with grain and feed them as a slop feed. He has found they make good feed this way and the hogs like them. He has made a large potato masher to mash the potatoes for the hogs after he has cooked them.

Don't forget to cull your hens. Hens that are not laying won't pay the feed bill with the present high prices of feed. Cull those hens that have shriveled combs and are moulting now. They won't make profitable producers.


