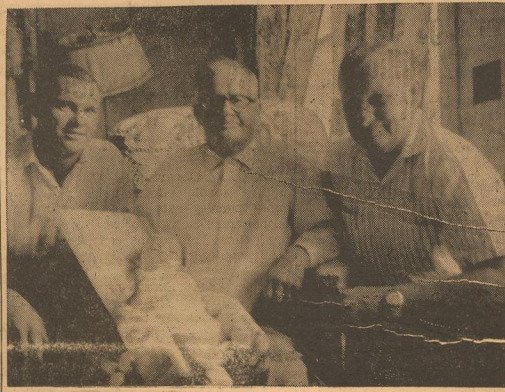

# ASC Official Defends Dept. In Billie Sol Estes Affair

(Ed. Note: Because of the widespread interest in the Billie Sol Estes case, The News is excerpting a speech C. H. Moseley, director of the Dallas Commodity Office, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, made Saturday, April 28, to the Texas Grain and Feed Association in annual convention at Fort Worth.)

He said: I will give you a few facts about the Billie Sol Estes case, a subject upon which I have become well versed in the last few weeks although I have never met the man but once and that was in a peanut meeting. First, I would remind you that the government has suffered no loss and is threatened with none on the entire grain operation. While the giants of the financial world 'have been taken' for untold millions of dollars and hysteria walks the land, your civil servants have

been quietly protecting the taxpayers' interest. All the grain is where it is supposed to be and the quality is satisfactory. Yet, some would picture the government as the villain in this unfortunate affair. Now I am going to give you the answers to some questions which have been asked.

Number One: Has favoritism been shown to Billie Sol Estes in the storage of government grain? The answer is a resounding no and the official records of the Department will prove it. Of course, we in Dallas resent this question and the implication which it carries.

The responsibility for grain storage rests squarely in my hands and not in the hands of anyone from Washington. Politics and friendship do not move CCC grain and most of you know it. I have every confidence also in the integrity and devotion of my employees and there are too many people involved to make favoritism possible even if one should weaken, which he won't.

Preferential treatment has been charged in the amounts of the bond required. I know that most of you understand that what the courts of inquiry revealed was not favoritism. Instead, it was two systems of bonding.

Those warehouses licensed under the U. S. Warehouse Act are bonded, inspected, and approved by people in Wichita, Kansas, and Washington, D. C., who are charged with the administration of that Act.

The bonding of other warehouses not licensed under the U. S. Warehouse Act is the responsibility of my office and different formulas are used. These same formulas were used for the Estes houses which were not federally licensed. In other words, the Estes federal-licensed houses were treated as all other federally-licensed houses and the Estes state-licensed houses were treated as all other state-licensed houses.

Another question recently asked is why we have suggested a bond of 10 million dollars to protect CCC under operation of the facilities by the receiver. The reason is, of course, that the net worth of the receiver ship is zero. In fact, there is a big deficit. While heretofore the Department had a financial statement showing Estes' worth to be in excess of 12 million dollars, that is now gone. The bond of 10 million dollars was suggested to take its place. It is as simple as that.

I said I could prove by the record that there has been no favoritism in grain storage, and I will do so. It is not always easy to prove innocence but in this case it is because the records are there and you can be sure they are scrutinized by plenty of outside people,

including the General Accounting Office and the FBI, and not one shred of evidence has been found indicating favoritism.

What do the records show? Among other things they show the occupancy of these houses which can be compared to others. You may have heard it said carelessly that his houses were 'loaded' with grain while others were empty or nearly so.

What are the facts? We know that farmers had strong inducements to 'fill him up' free storage and perhaps other concessions. We know that CCC shipped him some grain as we did to practically all of you. So, where did he stand on March 31, 1962, before takeover and on April 1, 1962, after takeover?

Prior to takeover, the six Estes houses were 43.4 per cent filled with CCC-owned wheat and milo while the average of Texas houses, excluding port elevators, was 48.5 per cent. Thus he was more than five per cent below state average occupancy. At the same time the Estes Plainview house was 39.4 per cent filled with CCC grain, other Plainview houses were 51 per cent filled, Amarillo houses averaged 57.3 per cent and Lubbock 61.9 per cent.

After takeover the occupancy of the six Estes houses rose to 58.3 per cent while the state average became 62.9 per cent. He was still 4.6 per cent below the state average after all the inducements which were offered farmers.

The next logical question is what was the extent of CCC movements into the houses and why did he not get his 'fair share'?

Well, you have heard me tell you many times we don't promise equal treatment and we didn't promise it to Estes. During the entire period, beginning with the first contract in 1959 and the dates upon which Estes acquired or constructed each new warehouse, the total movements in for nearly three years were 9,969 million bushels, while the movements out were 7,177 million bushels, a net gain of only 2,792 million bushels or 5 per cent of his present capacity.

