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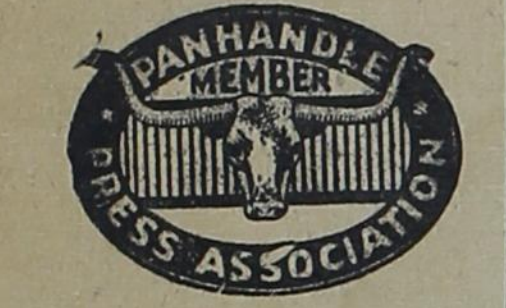

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENCY VICTORY TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

Raymond Annen of Nazareth told me this week that at least 4,800 pounds of crested wheat grass was purchased by him for other individuals and some others ordered seed themselves. This amount of seed will plant around 800 acres to crested wheat grass and if it turns out like it has for Raymond the men who plant it will be mighty proud of it. Mr. Annen's grass is holding up awfully good and is still green but the cattle like it so well they are keeping it grazed down as they have all year. Those farmers who have seed to plant are Joe Schwaller, Andrew Miller, Raymond Annen of Nazareth, H. W. Golden, B. W. Shipley, W. F. Mayfield, Will Wright, and Perry Graham of Dimmitt. There are no doubt others but these are all that I know of who have seed to plant. Mr. Annen is planting more this year and is also planting some Canada Wild Rye, and will later plant

some of the good many calls I have during the very good time to cull chickens. Now is the most of them as they are molting and much better time to cull them than they have their new feathers start in production again. The good laying hens are culling now and in the good laying time it is very difficult to do a good job of culling. Now is the time to worm old hens and pullets that are ready to go into production. All hens' eyes should be taken out after worming should be well in order to bring them into production. After that of them have come into production or have had time to do so I will be glad to help you to cull them at any time that suits you.
