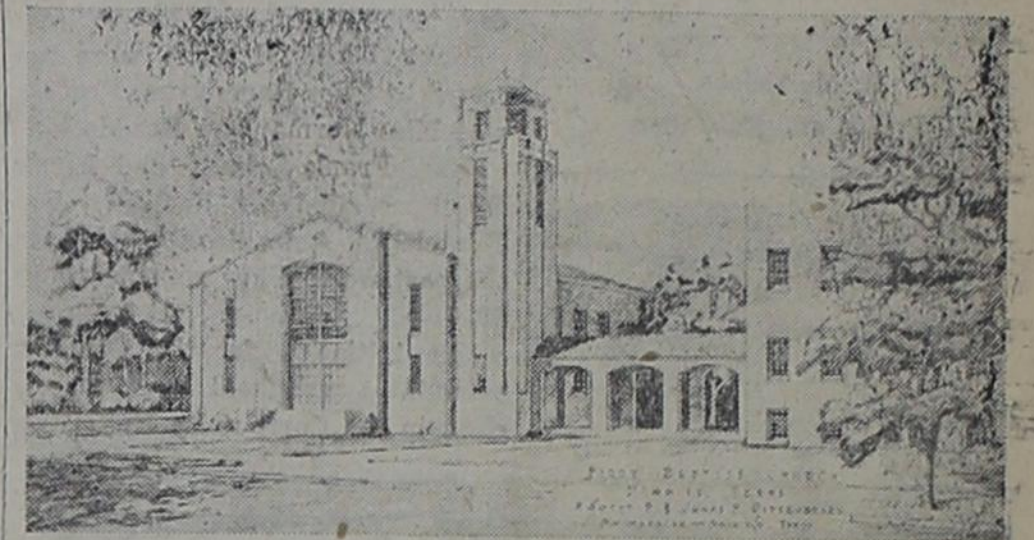
Any students who have not yet had the chance to enroll in the band work for the summer may do so at the times stated for Friday and Saturday.

CONSTRUCTION TO BEGIN MONDAY

A building committee from the Dimmitt Baptist Church, composed of E. L. Ivey, Elmer Youts and E. L. Carpenter, acting in behalf of the church let a contract to the Clynch Bros. Construction Company of Childress for the construction of a new Baptist Church auditorium. The contract was let late this afternoon (Thursday) and according to a member of the committee work on the structure will begin immediately. After negotiations for the past several months, during which time estimates were made and bids on the contracts rejected, the most recent low bid and the one accepted was for \$86,500 by the Childress contractors. Terms for the contract call for the building project to be completed within 140 working days. Ritenberry & Ritenberry of Amarillo are the architects.

Ground Breaking Sunday Plans have been made for a ground breaking ceremony Sunday afternoon beginning at 3:30 o'clock. A special program is being arranged and the public is invited to attend. Rev. Earl Landtroop, pastor will be in charge of the ground breaking service, which will tie off the construction of the beautiful edifice and which will constitute Dimmitt's first real church building program in a number of years. The contractor is expected to move equipment to Dimmitt this week-end and actual construction will begin Monday. The building, with a seating capacity of 600 will be 48x92 feet. In addition an annex connecting the auditorium with the old building will house two class rooms as well as the pastor's study and offices for the Church Clerk and other officials.

Among the 840 graduates from Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas, Jo Winders will receive a bachelor of business administration degree on June 7th.

