### Woman seeks election as commissioner

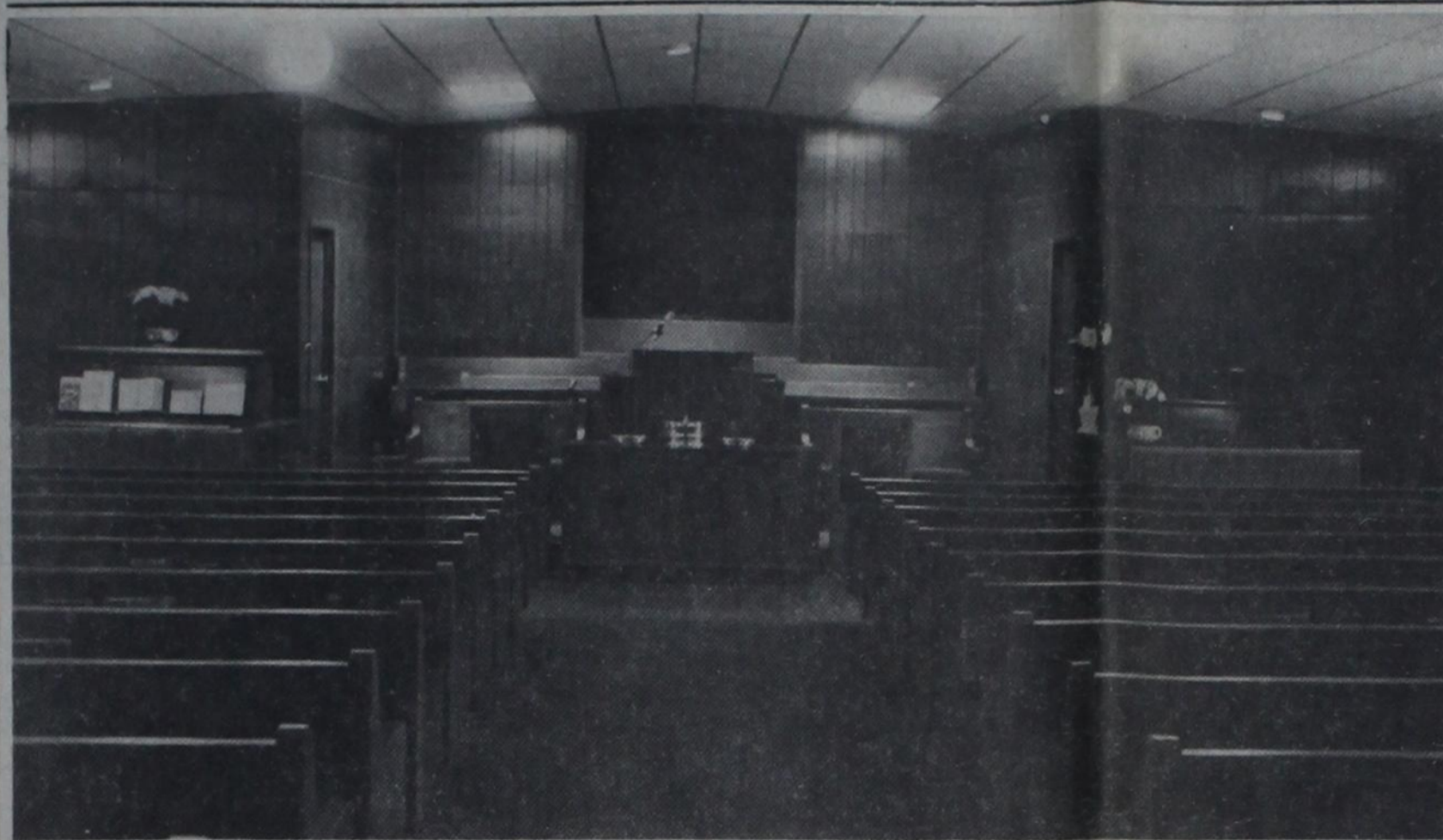

## City inks 'alley-box' lease

### First Christian marks milestone

The First Christian Church of Dimmitt will hold a dedication service and open house in its new \$70,000 building at 600 Western Circle Drive at 3:30 p.m. Sunday, inviting the public to see the new facilities.

R. C. BOLTON of Albuquerque, who held the first meetings of the local congregation before the church was officially organized in the fall of 1960, will give the dedication message.

Mayor Elmer Youts, who helped break ground for the building, will give the welcome. Bedford Smith, first minister to serve the church, will sketch its history.

