At the same time, going by the experience of farm-aid legislation of the past, it looks tike a safe bet that mere political action won't do much, to solve the probiem. In late years, about the only feally significant and permanent farm progress has come Irom the work of farm. ers themselves through their marketing cooperation.
These marketing cooperatives haven't veen abie to do the impossible. But they have heiped steady prices, burden markets and improve the general efficiency of the craft of farming. They are a potent and ever growing influence. And the odds,favor thera being given a far larger chapter, when the history of agriculture in this century is written, than the farm reliet schemes devised by the politicians.
