Honor grads named

Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth High Schools have announced their honor graduates for 1976. HONOR students in each school are selected on the basis of four-year grade averages in all subjects. The schools use different methods for breaking ties in ranking their grads scholastically.

Here are the top scholars of 1976 in the county's three high schools:

Dimmitt High

Jim Birdwell, with a grade average of 97.81, is the valedictorian of Dimmitt High School's class of 1976.

SALUTATORIAN is Kathy Wales, with a grade average of 96.25.

Completing the "Top 10" scholar list in the DHS Class of 1976 are Mark Welch with a grade average of 95.75; Marvin Spinhrne, 95.21; Kay Street, 94.33; Kris Dowell, 94.16; Layne Myatt, 94.09; Hal Miller, 93.32; Greg Barringer, 91.76; and Danny Vaughn, 91.75.

Five other DHS seniors are completing their high school careers with grade averages above 90. They are Kyle Touchstone, Thomas McGuire, Melissa Moore, Kerry Broderson and Billy Stephenson.

BIRDWELL, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Birdwell, probably won't get to attend the DHS Commencement exercises. He is in Austin's Brackenridge Hospital, where he is undergoing physical therapy for a partially paralyzed right side, the result of a juvenile stroke which he suffered April 11 at Lake LBJ.

However, his parents said he plans to prepare a valedictory address to be delivered at the Commencement.

The DHS valedictorian was named to the all-state tournament basketball team last year when he helped pace the Bobcats to the Class AA state championship. This year he [See DIMMITT High, Page 16]

COMMENCEMENT is scheduled for May 27 in Dimmitt High, May 25 for graduates of Hart High and May 19 for Nazareth High.

But before they are handed diplomas to mark their completion of high school studies, all the seniors face a crowded schedule of activities to close the school year.

Seniors and other Dimmitt High School Band members are in St. Louis this week, where they will play in a concert at Six Flags Over Mid-America. Many of the graduates will participate in the annual athletic banquet at 8 p.m. Monday.

The Church of Christ supper for seniors is slated Tuesday,

and Miss Welty's is 94.95.

Three other girls rank third, fourth and fifth in the graduating class. Carol Armstrong has an average of 94.27; Patricia Smith Shugart, a three-year student, 95.78, and Terry King 90.15. The highest-ranking senior boy is Terry Hill.

The valedictorian, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wamon Foster, is listed in "Who's Who in American High Schools" and as an "Outstanding Teenager of America," in addition to "Who's Who in HHS."

SHE IS a member of the National Honor Society, plays first-chair clarinet in the HHS Band, of which she has been a member five years, and earned "Who's Who" rating two years.

She received the US Marine Corps Musician Award this year.

Voters here favor Carter, Reagan

Martin, Mrs. Moss get nod

Granville Martin won the county sheriff's race in the Democratic Primary Saturday and Anna Margaret Moss became the first woman ever elected to the county commissioners' court in the only contested county races.

PRIMARY returns were canvassed Tuesday by the Castro County Democratic Executive Committee.

Martin defeated his fellow deputy sheriff, Tom Finley, 1,155 votes to 735 and Mrs. Moss unseated incumbent Jimmie Howell by a 225-196 count in the race for commissioner of Precinct 3 to become one of the select few women on commissioners' courts in Texas.

Martin and Mrs. Moss have no Republican opponents.

IN THE statewide pattern, presidential delegates committed to Jimmy Carter of Georgia were chosen by a large margin in this county. Carter's delegates are David R. Matthis, who polled 942 votes; V. P. Perry, 790, and Mary Simpson, 820.

Lloyd Bentsen's delegates ran a poor second, although Max Sherman, state senator

from the 31st District, received 464 votes while Jeanelle Spears' total was 246 and Jim Lovell's 268, indicating that a number of voters split their ballots to vote for Sherman as a delegate.

Of the delegates listed for George Wallace, Bill Dwight was given 318 votes, Ruben Brock 247 and Becky Motley 268.

