



A Famous American Ship



The BALTIC, luxury liner of the 1850's was one of the most famous passenger liners ever built, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. Only half the length of a modern oil tanker, the BALTIC and her three sisterships were the first to introduce steam heat afloat, an automatic bell-push system to call stewards, and a complete barber shop. She captured the Atlantic blue ribbon in 1852, being the last American steamship to break the speed record until the superliner UNITED STATES. She well justified her government building subsidy during the War Between the States as a naval auxiliary and as a transport. When her company's subsidy was withdrawn, the line collapsed and the trans-Atlantic passenger field was left virtually unopposed to the British. During her last decade of service, the BALTIC'S engines were removed and she a number of fast passages as a sailing ship. She was s