Kenneth Broad, a Portales minister, and Roy Barringer, present minister, will each have a part on the program. The children's choir and the adult choir, as well as two soloists, will be featured in music.

AFTER THE program, visitors will be invited to tour the

facilities, and refreshments will be served in the fellowship hall. Invitations have been sent to former ministers and members, and to other churches in this area.

The 40x80 foot building, with 3,200 square feet of floor space, is similar to a new Baptist church in Ruidoso,

N.M. T. E. Arrington of Roswell was the contractor. With steel framework, brick exterior and wood paneled interior, the sanctuary is carpeted throughout, has central heating and refrigerated air. Total cost, with fixtures and furnishings, amounts to between \$65,000 and \$75,000.

### Heart Fund benefit dance set Saturday

Toe-tapping will begin at 7:30 p.m. Saturday in the Dimmitt Promenaders' benefit dance for the Heart Fund, with round dances preceding the Grand March which is scheduled at 8 p.m. in the County Expo Center.

ADMISSION will be by donation to the Castro County Unit of the American Heart Association. Door prizes donated by local merchants will be awarded during the dance and a concession stand will be operated by local Heart Association chapter.

Coffee, soft drinks and cakes to be sold in the stands are also being donated by merchants here. Homemade cakes and pies will be auctioned in a dance intermission by Eston Breittinger of Tulsa, who is one of the callers for square dancing.

Others who will call the dances are Johnny Gillenwater, Sid Perkins of Albuquerque, and Dub Stewart and Knox Day

of Amarillo. Les and Alberta Gramke of Amarillo will cue the rounds.

PROCEEDS of this second annual Heart Fund Round and Square Dance will be used to purchase a Resusci-Anne figure and other equipment for a county cardio-pulmonary resuscitation program, according to Gary Cole, president of the Dimmitt Promenaders.

Last year's first benefit dance netted \$565 for the Heart Association. Funds will remain in Castro County for local use.

Dancers are expected from clubs over the area. In addition to those wishing to join in the dancing, spectators are invited and assured of plenty of room to sit and watch the brightly costumed dancers swing through the figures of old-time squares.

Members of the County Heart Association will be at the door to receive donations, and Joyce White of Lubbock, Region 2 director, will be present.

Dimmitt's city commission Monday night approved the lease of \$96,000 worth of new garbage-collection equipment which will put the city on an "alley-box" trash disposal system.

THROUGH the First Municipal Leasing Corp. of Englewood, Colo., the city will lease a 1975 model truck and 450 "neighborhood dumpster" steel boxes from Emco Manufacturing in Plainview. After four years' leasing at a total cost of \$124,000 (\$5,000 down payment and \$5,976.13 per quarter), the city will own the system with the additional payment of a token dollar.

Delivery is expected in 60 days.

With the new system, city residents will no longer leave their trash in cans or barrels for pickup. Instead, they'll dump it in boxes located at two-lot in-

### Sid Sheffy dies Thursday

Sidney A. Sheffy, 78, long-time rancher and farmer in Castro County and a former county commissioner, died suddenly last Thursday morning at his home, 705 W. Bedford St.

FUNERAL services were conducted Saturday morning in the First United Methodist Church by Rev. Marvin Roark, pastor. Burial was in the Castro Memorial Gardens, directed by Dennis Funeral Home.

Active pallbearers were his grandsons, Graham Sheffy, Richard Jackson, Randy Fuller, Rick Wallace, Craig Biller, Jerry Cartwright, Scott Sheffy, Joe Sheffy and Brent Sheffy.

A native of West Texas, Mr. Sheffy was born, Dec. 31, 1897, at Plainview. He was ranching in southeast Castro County when he married Myrtle Knox here March 8, 1921.

THEY LIVED on ranches and farms in the Hart area, north-east of Dimmitt and then in the Flagg community until Mr. Sheffy retired from active farming in 1952 and they moved to Dimmitt.

He served as county commissioner of Precinct 2 for six years, and also as a school trustee and a board member of the First United Methodist Church, of which he was a longtime member.

Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Ruth Jackson of Dimmitt, Tommie Bills of Earth and Dorothy Bond of Dallas; four sons, Ted and Rex of Dimmitt, Bob of Hereford and Don of Canyon; and a sister, Mrs. Fannie Mahan of Dimmitt.