IN CONTESTED state races, 566 Castro County voters picked Jerry Sadler in the eight-man race for the Railroad Commission and Robert Wood was the second choice with 279 votes to 263 for Lane Denton, 261 for Jon Newton, 101 for David Finney, 83 for Woodrow Bean, 16 for R. R. Williams and 48 for T. L. O'Rourke.

Bentsen was overwhelmingly favored for re-election to the US Senate, with 1,206 votes to 459 for Phil Gramm, 70 for Hugh Wilson and 15 for Leon Dugi.

Don Yarbrough received 908 votes to Charles W. Barrow's 718 for associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, Place 2. Truman Roberts led Jerome Chamberlain 955-459 in the race for judge of the State Court of Criminal Appeals.

IN THE contest for the unexpired term as Criminal Appeals Court judge, Carl Dally was given 623 votes, W. T. Phillips 542 and Jim Vollers 210.

Reagan gets 17-1 margin

Castro County Republican voters followed state trends in primary voting Saturday, giving Ronald Reagan an overwhelming majority over President Gerald Ford in the presidential elector delegates race.

Altogether 147 votes were cast, according to Helene McFarland, county Republican chairman.

Local Republicans favored all five of the propositions listed on the ballot as questions to determine voters' preferences on current issues.

Delegates supporting Reagan received a lopsided 139-8 edge over Ford's delegates, and one vote was written in for Lucy as an uncommitted delegate.

STELMAN received 83 votes in the county as the GOP nominee for US Senator from Texas, to 25 for Hugh Swinney and 14 for Louis Lehman.

Jim Reese was given 103 votes as the party's candidate for US Representative, 19th Texas District, and Walter Wendlandt received 99 as nominee for the state railroad commission. Both were unopposed.

On the preferential propositions, Castro County's Republicans voted 131-6 in favor of legislation to deny release on bail to repeat felons awaiting trial; 128-6 for requiring mandatory, non-parolable prison sentences for felony offenses involving use of deadly weapons or resulting in bodily injury; 103-32 in favor of allowing use of oral confessions in a trial; 108-22 for allowing use of electronic surveillance to fight organized crime; and 132-4 for banning forced busing of school children to achieve racial balance.

All other candidates on the ballot were unopposed. Kent Birdwell, seeking re-election as Castro County Tax Assessor-Collector, polled the most votes of any candidate, 1,547, followed closely by 74th District State Representative Bill Clayton with 1,537.

County Attorney Bob Buntyn received 1,425 votes, Marvin F. Marshall got 1,369 for 64th District attorney, Carl King 1,468 for county democratic chairman, Ed Bennett 403 for county commissioner of Prec. 1.

CONGRESSMAN George Mahon polled 1,300 votes in the county for re-election to his post, and Sherman received 1,449 to help return him to the State Senate.

In Balloting for associate justice places on the State Supreme Court, Jack Pope was given 1,317 votes for Place 1 and James G. Denton 1,340 for Place 3. John F. Onion Jr. [See ELECTIONS, Page 16]

Conventions set Saturday

County conventions of both major political parties will be held in Dimmitt Saturday by delegates elected in precinct conventions on primary election day.

DEMOCRATS will meet in the District Courtroom at 2 p.m. and Republicans will hold their convention in Ye Olde Inn at 8 p.m.

Delegates from the precinct conventions will choose delegates and alternates to state party conventions, and will consider resolutions forwarded from the precincts.

Local Republicans also will elect a county chairman. There were no announced candidates for chairman in the party primary. Helene McFarland is the present chairman.

CARL KING, county Democratic chairman, is scheduled to preside at the Demo convention, which will elect four delegates and four alternates to the state convention, where the remaining 25% of the Texas delegates to the national convention July 12-15 will be chosen.

