

Fire Loss Doubles in Last 10 Years

Americans are paying a shocking price for carelessness.

The National Fire Prevention

Association reports that a fire loss of slightly more than \$400,000,000 in 1943 has climbed until in 1952, just ten years later, the loss exceeded \$896,000,000, partially due to inflated values. Deaths from fires totaled 12,535 in the United States and Canada.

Based upon the fire loss in the first 5 months of 1953, the NFPA predicts a loss in excess of \$900,predicts a loss in excess of \$900,-000,000 this year. This would mean a loss of approximately \$6 per capita this year, a record peace-time high for this or any other nation.

other nation.

"Americans lead all others in burning up their homes, their jobs, and themselves," the NFPA asserts and points out that at least 90 percent of the fires that take such a high annual toll in homes, on farms, and in industry can be prevented by being careful and practicing sensible living habits.

Fire Prevention Week, proclaimed by President Eisenhower and sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association, will be observed this year from Oct. 4-10.

CARELESSNESS FEEDS FIRE "Fire Feeds on Careless Deeds" is emphasized in this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association and proclaimed by President Eisenhower for the week of Oct. 4-10. The NFPA points out that 90 percent of all fires are directly due to carelessness and indifference to fire hazards.

FIRE'S BIG 3

The National Fire Protection Association estimates that there were more than 600,000 building fires in the United States in 1952. Just three hazards accounted for more than one-third of the total. These were carelessness with matches and smoking; misuse of electricity and faulty wiring and appliances, and defective heating equipment.