## Morton wins it

In the first quarter it appeared that Dimmitt's Bobcats might force Morton's Indians into a playoff for the District 3-AA title as they took command and stayed in the lead throughout the initial period.

BUT THE deadly Indians exploded for 14 unanswered points at the start of the second quarter, then held off the desperate Bobcats the rest of the game to gain a 53-40 victory and ice the district championship.

The battle between the state's No. 1 and No. 3 ranked teams was staged before a crowd of 3,000 in the Texan Dome at South Plains College in Levelland.

It was only the second loss of the year for the Bobcats, who have won 27. But it spoiled their chances to repeat as state champions, since their only other loss had been to Morton at the district level, too—a 49-42 setback two weeks ago.

THE GAME was almost two minutes old when all-star Jim Birdwell—who led the Bobcats with 19 points—opened the scoring. Dimmitt stayed in control, holding Morton to a single basket in the first four minutes, but the Indians fought back to tie the score at 9-9 before Thompson Mayberry canned a corner shot with three seconds left to give the Bobcats an 11-9 lead at the buzzer.

## Schools revise lunch policies

Dimmitt, Nazareth and Hart schools have announced a new free and reduced-price lunch policy in accordance with the requirement of the National School Lunch Act as amended recently.

ALL THREE school districts have adopted the same schedule regarding family income and lunch prices.

A copy of the schedule was sent home Monday with all Dimmitt students. Also, the school district's "free or reduced-price" statement is on file at the office of Supt. Charlie White and may be reviewed by any interested person.

The charge for a school lunch to Dimmitt students who pay is 55 cents for kindergarten through grade 3, 60 cents in grades 4 to 8 and 70 cents in grades 9 to 12.

THE SCHOOL will provide lunches free of charge or at a reduced price of 20 cents to those children whose parents are determined by the director of special services to be unable to pay the full price.

The School Lunch Act sets 20 cents as the maximum amount which may be charged for a reduced-price lunch.

Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect a family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as a prolonged illness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire, flood or any such disaster, seasonal unemployment and other emergency situations will be considered in determining eligibility for the free or reduced-price lunches.

## IH dealership breaks new ground

Hays Implement Co. will build a 31,000-sq. ft. building on US 385 South that will be almost four times as large as its present building.

GROUND breaking ceremonies, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, were held Monday morning at the eight-acre site on the south edge of US 385, where FM 3215 intersects.

"The main object of our move is to provide more and better service in all departments—sales, service and parts," said David Hays, who is a partner in the International Harvester dealership with his father, Jim, and his brother, Doug. "We've been aware of problems in parts supply and service that have been due partly to a lack of space. But our customers are going to see a lot of changes in '76."

The new building will be built by Panhandle Steel Buildings of Amarillo, and will be a showpiece for Butler Steel Buildings, for which Hays Implement Co. is the local dealer. It will feature a brick-veneer office and display building, facing north, with a large bronze-color steel service building attached on the south side. The white-brick office building will have large plate-glass display windows, with rock facing at

## Clayton to run for re-election

Rep. Bill Clayton, the Springlake farmer who was elected Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives a year ago, has filed for re-election as state representative of the 74th District.

CLAYTON, in making the announcement for re-election as representative of Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Oldham and Parmer counties, said it is his desire to continue serving the people of the 74th legislative district.

"They have shown their faith in me during the past years and I have always attempted to be their voice in state government," Clayton said.

As House Speaker, Clayton is the presiding officer of the 150-member lawmaking body and is chosen by his peers.

"THE ADDED duties as Speaker, I believe, have added immeasurably to my ability to serve the 74th legislative district. As Speaker, the welfare of the entire state must be considered; however, I will continue to maintain a solemn duty to the well-being of my district," Clayton said.

The office of speaker, regarded as one of the three most important offices in state government, has gained influence under Clayton's leadership.

Clayton and his wife, Delma, operate a farm near Springlake. Progressive Farmer magazine recently named him Texas Farmer of the Year. In addition to his farming activities he is a businessman in several area communities.