King noted that there are new guidelines to be followed this year, with federal regulations requiring "at least one-third of the delegates at all levels must be of the sex opposite to that of the rest of the delegates" to assure a large representation of women.

The county GOP convention will name one delegate and one alternate to the state convention to be held June 19 in Dallas, and consider submitting resolutions to that meeting.

Safety course registrations needed Monday

Deadline for signing for the National Safety Council Defensive Driving Course in Dimmitt will be May 10, according to Elvon DeVaney, Chamber of Commerce manager.

A MINIMUM of 20 students is required before the course can be conducted, and 11 had enrolled at the Chamber of Commerce office by the first of this week. Others interested are urged to enroll or telephone the chamber, 647-2524, before Monday night.

DeVaney, emphasizing that the course will result in lower insurance rates for those completing it, urged schools and trucking companies to enroll their drivers.

A 10 percent reduction on collision and liability insurance for three years will be available to those who complete the course. The fee per student will be \$2.50.

The Chamber of Commerce will sponsor the course in cooperation with the Texas Dept. of Public Safety.

GAS USERS from Hereford, Friona, Vega and other area cities have been invited to the meeting. Other district meetings will be held later at Plainview and Lubbock.

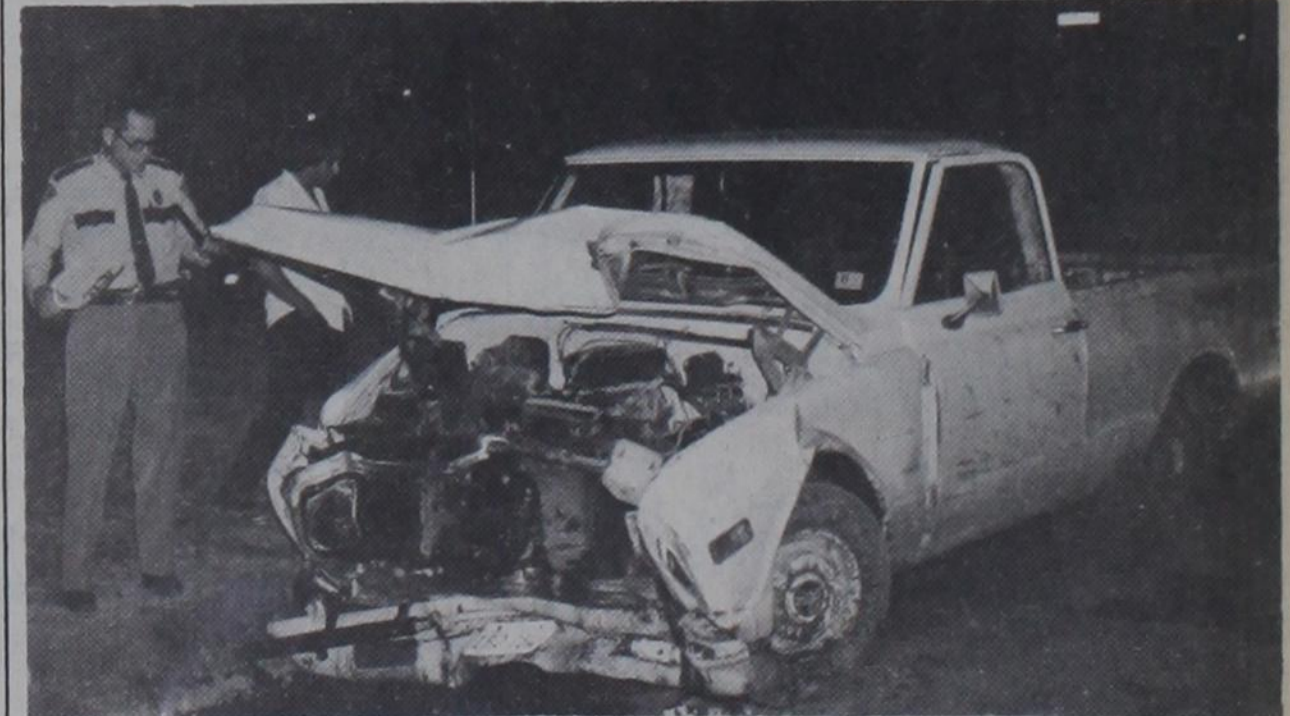

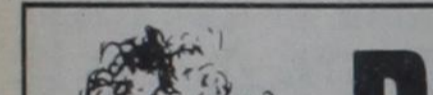

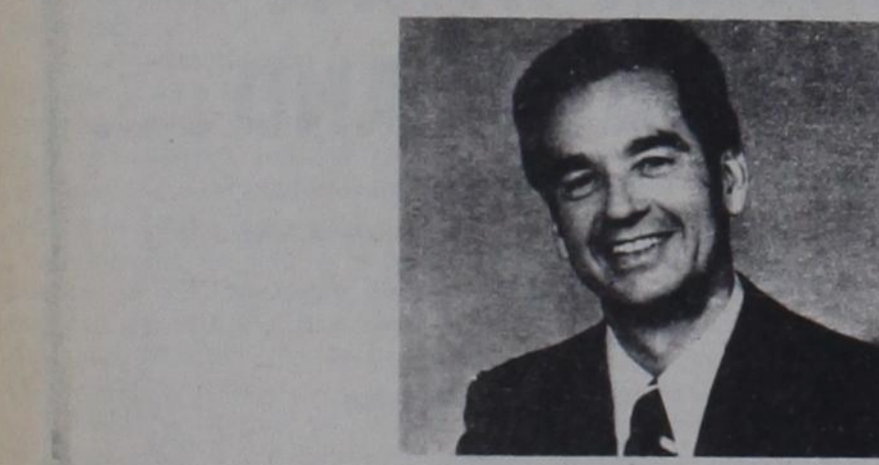

On Wall Street

Not everyone has forgotten the oil embargo. But then, Washington has not been setting any records coming up with a solution to the problem, either.

THE FEDERAL Energy Administration has been charged with the responsibility of formulating a plan to stockpile enough oil to act as a buffer against any future oil embargo. Their report to Congress, a month overdue, proposes a storage program for the first reserve of 150 million barrels by December, 1978. This reserve should be stored in salt domes and mines along and under the Gulf of Mexico.

