Early this month an outrage employer called at the local We:are office and asserted that man who had been in his employ, on a job that would last severa months, had quit without notic when he was assigned to WPA He fel $t$ this was an unpardonable offense and the man should never again be allowed to work on WPA The WPA worker explained that he had been hired by this em ployer some three weeks before and that during the three weeks he had been allowed to work a total of five days. When he re total ch his WPA assignment le aceeded it. Four days later he aceepted it. For the employer to was called by, He went to the WPA job iasiead.
Investigation proves that the version of the WPA worker is correct. Moreover, the joo the employer said would last months was completed within the week. In the present uncertainty of WPA work a man risks as much in giving up his assignment as in he quits a job in private indust sence forfeits his assignment and he is reasonably certain that he will not be able to get another soon. Is a man to be censured for doing the thing that will bring greatest security to his family He can hardiy affori to give up his WPA income, seant as it is, for a temporary job at the samp pay without greater assurance that be will be able to get WPA work again when he needs it.

Washington Stirs With War Talk As Defense Plan Takes Shape

President Roosevelt Asks Congress for Billion Dollar Military Appropriation in Addition to Regular Annual Grants for Army and Navy.

Mr. Roosevelt foresaw desperate need for these things and he told

dent's view of the conditions that
our nation faces, fast enemy airplanes can reach Kansas City or St.
Louis-the heart of America-before we can do anything about it. More-
over, parachutists from enemy
vlanes might drop in most planes might drop in, most any day
now, and start taking over our cities
and towns and countrysides. The and towns and countrysides. The
fact is that Mr. Roosevelt made Eu-
cope's war appear so close to Washrope's war appear so close to Wash-
ington that we really may expect to
hear bombs exploding almost any minute.