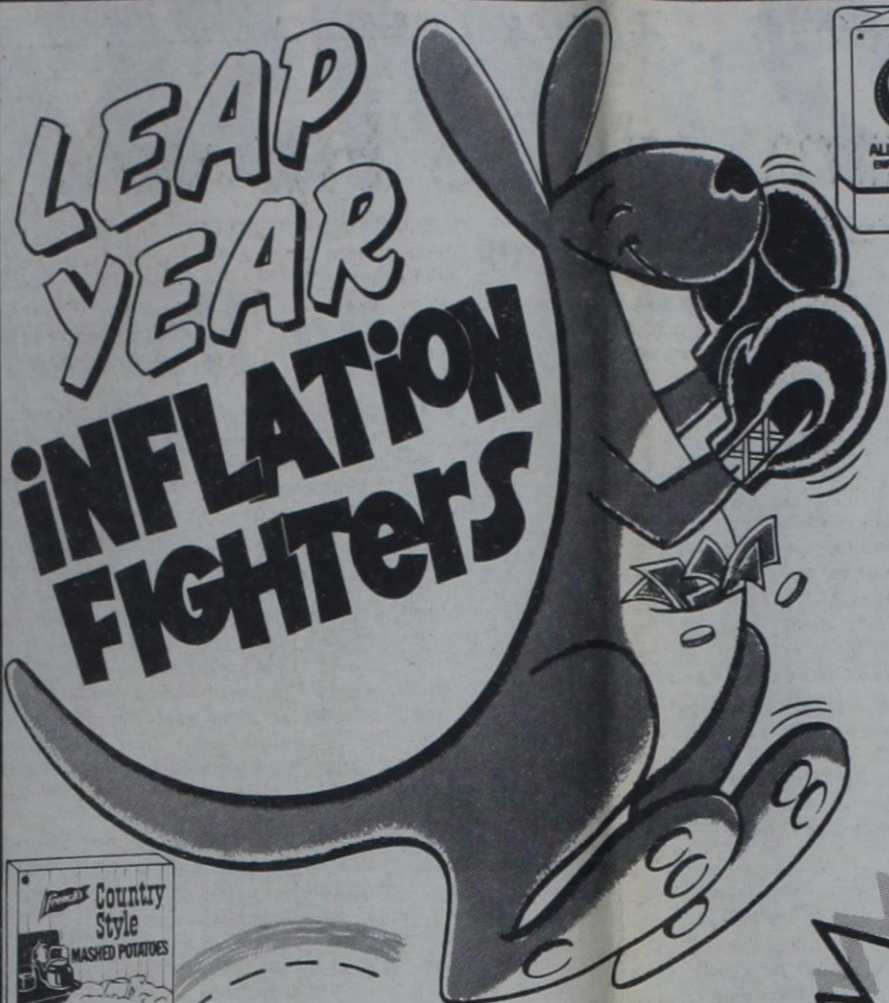

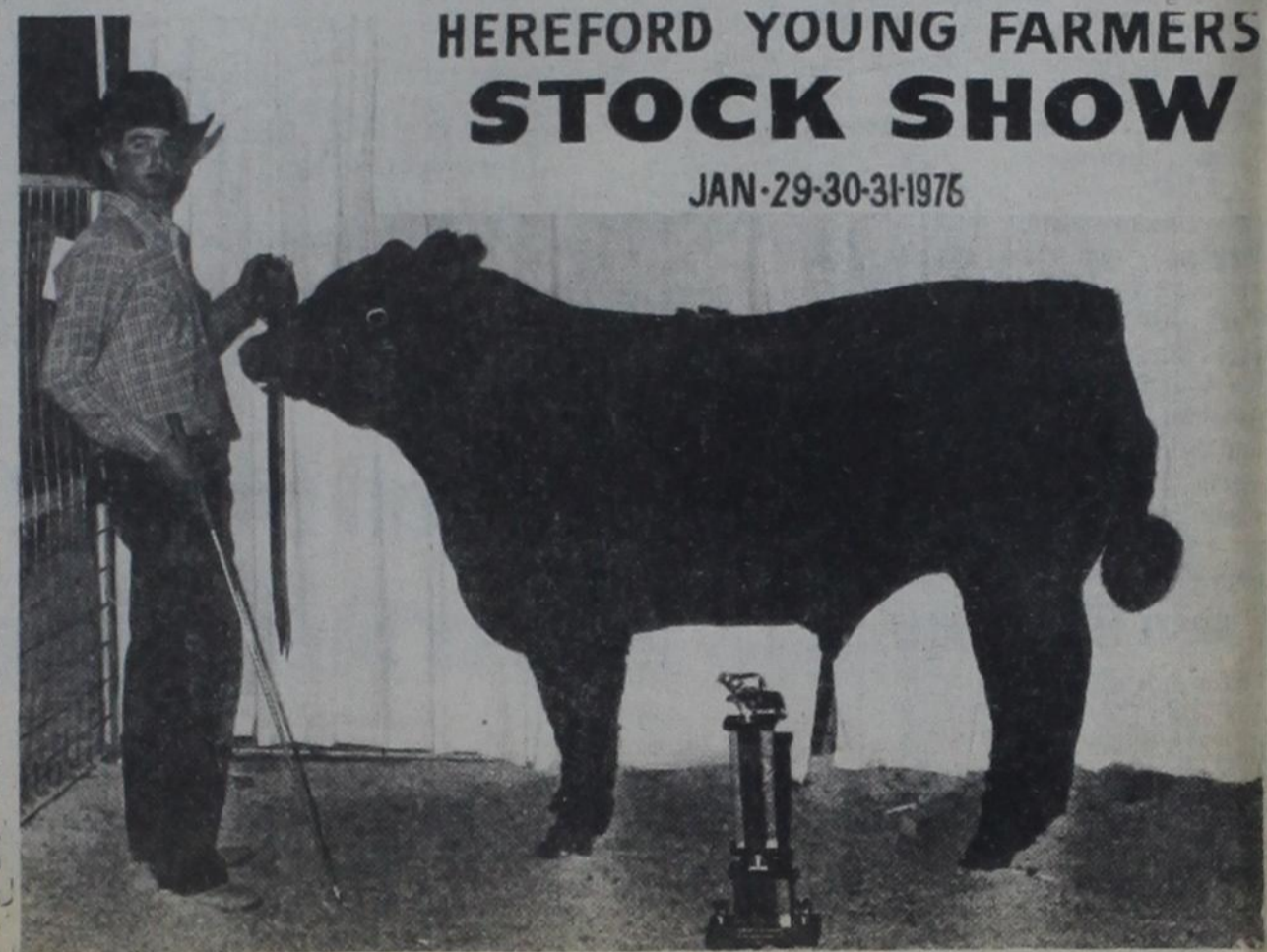

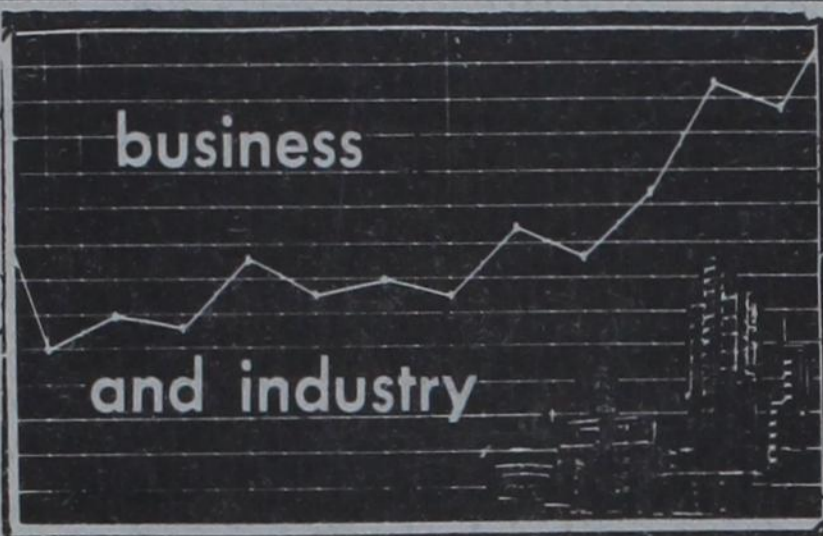

**On Wall Street**

There is a new alarm about old nuclear wastes.

FOR YEARS both industry and government have buried all non-liquid nuclear waste and equipment, etc. which had become contaminated or radioactive in the course of its use in hospitals, laboratories and nuclear reactors. Now, however, wastes which were buried in a disposal ground in Kentucky have been found to have "moved," some of them as far as 200 feet from where they were originally buried. This is called migration and the movement of those nuclear wastes is much greater and more rapid than scientists thought possible.

The General Accounting Office reports that additional nuclear waste burial sites have a migration problem and that nuclear wastes are "oozing" radioactivity.

Bone marrow abnormalities have been reported in Port Hope, Ontario, where 2,000 concrete blocks from a demolished uranium refinery were buried. The problem has been compounded because scroungers have walked off with many of the contaminated blocks and this has spread the problem of human contamination. One school and five homes had to be abandoned with 70 more homes showing above normal radiation levels.

