



Red Cross Nursing Classes To Begin In County January 29th

County Drive For Funds To Combat Infantile Paralysis Announced Here

Organization of Castro County for the Twelfth Annual Appeal for funds to fight Infantile Paralysis is almost complete according to an announcement by M. U. May, County Chairman for the drive. Castro County last year contributed only \$387 to this great cause which should be exceeded greatly this year, stated County Chairman May.

Miss Leila Petty has again been selected to head the women's organization for the drive. The contribution made by the women of Castro County in former campaigns have helped the drives to be successful.

Last year there were only 75 counties in Texas which did not have a case of infantile paralysis and Castro County happened to be one of these lucky counties, stated Mr. May. He further stated that half of the money secured in the drive will be kept in the county for use by the local chapter in case of an outbreak of infantile paralysis. Castro County has been fortunate in having only a few cases of infantile paralysis and by contributing generously to this campaign, is the best means of the county to insure against a future outbreak of this dreaded malady.

Castro County 4-H Pigs Ready For Fat Stock Shows

The above club members now have on feed, Chester White, Poland Chinas, Spotted Poland Chinas, and Durocs, which they will exhibit. The boys raised a part of these and purchased the remainder from Mr. J. T. McDaniel, Kress; L. M. Green, Roaring Springs, and Mr. J. C. Hiltbrunner of the Sunnyside community.

Castro County 4-H boys made the best 4-H show record in the state last year with their hogs when Lewis Huseman exhibited the Grand Champion litter at the Amarillo Show and Tommy Sherrill exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow at the Plainview Show. The boys also won many other prizes last year that gave them first place in the state rank.

County Agent May stated that the boys pigs were doing unusually well this year, and that the boys should represent Castro County well in all of the livestock shows of the state.

The following letter was received last week by Mrs. F. M. Henderson from her brother, Sgt. Geo. F. Simmons, son of Mr. J. A. Simmons, who has been a Japanese prisoner of war since the fall of Corregidor. He has been imprisoned at the Osaka Camp, not far from Tokyo. This is the second letter received from Sgt. Simmons by his relatives:

Dear Sister:
 I received your package a few days before Xmas. That was the best present I ever received. You certainly know what to send. Think I received the best package in camp. Tell rest of the folks if they send anything to send wool socks, wool underwear, candy, coffee, cheese, cocoa, food like that. Send vitamin pills and sulfathiazole and sulfanilamide and others. We had a wonderful Xmas and are having a happy New Year. Received Red Cross boxes yesterday. They have letters here now. I am expecting one from you. Tell Othell I think of him and pray he is O. K.

Veterans Labor Recruiting Team Here Thursday

A Special Recruiting Program, sponsored by the Amarillo office, War Man-power Commission, will complete its tour of Panhandle cities in Amarillo Saturday, January 13th. The Recruiting Caravan started its tour at Childress, Texas, January 2nd, and visited the following cities: Matador, Paducah, Plainview, Floydada, Hale Center, Abernathy, Lubbock, Ralls, Crosbyton, Tahoka, Brownfield, Levelland, Littlefield, Dimmitt, Hereford, and Amarillo.

The personnel of the tour consisted of Capt. J. E. Southworth, representing the Army in all matters concerning the Caravan, with Pvt. Clarence L. Barthelmy, and Pvt. James L. Corbean. Each of these men have received major wounds on the battle fields, and are now stationed at McClosky General Hospital, Temple, Texas. The United States Employment Service was represented by Mr. Olin Evers, senior placement interviewer, and the Pantex Ordnance Plant represented by Mr. W. D. Thorton, interviewer.

The program presented in each of the cities visited consisted of war films and talks by the Veterans. This gave the citizens of each community first-hand information from members of the armed forces as to how we, as civilian volunteers can be of the most help in the war effort. The visit of the Veterans Caravan was well received in each city visited and the people now have a more vivid knowledge of the importance of furnishing our fighting men with everything they need.

Community Classes To Be Conducted

The Castro County Red Cross Chapter is sponsoring a Red Cross Home Nursing Course. The county has been assigned an itinerant nurse from the American Red Cross Area Office, St. Louis, Mo. It was announced by local officials that she would be here on January 29 to begin classes.

There will be five classes held in the county. Afternoon classes will be held at Bethel and Flagg (combined), Nazareth and Hart, and one afternoon and one night class in Dimmitt. The classes will meet once each week in a three hour session, over a period of eight weeks, to meet the requirement of 24 hours of instruction in the course.

The course in Red Cross Home Nursing is a means of strengthening the home against illness and accident, and of maintaining its morale in the face of difficulties.

The Course is designed to develop a wholesome philosophy of living and greater resourcefulness in meeting everyday problems of the home and family. It offers an opportunity to learn:

1. Simple nursing procedures that enable the homemaker to keep a sick person clean, comfortable, and well nourished.
2. How to recognize the signs of illness in their early stages, and what to do to protect members of the family from communicable diseases, and how to carry out the instructions of the doctor in giving medicine and treatment.
3. How to take care of mother and baby, both before and after the baby is born; what to prepare for the baby's birth, whether it is to be at home or at the hospital; and what to do in case of an emergency birth if a doctor or nurse is not available.
4. What to do in the way of relief measures for the common emergencies of illness and accident in the home.
5. How to take care of the body so that one may be reasonably sure of having the mental and physical vigor for doing whatever job is to be done, and to enjoy some of the pleasures of life.
6. The essentials of a healthy home, of congenial family life, and of the care of children and old people in health and in illness.

Everyone who possibly can is urged to take the course, and in order that classes may be organized it is requested that everyone interested notify the committee member, in the community where they will attend class, either by telephone or by mail.