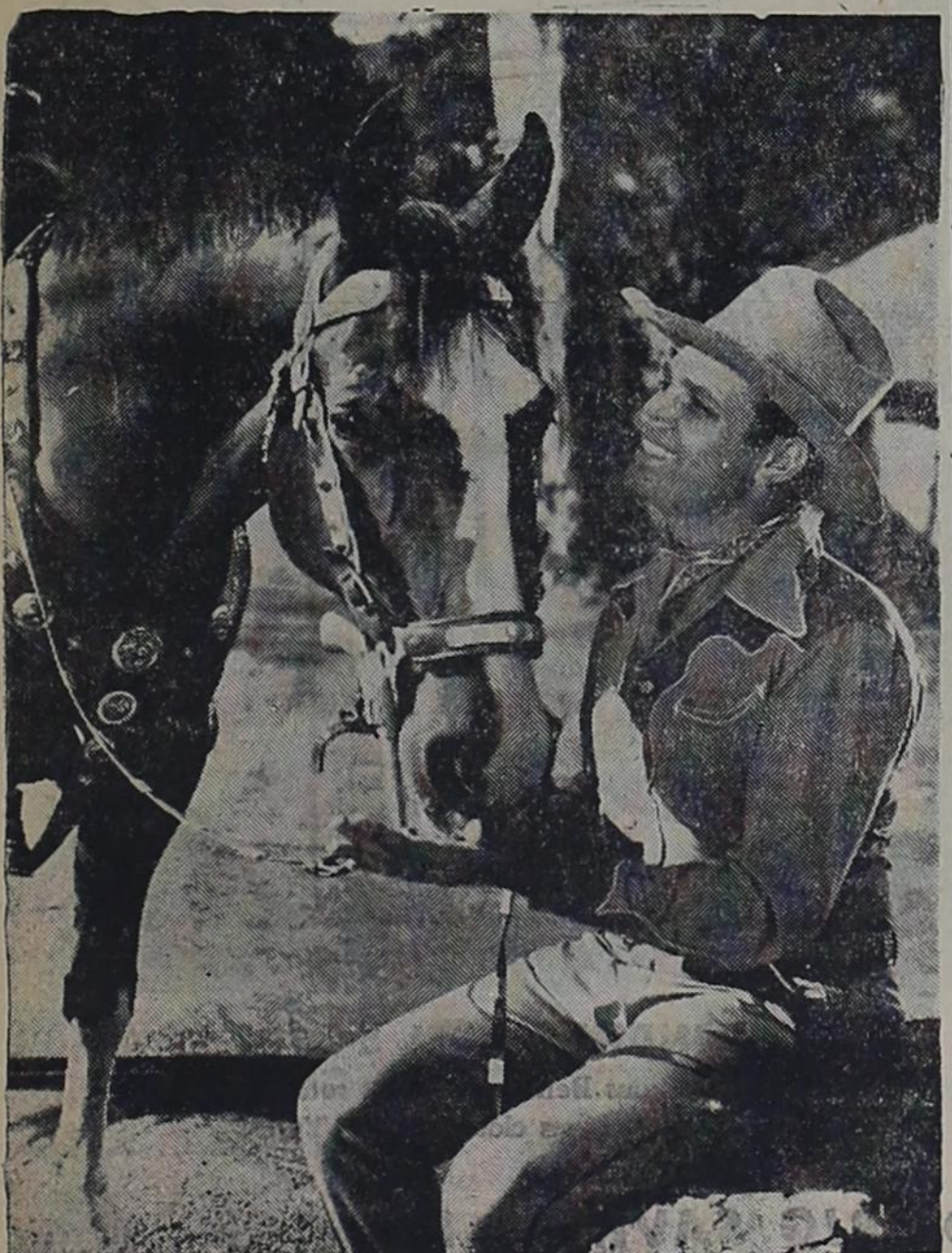

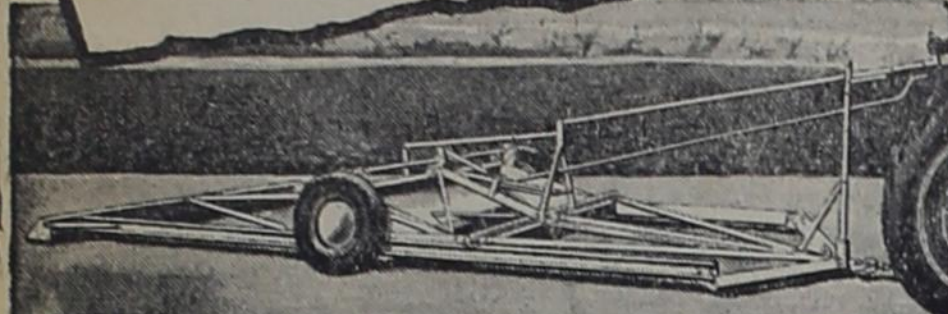