Interestingly, one of the big problems in moving the oil to market in case of an embargo, is the lack of pipeline facilities. The oil would have to be moved by tanker and barge from the Gulf refineries on the East coast.

Storage facilities for 500 million barrels are to be ready by 1982. The oil will come from the open market and the Elk Hills, Calif., reservoir. Some of the oil for the reserve will have to come from foreign sources. The US has been dickering with Kuwait, Venezuela and Russia, but has not been able to get oil any cheaper than the current \$12 per barrel price.

Purchase of the foreign oil will result in an eventual payment of almost \$2 billion to overseas producers over the next three years. The effect on foreign oil prices won't be to raise them but more in the area of supporting prices until the foreign oil has been purchased. Sending almost \$2 billion overseas will increase the balance

of payments deficit we consistently run over the next 36 months.

The big question is whether the oil industry will have to create a huge oil reserve for standby purposes in addition to the present program. The report doesn't cover that subject. Nor does the report say just who is going to pay the huge sums of money with which to pay for the storage facilities (\$314 million) and the oil itself (\$554 million for the first million barrels).

I think you can guess the answer to those two questions. The consumer, who else?

VETERAN'S SERVICES

A large number of veterans may be eligible to have their GI home loan eligibility reinstated. The Veterans Housing Act of 1974 relaxed restrictions on reinstating GI home loan eligibility.

PRIOR TO the enactment of this legislation, loan benefits could be restored only in cases demonstrating a "compelling reason." Since Jan. 1, 1975, the VA has been permitted to restore loan benefits whenever the property has been disposed of and the home loan paid in full.