THE DISPOSAL practices leading to the present contamination problems are no longer in use. Plutonium and other isotopes are stored by other means. But, 820 kilograms of plutonium is still in the ground from previous burial. And 400,000 gallons of

liquid nuclear waste have leaked into the soil at the Richland, Washington, and Savannah River, Ga., nuclear disposal sites.

Most of the discovered nuclear waste leakage has been found to be low-level and there is a serious lack of knowledge on that subject. An alternative plan would be to store wastes in casks above ground until a permanent site is found. That would cause a 600% increase in the cost of nuclear waste disposal, increasing the tab to almost \$81 million.

**Peach-tree borer major threat here**

According to Olan Moore, county Extension entomologist, the most important insect enemy of the peach is the peach tree borer.

MOORE SAID that injury can be detected by the visible masses of gum exuding from around the base of the trunk, from about one foot above to two or three inches below the surface of the soil, with bits of brownish frass, or sawdust, mixed with the gum. Moore adds that white larvae with brown heads will be found burrowing in the bark of the peach trunk from two to three inches below the surface of the ground to 10 inches above. Deaden areas in the bark, where these larval forms have eaten out the

living tissue, in many cases cause the death of the tree. According to Moore, hosts of the peach tree borer include peach, wild and cultivated cherry, plum, prune, nectarine, apricot and certain ornamental shrubs.

Moore said that this insect is widely distributed over all sections of the United States and Canada.

"Any questions about a possible infestation or a means of control of this pest should be directed to your county entomologist," Moore added. His office is in the basement of the courthouse.

I want to express my love and appreciation to Howard and his family for all the wonderful memories of days past, and look forward to a great relationship in the Young Farmers Association in the future.

