The twelve grade system of ducation for Texas was approy ed by the iocal board of trustee its regular meeting May 5 The State Department of Educa tion has adopted this system o organization and it is to be pit in operation $n$ ext september This simply means that the cur riculum will be organized so as to make eight grades out of thefirs seven grades. The pupils that are now in the elementary school may have to spend another year in the grades beloue they enter high school. All pupis entering school for the first ume nextstpy ember will automatically become tweive grade pupis. by test and other means of placement, the faculty intends to reorgamze the present seven grades that are now in the eiementary school into eight graces of eiementary stand-

ing. Some pupils may be ad ang. Some pupils may be ad-
vanced into che next higher level and uthers may nut, depending on their ability.
We think that this is a step forward by the State Department and that this system wih greatiy increase ne eificientiy of our school system in Texas. We trust hat the patrons will do their ut-

British months.
This was the western end of the pincers which was aimed at Alex-
andria Egypt and Suez, with the
move of the eastern end, which
started with the Grecian campaign and the general Balkan infiltration,
expected to start as soon as the
proper diplomatic and military
preparation was finished. Many believed the Germans would
have to hurry this time, for some ob-
servers reported the Russians to be drawing troops from the eastern
part of the country, and beginning
to concentrate them in central Rus-
sia. This might mean two things,
either a protective movernent, or an
effort to beat the Germans to the Near-Eastern punch and to go into
the Eurasian territory themselves, an outside possibility that Russia,
however, might content herself with a Persian grab, and aim toward
British India.