More than nine million veterans have used their home loan privileges since the original GI Bill went into effect in June 1944. Of these, 4.6 million veterans have repaid their loans in full, and thus could qualify for full restoration of their GI home loan eligibility.

Through the GI Home Loan Program a veteran can obtain a loan from a private lender for the purchase, construction, repair or improvement of a home which is to be occupied by the veteran. The VA guarantees 60% of the loan amount up to a maximum of \$17,500. There is no limit on the loan amount except that the loan may not exceed the reasonable value of the property as appraised by the VA.

Effective March 30, 1976, VA Regulations were amended to decrease the maximum interest permitted on GI home loans guaranteed by the VA from 8 3/4% to 8 1/2%. The 12 percent rate for mobile homes remains unchanged.

Further information on the GI loan program can be obtained from your local Veterans Service Officer. Applications for Certificates of Eligibility can be made through our office. We have the forms to make application.

Susan describes trip, urges hosts to apply

[Editor's Note: Susan Ryan, Dimmitt High School senior from New Zealand, attended a festival for American Field Service exchange students in San Antonio recently. The festival was held in conjunction with San Antonio's 1976 Battle of Flowers. Here, she tells of her trip and issues a plea for an AFS host family in Dimmitt next year.]

Almost missing the flight was the beginning of my trip to San Antonio.

THE CITY itself, because of its greenness, reminded me very much of New Zealand, although I don't think I'd ever become accustomed to the humidity of the air. The family I stayed with, the Bill Leflers, who have lived there all their lives, weren't used to it either.

The Leflers were extremely nice people and took good care of me. They even had five dogs to watch over us at night. One thing that intrigued me was the dog situation. The German Shepherds and husky dogs are left out in the yard and spend much of their time scaring bike riders and walkers.

The first day, Thursday, and through luck the next, we had free. My family took me touring around San Antonio, showing the sights we would not see on the planned tours.

THIS INCLUDED the very elite and, contrastingly, the poor sections of the city. All in all, over the weekend I collected an overall insight into this unique city.

A "Night in Old San Antonio" was the first of the Festival's activities. A section of town was closed off and within the area food from several different countries was sold.

To me it was not an enjoyable evening because there were so many people you couldn't see in front of you, beside you or behind you.

FRIDAY afternoon offered a much more pleasant part of the Festival, the Battle of Flowers Parade. This was the first chance we had to meet all the other AFS students. As a result, our section was a loud shambles.

We all thought the parade was fun until a somewhat frustrated back-row lady screamed that she couldn't see and that we should use the platforms for sitting on rather than standing.

That night we had a better chance to get to know each other at a meeting of host families and students in a hall on the outskirts of town.

WHEN A group of AFS students gather, it is inevitable that the internationally known AFS songs be sung. For these families who had not been amongst such a group before, it was obviously something new.

Between the English-speaking countries involved in AFS, with the exception of the US, there is a strong sports rivalry. The New Zealand rugby team, the All Blacks, later this year are playing the South Africa rugby football team, the Springboks. With the Australians on our side, we managed to have ourselves a miniature pep rally against the 10 South Africans.

Already Texas is rubbing off on us. A group of Aggies happened to be on part of the tour we had on Saturday. Whenever we met we'd all yell, "Yay Aggie!"

THE TOUR included a trip to the Alamo, the Lone Star Brewery and other places. This was

a lot of fun, although most of the time it was not thought of as educational.

Many of us, I think, only wanted to see the beautiful, unique and well-kept part of the city. When we rode down the river we all were disgusted at the pollution of the water and didn't see any beauty in it at all.

Along with five other students, I was lucky to be placed in a community where AFS chapters were trying to be started. The six of us had a chance Saturday afternoon between the tour and dance that night to shop for souvenirs at two shopping centers.

THE DANCE planned for that night took up only the last 30 minutes. We had a talent-type show in which every country had a small item. All the non-English-speaking countries sang songs in their native languages while others did dances.

