Sanco Camp Meeting to Open Thursday, July 20

At Sanco in the hills of northern Coke county, among the stock farming people of that section, the sixteenth annual Sanco camp meeting will begin Thursday night, July 20 and continue through Sunday, July 30.

Directors have made final plans for the annual camp, and the people of Sanco community are putting grounds and buildings in order. Two free barbecue days, annual features of the camp meeting, will be Tuesday, July 25 and Friday, July 28. Beef and mutton is donated by stockmen, and the barbecuing has for fifteen years been done by "Cedar Mountain" Johnson of near Bronte--an artist in his line who has made the Sanco barbecues well known over the country.

Rev. T. Perry Brannon of Chatanooga, Tennessee, will do the preaching. Widely known as an evangelist over the South, he conducts regular services over Station WDOD, Chattanooga, and is a pastor in that city.

For five days, beginning Monday, July 25, a vacation Bible school will be conducted before the 11 o'clock hour, 9:50 to 10:45, for children, intermediates, young people, and adults. Arrangements for these classes are in charge of Mrs. L. S. Bird, Sanco. Mrs. E. P. Mead of Abilene will teach one of the adult classes, Frank Bays of Ft. Worth the other, Mrs. Elbert S. Lasseter of Abilene has been invited to teach intermediates. Mrs. Frank Hays will have charge of the young people's classes.

A four-page booklet has been printed and distributed, giving the plan and basis of the annual camp meeting, to which people of all denominations are invited. In charge of general arrangements is a board of directors composed of I. A. Bird, chairman; Green Preslar, L. S. Bird, J. S. Smith, Aubrey McKinley, Bryan Gartman, and J. L. Carwile, farmers and ranchmen of Coke county, and Frank Hays of Ft. Worth.

The day at the camp begins with sunrise prayer service, Bible classes, song services, grove meetings, and the regular 11:00 o'clock and night evangelistic services at the tabernacle fill the time. On at least four days of the meeting, afternoon services will be held. On Sundays basket dinners are spread, in general and family groups over the grounds. On barbecue days the custom has been to serve barbecued beef and mutton, pickles, bread and ice tea to all comers.

A large tabernacle, dining hall, two church buildings, shower bath, and well are located on or near the camp grounds, where Highway 208 crosses Yellow Wolf Creek, about 9 miles north of Robert Lee.

Directors have announced that wood, water, and camp site are furnished free, but have advised campers to bring with them ev-

Into the Spotlight

The following editorial appeared in Tuesday's S. A. Morning Times:

"The Upper Colorado River Authority dam project in Coke County, thanks to untiring efforts of officers and directors throughout long unpromising months, at least has worked its way into the spotlight at Washington.

This West Texas development, according to Associated Press dispatches, is to be recommended by the Reclamation Bureau, provided legislation is passed making such a project possible to handle.

The project would cost an estimated \$6,500,000. Recommendation of the project at least singles out the Texas project in an encouraging manner, giving hopes that even if it is not provided for in congress that the plans will be on top of the heap at the next session.

Such a development would be a bright spot on the West Texas map, thanks to the efforts of the authority board in continuing its fight for a project definitely needed for both flood control and irrigation."

Workers Warned

Workers in Coke County this week were advised not to walk off a job and expect to draw all their unemployment benefits.

H. H. Rumph, supervising examiner for this district, said, "Quitting without good cause may result in a claimant's being assessed one of the stiffest penalties of the unemployment compensation law."

He explained that the penalty for quitting without good cause ranges from the loss of one benefit check to the loss of all benefit checks.

"The intent of the law is to help the worker who is unemployed through no fault of his own," Rumph declared, "and it is not to be confused with old age benefits or relief."

**Why be a Ham in Carving One?
Expert Shows Easy, Modern Way**

If they snicker when you start to carve, you'll be comforted by these kind words from Max O. Cullen, carving authority. "It's easy to learn the right way, and the right way is the easy way," says Cullen, who is shown at the right explaining to Pete Smith, producer of motion picture shorts bearing his name, and Ann Morris, M-G-M player, the fundamentals of carving a ham, during the recent filming of "Culinary Carving," an educational short in which Cullen was featured.