Remember, that during this same period of time we shipped many of you every bushel you would take, particularly if you were operating a terminal. During this same period we reconcentrated 283 million bushels of grain from the Kansas City area to the Southwest plus all the grain reconcentrated out of country houses in Texas and Oklahoma.

So, I rest my case on the question of favoritism.

Another question which I admit bothers me some is: Why, when a small warehouseman makes a mistake, do we 'throw the book' at him and load him out while we have not done the same with Bil-

lie Sol Estes? That is a good question and this one doesn't make me mad.

It is difficult, however, to compare this case with others. I don't know of any other case like this where (1) there was absolutely nothing wrong with the grain business, no violation of any part of the contract, and yet (2) the management passed into the hands of a Federal Court.

I am sure you will agree that this at least presents a problem worthy of the most careful consideration and that is what it is getting.

No determination has been made concerning how much or how long grain will remain in storage in these warehouses. As a matter of fact, we may never announce such a decision. As you well know, we don't make it a practice to say what we are going to do with CCC grain.

Many innocent people will suffer because of this sorry mess and we particularly forget the reflections cast upon the honest, legitimate, responsible grain trade. I know of no group with higher ethical standards and it is most unfortunate that the earnings of the entire grain trade have been opened to question by the Estes affair.

Whenever anyone calls attention to the millions of dollars paid to Estes for services rendered in the storage of grain, there is frequently an inference that this was some kind of a boondoggle and that the payments were excessive. If the payments of these amounts to Estes are questionable, then so are all of the payments made to each one

of you at the same rates and for the same services.

When we pay out one dollar or one million dollars to you for services rendered in the storage of grain, does that represent profit which you could divert to some other nefarious enterprise? I think not.

I think you would say that only a small portion of it is profit and that your profits do not exceed those in other industries. Can you say then, as some have, that the government was 'financing the Estes operation'? If you also have outside interests, if you are farming or if you have a feed mill, do

you consider that CCC is 'financing' you through grain storage payments? Of course not.

Well, I close with heartfelt thanks to our friends who have in such great numbers expressed their confidence in the integrity of the Dallas Office. And to our fair and friendly critics, also our thanks. You keep us on our toes.

A long time ago I heard Secretary Freeman say that if no one gets mad at you, the work you are doing must not be very important. These days I think I would be satisfied to be a little less important.

## Deaf Smith Farmer Installs Reclaim System

Dick Godwin, Deaf Smith County farmer whose land is located about 10 miles northwest of Hereford, has recently constructed an irrigation 'tailwater' re-circulating system on his land.

The new system is designed to handle 'tailwater' that comes from nearby land as well as from Godwin's farm.

A large earthen pit was dug at the lowest corner of the Godwin land. It measures about 40 feet in width, 330 feet in length and 10 feet in depth. A 6-inch centrifugal pump and engine is installed at the pit. One-half mile of 12-inch rubber-gasket concrete pipe and one mile of 15-inch rubber-gasket concrete pipe extends from the pit to the upper part of the farm. A length of 12-inch concrete pipe is installed at either end of the pit. Each extends a few feet from the pit to the county road bar-ditches, one on the south and one on the east of the farm.

Irrigation 'tailwater' from the Godwin cropland will drain into the pit by gravity at the low side of the farm. 'Tailwater' from nearby land that enters the road bar-ditches will also be diverted into the pit through the two concrete pipe intakes.

As 'tailwater' accumulates in the pit, the pump will be started. Water will be pumped through the underground pipeline to any desired point on the farm.

Godwin states that he 'feels a genuine concern for conserving ground water. A tremendous capital investment was made to enable me to utilize my irrigation 'tailwater'. However, with a minimum amount of help from the County road maintenance crews we now can take care of our own 'tailwater' and re-claim 'tailwater' from the farms of several neighbors. We think the system will pay for itself in a short period of time.'

According to Godwin, it cost about \$15,000 to install the entire system—pit, pump, engine and pipelines. He is quick to point out however, that this amount includes the total pipeline cost and that at least a portion of this expenditure should have been made to improve the existing irrigation system regardless of whether or not the re-circulation system was installed. The greater portion of the total cost of the system can be attributed to the 1 1/4 miles of underground pipeline.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has in-

stalled a flow-meter in the discharge pipe of the pit pump. It was installed for the purpose of calculating the quantity of 'tailwater' that can be salvaged through such a system. The quantity of water that is re-claimed will constitute a major factor in the determination of the period of time necessary for the system to pay for itself.

Statistical data on the operation of the system will be recorded by Godwin and published by the Water District at a later date.