The Kiwis combined with the Aussies once again, to do two skits which added some light humor to the show.

The night ended at 12 o'clock, but that morning had begun at 7 for most of us, and—along with the change of time for the 76 students—8:30 Sunday morning came before the sun had a chance to rise.

FOR THE most of the students the weekend ended Saturday night, but for the six in the Harlandale area we had church and a luncheon together. We each gave a small speech at the luncheon and together sang a popular and meaningful AFS song.

The three-day weekend was full and provided a great deal of fun and learning for us all. I myself had a fantastic time and really enjoyed the company of all the other students.

I would like to publicly thank the three service clubs, the Kiwanis, the Lions and the Rotary Clubs, for so generously donating money for my plane ticket.

I WOULD also like to take this opportunity to make an appeal to the families in Dimmitt.

This year as an AFS student has been a very rewarding one for me especially. The people of Dimmitt and the United States have so much to offer a student. As yet there have been no families apply to host a student for next year.

I feel that Dimmitt is the best place for a student to stay. A family does not have to be rich to have a student with them, and it is not necessary that a teenager be in the family.

THE AFS students do not expect everything given to them. All we want is a place where we know we are loved and will be taken care of and treated as one of the family.

Just think what you could do for a student and how they would add to your life. There are papers at hand now for a boy from Italy.

Most of his spare time currently goes into rebuilding a Model T Ford. After starting with only the body and fenders, he's making the frame, axles, etc., for the antique car.

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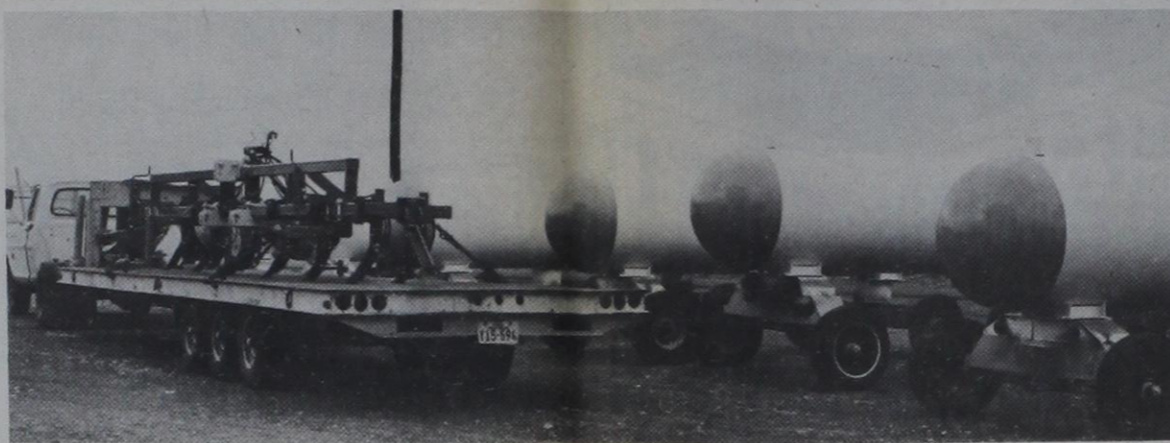
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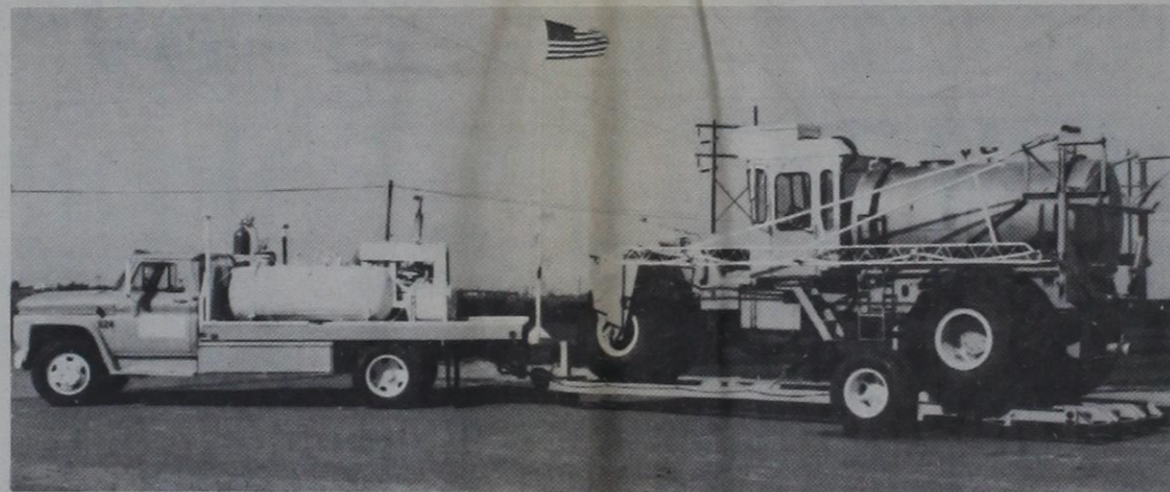