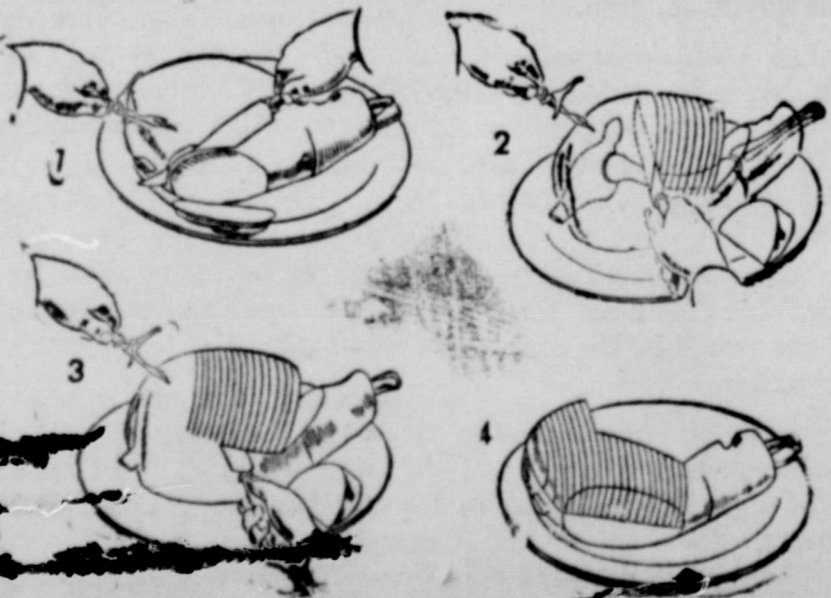
Proper tools and a sharp knife are of first importance, says the expert. Then you can proceed with confidence, if you will follow his simple directions as shown by the diagrams and instructions below.

1. Place ham with fat side up, shank end to carver's right. Cut two or three slices parallel to the length of the ham from the smaller meaty section.

2. Turn the ham so that it rests on the cut surface. Holding firmly with the fork, cut a small wedge shaped piece from the shank end. Then proceed to cut thin slices down to the leg bone until the atch bone is reached.

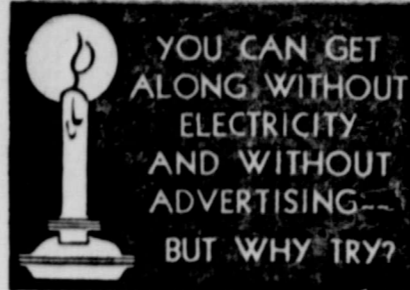
3. With the fork still in place, release the slices by running the knife along the bone and at right angles to the slices. For additional servings, turn and carve other side of ham.

4. If more servings are required, the ham is turned back in its original position on the platter with the fat side up. Slices are cut at right angles to the bone. These slices are not so large as those from the fashion section, but they make attractive servings for second helpings.

**Room Bureaus Set Up
For New York Fair**

NEW YORK (Special) - Two agencies have been set up in New York City to insure World's Fair visitors' getting living accommodations at a most reasonable price. One is the Mayor's Official World's Fair Housing Bureau, Inc., with headquarters in the Chanin Building, 122 East 42d Street, set up by Mayor LaGuardia to locate rooms for visitors in private homes and dwellings.

The other is the Hotel Room Information Bureau of the Hotel Association of New York City, representing 180 hotels with a total capacity of 80,000 rooms. The bureau is at association headquarters, 221 West 57th Street.

Both agencies function without any charge to the visitor in finding him clean and comfortable accommodations at a price within his means. Rooms in private dwellings range in price from \$1 per night per person upward, with the average per person \$1.50.

Every Western Union and Postal Telegraph office is equipped to handle requests for rooms in conjunction with the Housing Bureau's operation. Every policeman in New York City is familiar with the plan and is equipped to give visitors first hand information on methods of obtaining registered and sponsored rooms.

On making the application for a room the visitor pays a deposit of 50 cents per night per person for which he receives a receipt. The receipt may be presented to the landlord in lieu of cash as part payment for the room.