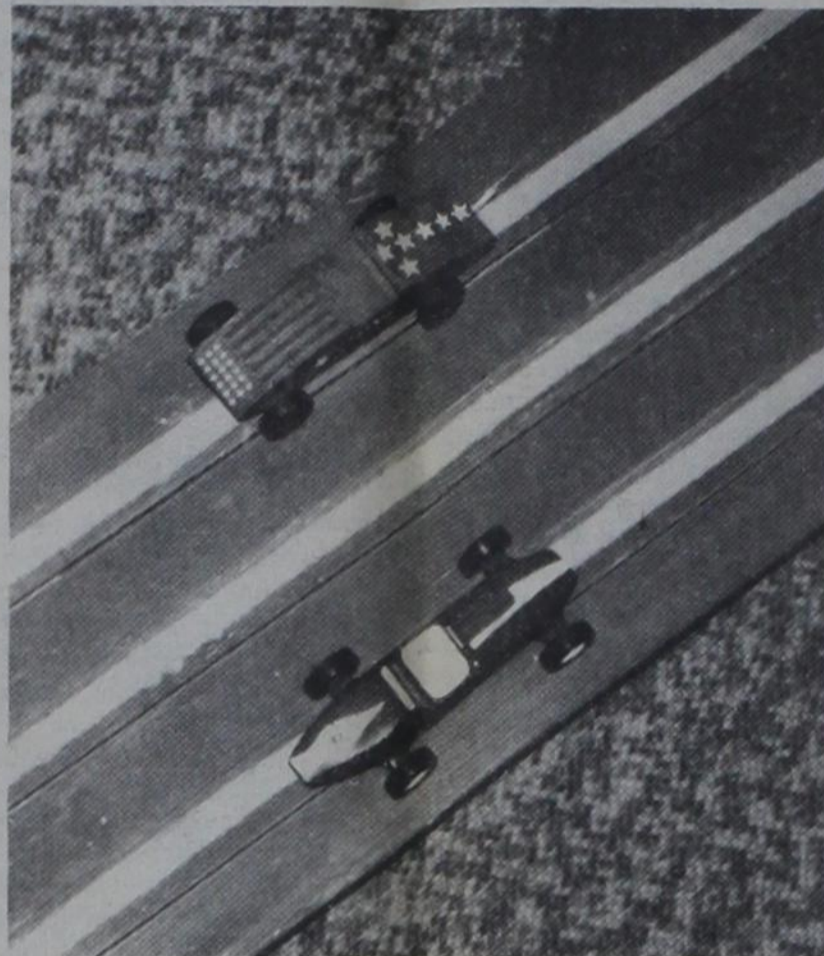

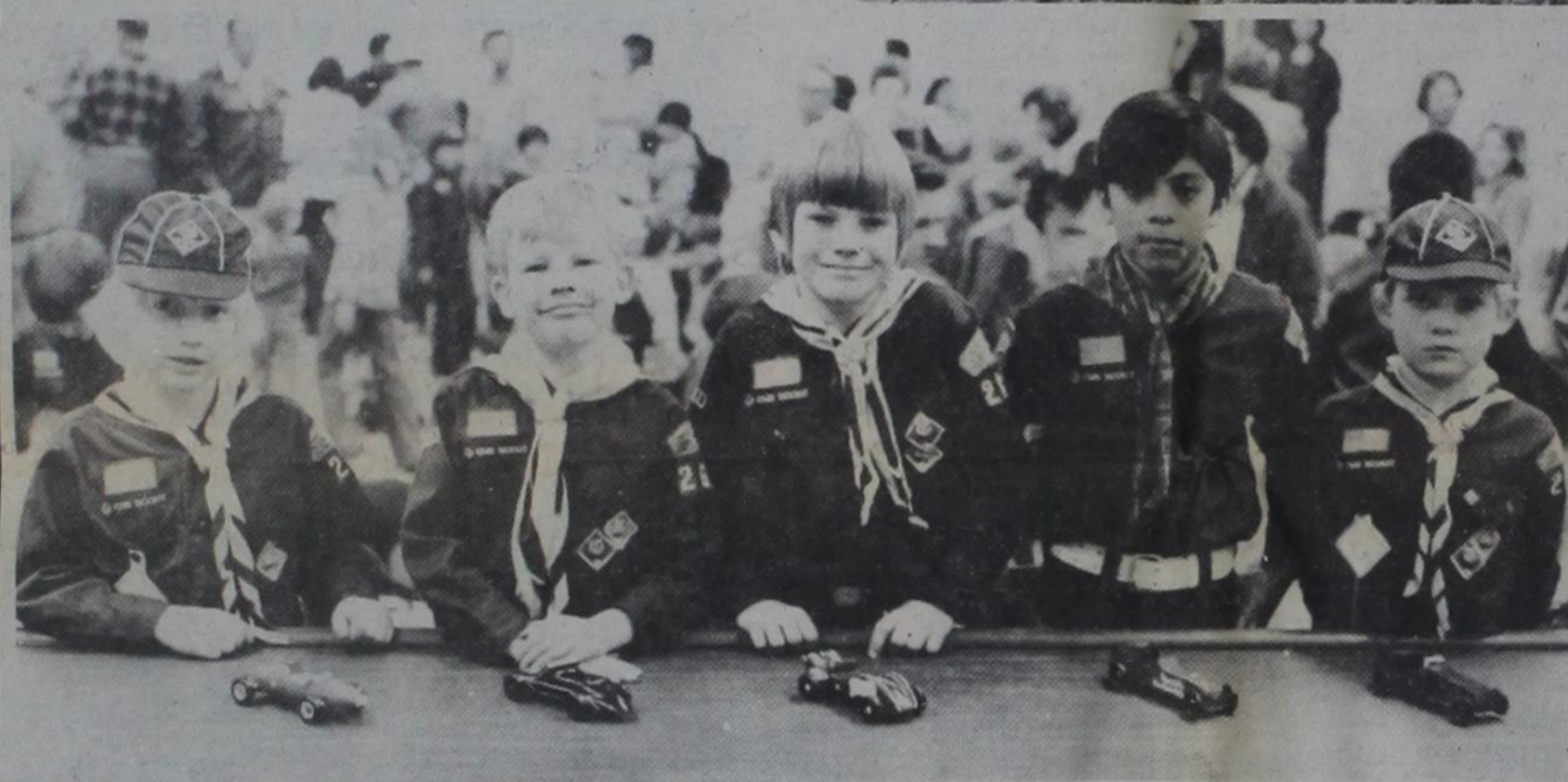

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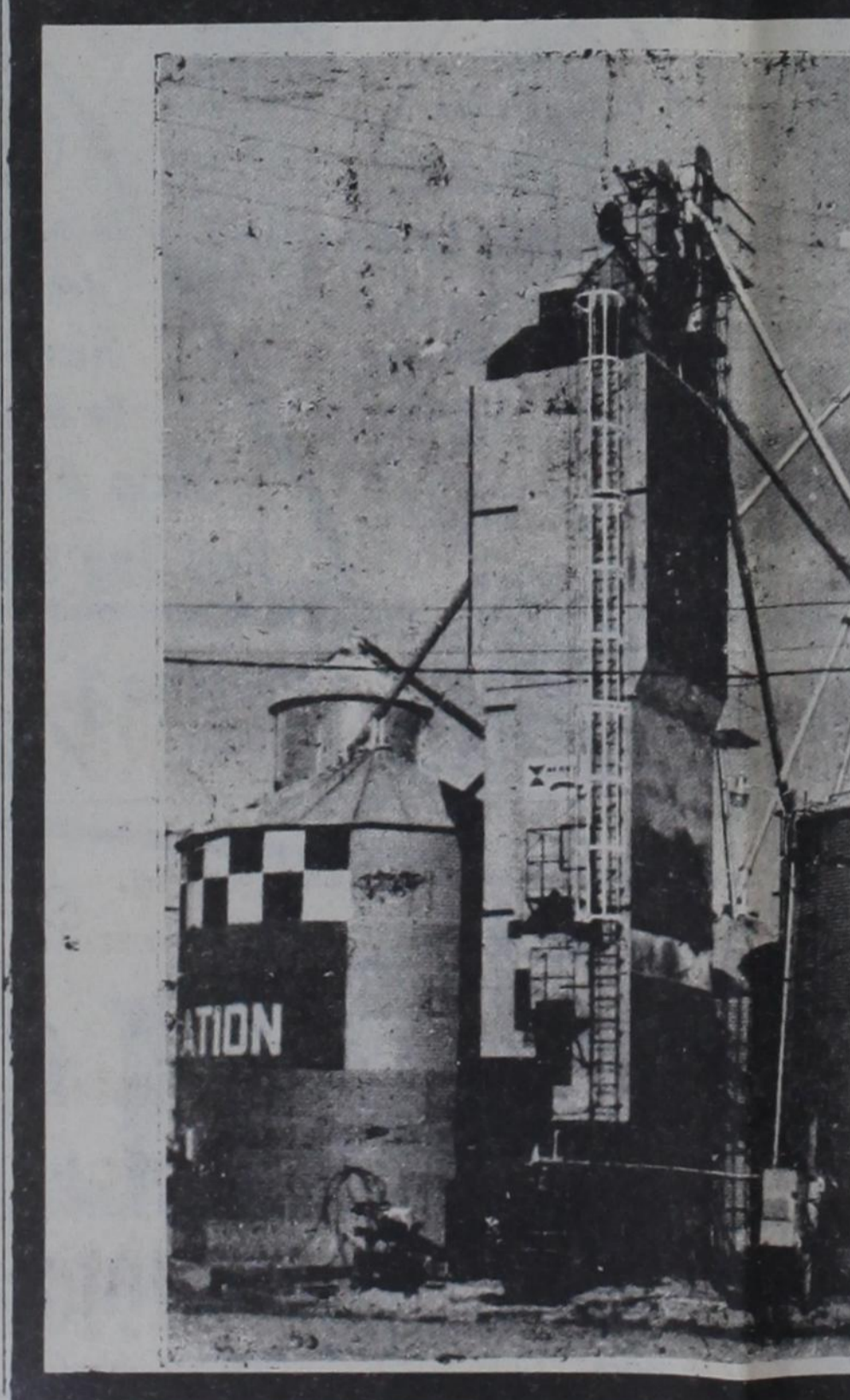
Former Dimmitt barber retires

**THE COMMISSION** also had its first reading Monday night on three new ordinances which will put the city under the Uniform Building Code, Uniform Electrical Code and Uniform Fire Code. These new standards are expected to become city law after their third required reading the first Monday of March.

**PRESIDENT** Grant's personal secretary was indicted for his part in the Whiskey Ring Fraud and the Secretary of War resigned to avoid impeachment for taking payoffs for the sale of Indian trading post rights—just a couple of the scandals within the administration.

Mainly because of plundering by the notorious Tammany Hall "Tweed Ring," New York City's debt had reached \$100 million. Harper's Weekly had an article saying "the greater part of this money has been wasted or stolen" as it reported the city's "financial calamity."

**LEADERS** in the fight for women's suffrage were pleased when women voted for the first time in an election of school officials in Michigan and Minnesota, but unhappy when the Wisconsin Bar Association rejected an application by a Lavinia Goodell, and the state supreme court upheld it, "the profession being unsuited for females."

The nation, all 37 states, was agog over plans for the National Centennial Exhibition, due to open May 15 in Philadelphia. You probably remember such an exhibition was suggested for the Bicentennial, but it was decided that each community should have its own celebrations.