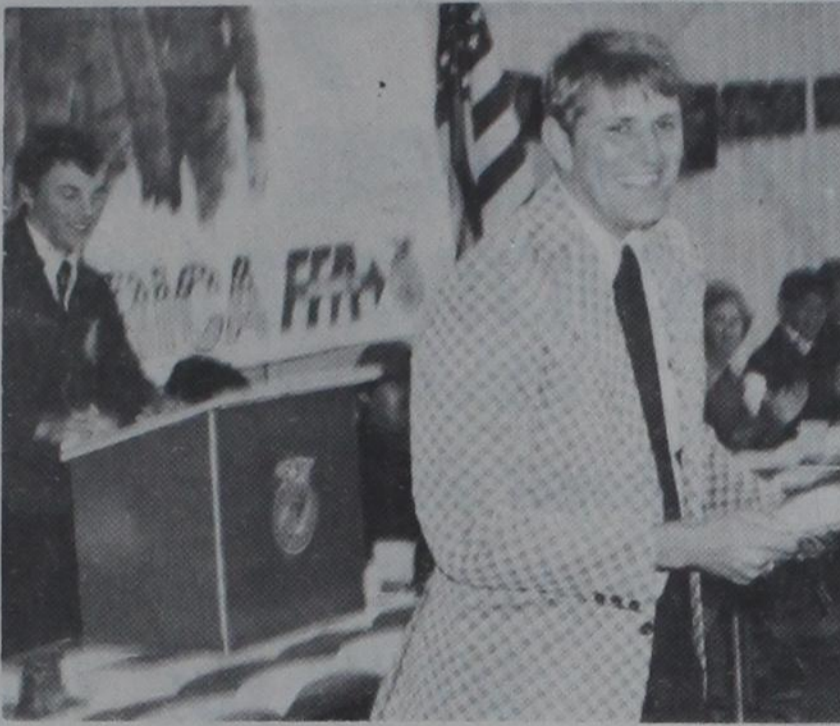

Early treatment can save twice as many from cancer

Who will get cancer this year? Obviously, there isn't a definitive answer, but you may be surprised at how much researchers do know about those likely to get various forms of the disease.

ABOUT 222,000 Americans are being saved from cancer each year, and another 111,000 could be added to their ranks if everyone heeded the early warning signals of cancer and went to their doctor for prompt and effective treatment.

Researchers have established that heavy smoking can cause lung cancer and overexposure to the sun can lead to skin cancer.

For example, the two-pack-a-day man who started smoking in his teens is 20 times more likely to get lung cancer than non-smokers when he reaches his late 50's or early 60's.

BREAST CANCER is the major cancer threat to women, and the risk is greatest for those over 40 who are childless or who had their first child after the age of 30. Women with a family history of breast cancer among their maternal relatives also are more prone to the disease.

Cervical cancer occurs more frequently among low-income women who have not had a Pap test and who have a history of early sexual intercourse with many partners. The other kind of uterine cancer, affecting the endometrium—or body of the womb—occurs mainly to women between 50 and 64 who are overweight, have high blood pressure and a history of diabetes. Abnormal bleeding is a key warning signal.

What can these high-risk people do? Smokers can stop smoking, sunbathers can use sunscreens and avoid the mid-

day sun, and women should have regular Pap tests to reduce the risk of uterine cancer. Above all, have regular medical checkups, and if a signal ap-

pears, see the doctor.

The American Cancer Society, in an attempt to detect more cases of the disease in its early, treatable stages, has under-

taken a number of screening programs. There are 27 breast cancer detection demonstration projects around the country and a campaign to get every American woman over 20 to have a Pap test by 1976.

Breast cancer is the foremost cancer killer of America. women. Give to the American Cancer Society and help fund breast cancer detection programs.

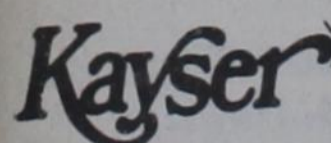
—Be sensitive and responsive to family and community concerns. Listen carefully to better understand the needs and desires of others. Be alert to what is said as well as what is not said.

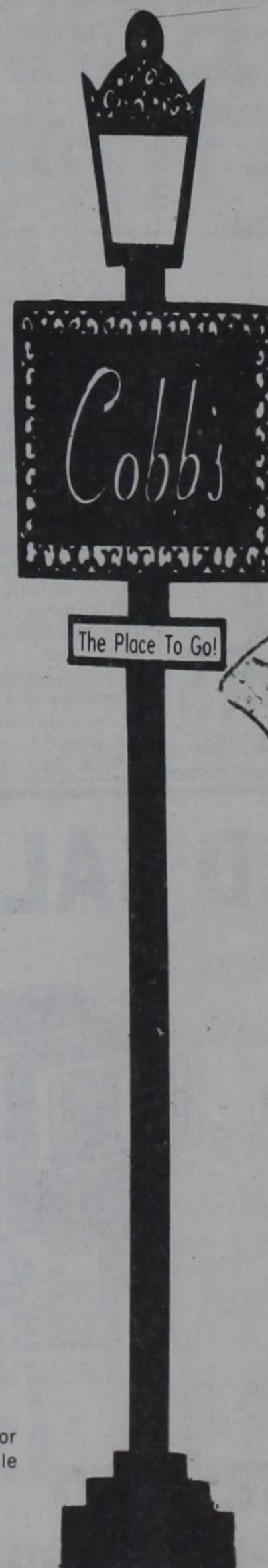

opinions about current and important issues. They agree and disagree with others in the group, discovering how well their ideas stand up under inspection. Discussions sometimes become heated when eager participants want to share their observations with others while opinions may differ and neither side will yield to the other.

But opinions do change due to the discussion group, although not necessarily at the time. It's many times after the meetings have been concluded and everyone has gone their separate ways that participants will recall what was said and possibly alter their thinking.

I RECENTLY attended a series of such discussions with the intention of determining how such activities might work in our library. While the ladies outnumbered the gents at this particular gathering, I don't know if that pattern always holds, but no one particular person seemed to dominate the conversation.

Of the subjects previously mentioned, amnesty for deserters seemed to provoke the most controversy, and not necessar-

ily where opinions matched like the stereotype would have it in different age levels. Everyone agreed on one point—there was no easy solution to the problem. We had, as they say in cliches, food for thought. Great Books discussion anyone? When is the last time your mind was stretched by a new idea? Remember, a mind stretched by a new idea can never return to its former size.

While the book has been the center of controversy, we were concerned only with the suspicion that many people would want to read it.
